RECENT HISTORY: SENIOR SERVICES LEVY

Current levy (2018-2022) generates \$27MM. Last increase in 2018.

Levy is on ballot for renewal in November 2022.

Levy's ballot language seeks flat renewal.

RECENT HISTORY: CHILDREN'S SERVICES LEVY

2018 – Children's Services Levy increased from \$39MM to \$78MM (2.77 mills to 4.75 mills).

Increase occurred by adding a second levy to the ballot in 2018 (approved).

Ex: levy costs owner of a \$100,000 home - \$109 annually.



HCDJFS – CHILDREN'S SERVICES

Mandated services:

- 24-hour hotline to report abuse and neglect 513-241-KIDS
- Investigate allegations of abuse, neglect, and dependency
- Support and protect vulnerable children who have parents without protective capacities
- Make reasonable efforts to prevent the removal of children from their home
- Provide services to children can remain safely at home. Services include: emergency housing, mental health & substance abuse assessment/treatment, domestic violence programs, parent mentoring and training.
- When a child is unsafe, seeking intervention through the court
- When necessary for safety, placing children in temporary care with relatives, foster care, or a more restrictive setting
- Pre and post adoption services
- Prepare older teens to live independently



MENTAL HEALTH & ADDICTION SERVICES

RECENT HISTORY: MENTAL HEALTH LEVY

Current levy generates revenue of \$36.5MM annually. Last increase in 2008.

Levy up for renewal in November 2022. Levy's ballot language seeks increase to \$44.9MM



2021: **77%** of services provided to adults, **23%** to children


2021: HCMHRSB contracts with <u>37 agencies</u> to provide mental health and addition recovery services


- Current levy generates revenue of \$41MM annually. Last increased in 2002.



- Purpose / Grant Priorities -Focused on improving the health of all people in our region. Currently engaged in strategic planning.
- 2022: approximately \$7MM of support to the community annually via grantmaking, community research, evaluation and education.
