

Helen Rankin. The Ohio History Connection historical marker program "allows local communities to identify, honor and commemorate the important people, places and events that have contributed to their past and formed part of the fabric of Ohio." Jacqueline P. Hudson, a doctoral candidate at Bowling Green State University will submit the application in honor of the Rankins.

Campaign Goal \$8000 - April 2021


- \$4500 to purchase and install the historical marker and

- A way to connect neighbors
 Beautiful green space for people to enjoy
- Educational opportunity for people who want to learn how to grow their own food.
 - In three years, our hope is fresh food will be growing on trees and bushes, possibly hundreds of pounds. Working toward a permanent source of food.

 Campaign to raise \$20,000 for installation and 3 years of operation


