Community Violence Intervention (CVI)

- CVI Programs "..Work to reduce Homicides and shootings through trusted partnerships between community stakeholders, individuals most affected by gun violence, and government."
 - These programs connect community members who are involved in violence with trusted and respected individuals who have similar life experiences.
 - CVI Programs identify the best services and resources to support alternate avenues to resolving conflict and ending cycles of violence.

Hospital-Based Violence Intervention Programs





Combat Cycles of violent crime and retaliation by engaging patients in the recovery process immediately following injury

Hospital-Based Violence Intervention Programs (HVIPs)



First developed in Oakland, California in 1994

("Caught in the Crossfire" developed by Youth Alive!)



2004 Evaluation of Oakland's Youth Alive program revealed that the program saved hospitals up to \$1.5 million annually

Other HVIPs, including San Francisco's Wraparound Project and Baltimore's Violence Intervention Program, have revealed similar success in hospital savings and injury reduction



Components of the HVIP Process

Providing Intervention During Recovery

- Intervention Specialist
 - Build Connections with patients in order to overcome historic distrust of the health care and criminal legal systems
 - Introduction is made at the bedside of the injured patient and as the patient recovers, the specialist begins guiding them and their family away from retaliation and revenge while providing resources to address stress, emotional distress and other socioeconomic disparities

Components of the HVIP Process

Providing Follow-Up/Long-Term Care



The patient's hospital stay is followed by continued care from the intervention specialist and other providers.



Follow up includes connecting patients to community-based resources that can include job training, behavioral and mental health, recovery or education.

HVIP Cost Savings

Based on studies over the last decade:

- Cost savings for a hospital:
 - Average of \$1.5 million annually
 - 2020 Presentation by the Saint Francis Hospital and Medical Center's Hartford Crisis Response Team in Connecticut shows there is a \$3.42 return for every \$1.00 invested. The HVIP invested \$175k and seen a net health cost savings of over \$420k.
- The state of Maryland predicted a states saving of approximately \$1.25 million in incarceration cost.
