13% of All Families Who Called the Central Access Point (CAP) (381-SAFE) for Help, Got Help in 2024






#### SHELTER

# Life-Changing Holistic Services

We work side-by-side with families to support them finding a job and stable housing. We also connect families to medical and mental healthcare and assist with getting kids back in school or into childcare. Short-term financial assistance is offered.

### **Children Bear the Brunt of Homelessness**

Family homelessness has a significant and life-changing impact on children if not effectively addressed. Children bear the brunt of homelessness, as homeless children are:

- Sick and hungry twice as often
- Change schools seven to eight times per year
- Twice as likely to repeat a grade
- One-to-two years behind in school
- Diagnosed with twice the average rate of learning disabilities
- By the time homeless children are eight years old, one in three has a major mental health disorder.

We must do more to break the cycle of generational homelessness in families.





### **Our Holistic Services Work**

- Each FHP agency provides a full continuum of services: prevention, emergency shelter, re-housing after shelter, and aftercare
- Our unique children's services include trauma groups, afterschool tutoring, summer field trips & academic camps, as well as parent-child play education along with the school enrollment and daycare placement services
- We raise more than \$250,000+ per year for one-time financial assistance and deliver very good outcomes:




#### Families Have Deeper and More Barriers to Staying Housed

- Barriers to ability to work full-time or two jobs in order to afford housing
  - Loss of significant daycare capacity during COVID
  - High prevalence (40%) of children and adults with ability or health challenges (developmental, learning, mental health/trauma, chronic health conditions)
  - 50% of families require longer term rental assistance

#### **Availability of Entry Housing Impacting Capacity**

- Rents & the rental market since 2021 have exacerbated housing instability and length of time homeless
  - Multibedroom rental units at 30-50% AMI are SCARCE
  - Loss of longer-term rental assistance through CMHA vouchers has been devastating, expecting to impact more than 150 families exiting shelter & shelter diversion
  - Length of stay in shelter went from 45 to 60 days, limiting how many families can be served over the year



# **Barriers to Engaging Families Earlier**

- Families think the financial issue is short term or one time versus the beginning of a snowball; so no early ask for assistance
- Families are unaware that help is available that will keep them in the home; and for many there is not enough financial assistance available
- Families often involved in other systems and are "weary" of help school, mental health, disabilities/health care, public assistance
  - Other systems also unaware of where to send individuals









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
