




Overall Part 1 Crime Review

Year-To-Date: January 1 – October 31

- Overall, down in <u>nearly all</u> offense types, except Auto Theft and Theft from Auto
- Every district faces its own unique crime spikes, use problem-solving to address
 - Example: I-Storage burglary in South Fairmont (D3), violence in Roselawn (D4)
- There are problems that exist city-wide
 - Kia/Hyundai theft
 - Juvenile violence
 - Theft of firearms






- First half on par with 2022, slightly higher

 - Rate of Increase among Shootings





Year-To-Date: January 1 – November 13, 2023




Year-to-Date Includes:

- 283 shooting incidents involving
 - 304 in 2022 (-7%)
- 345 shooting victims
 - 363 in 2022 (-5%)

Year-to-Date Includes:

- 45 shooting incidents involving a juvenile(s)
 - 33 in 2022 (+36.4%)
- 58 juvenile shooting victims
 - 35 in 2022 (+65.7%)


Juvenile shooting victimization record-breaking


- Auto Theft driven by Kia/Hyundai vulnerabilities
 - Technical "Fixes" have not stopped problem

- Theft from Auto volume is on par with 2022
 - ...but TFAs that included a stolen firearm increased by 30%
- Two "problems"
 - KIA/Hyundai
 - Unlocked/Keys in Car






Auto Theft – All Manufacturers





Method of Entry (All Makes)






Auto Theft – KIA/Hyundai and All Other Models








Auto Theft - Only "Other" Manufacturers (if we remove Kia/Hyundai)



(All Other Makes)






Theft of Firearms

- Most firearms stolen <u>from</u> vehicles
 - ~60% in Theft from Auto or Auto Theft
- CPD recovers ~1,200 firearms per year
 - But few are recovered within a year (14% of those stolen in 2023)
- Can't track whether they are used in a crime until <u>after</u> they are used and recovered





Theft of Firearms: How are our firearms being stolen?




