STATEMENT

Mayor Aftab Pureval's response to City Administration's report on the Cincinnati Futures Commission recommendations

As we continue our work to build policies, vetting processes, and a path forward in response to the Futures Commission's recommendations, the City Administration has returned a comprehensive report to inform and assist our decision-making. I asked our Administration, in this report, to provide thorough updates on completed and ongoing City actions in line with the Commission's proposals, as well as a clear framework to support the policy guidance required of us. They have delivered exactly that, and I am grateful to City Manager Long and her team for their continued excellence and intentionality.

While the Futures Commission provided a wide-reaching set of recommendations, both long-and-short-term, the overarching goal is well-defined: equitable growth. Elected officials have made clear that our north star in governance is to grow our entire City, ensuring economic prosperity while leaving no one behind. The Administration, in the report before Council and in their ongoing work, has remained consistent with our pro-growth policy goals. The actions and guidance they have presented affirm that equitable growth does not happen by divine providence; it must be made to happen through intentional, forward-looking strategies and investments.

Often, however, implementing growth strategies has the potential to conflict with other critical priorities. Without thoughtful implementation, this can lead to unintended consequences antithetical to our goals: displacement and an exacerbation of wealth inequities that the Futures Commission rightly emphasized. To overcome this conflict more transparently, and to increase consistency, the Administration's report describes the upcoming work, in partnership with elected officials, to develop clear, written, and collective strategic objectives for equitable growth. This key policy guidance will empower the Administration to offer specific recommendations about City structure, staffing, investment needs, and measurable metrics to track progress.

I believe it is important to note the significant alignment between the Futures Commission and the Administration's existing reforms and strategies, detailed in this report. Several of the recommendations, for example, were funded in the most recent budget cycle under the direction of elected officials. This consistency of vision cannot be overstated, and it provides us with necessary momentum for future implementation.

As we move forward in fulfilling our duty to vet, review, and implement the goals of the Futures Commission, we must do so with the same care that has gone into the work leading up to this moment. Many of the recommendations directly or indirectly affect our City's public servants significantly. Our employees are our greatest asset. The Administration is a collection of approximately 6,000 dedicated workers, and they are the backbone of everything we seek to accomplish. Because of this reality, no recommendation can be fully vetted without understanding its impact on the resources and morale of our employees. Our sacred commitment to our public servants is and will remain a priority as we continue this process.

This report from our Administration is not the final word. Rather, it provides a framework for future workflows and identifies structural and legal considerations that we must address together. As the Futures Commission noted, many recommendations require further study and task forces to better understand known and unknown challenges. With this report, the Administration has set out processes that will not only further identify and solve those challenges, but also drive consensus to empower effective and efficient implementation.

I want to reiterate my gratitude for Jon Moeller and the members of the Commission who took on our City's most fundamental and complex issues. In the face of global transition and daunting macroeconomic forces, they have provided an important and ambitious blueprint for Cincinnati to not just survive, but thrive. I continue to be inspired by our community's ability to come together, from disparate parts of our diverse city, and unite to meet our biggest moments.

With the support of our Administration, we are up to the task of carrying this essential work forward. Every day, I see diverse Cincinnatians working together to accomplish shared goals. I see our public servants striving in big and small ways to make our city a better place. And I see an unmatched civic pride that will not allow the City to falter. I am energized by the process that remains, and I look forward to doing my part, in collaboration with our Administration and Council, to create an abundant future for Cincinnati.



MODIFYING Article XV, "Retirement System," of the Administrative Code of the City of Cincinnati by AMENDING Section 1, "Board of Trustees," to remove the limitation on the terms of board members.

WHEREAS, the Cincinnati Retirement System Board ("Board") desires to remove the limitation on the number of terms which board members may serve in order to provide flexibility and continuity in Board membership and to maintain attendance of a sufficient number of Board members; and

WHEREAS, the Board has voted to remove the limitation on the number of terms that board members may serve; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio, with three-fourths of its members concurring:

Section 1. That Article XV, "Retirement System," of the Administrative Code of the City of Cincinnati is amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE XV. – RETIREMENT SYSTEM

Sec. 1. Board of Trustees.

- a) The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of the retirement system shall be vested in a board of trustees. The board of trustees shall consist of nine members:
 - i. Four members with qualifications specified in subsection (b) shall be appointed by the Mayor with the advice and consent of Council.
 - ii. Two members, who shall be employee members of the system, shall be elected by deferred members and active members, as defined in Sections 203-1-D and 203-1-A2, who are not currently receiving a retirement benefit.
 - iii. Three members, who shall be retired members of the system, shall be elected by persons who are receiving retirement allowances, optional benefits, or survivor benefits from the system.
- b) At least two of the appointed members of the board shall have the following qualifications:

- i. Baccalaureate degree from an accredited college or university in finance, economics, business, or other field of study involving financial management; or
- ii. A minimum of ten years of experience in pension administration, pension actuarial practice, institutional investment management, employee benefits/investment law, banking, asset/liability management for an insurance company, or university or college professor with a focus on fiduciary or trust fund law or quantitative background in financial theory or actuarial math.
- iii. The appointed member shall not have any business, personal, or family interests related to the city or the retirement system that would constitute a conflict of interest, or that would create the appearance of a conflict of interest, with the duties of a trustee. Being a member of the Cincinnati Retirement System or a beneficiary of the Cincinnati Retirement System shall not constitute a conflict of interest.
- iv. Residency shall not be considered as a qualification for any appointed member.
- v. A current or former elected city official appointed as a member of the board pursuant to this section does not have to meet the requirements of subsection b)i and b)ii of this section. No more than two current or former elected city officials appointed as members of the board pursuant to this section shall be eligible to simultaneously serve as members of the board.
- c) Board members shall serve four-year terms, except that:
 - i. when the Mayor makes initial appointments to the board under this Article, the Mayor shall appoint two members to serve four-year terms, and two members to serve two-year terms, so that the terms overlap to establish continuity in board membership from year to year.
 - ii. for the initial election of the board members elected pursuant to subsection a)ii of this section, the active employee candidate with the highest vote total shall serve a four-year term and the active employee candidate with the next highest vote total shall serve a two-year term.
 - iii. for the initial election of the board members elected pursuant to subsection a)iii of this section, the two retiree candidates with the two highest vote totals shall serve four-year terms and the retiree candidate with the third highest vote total shall serve a two-year term.
- d) Each board member may serve up to three four-year terms, either consecutive or non-consecutive, except that persons serving two-year terms upon their initial appointments to the board may serve the initial term and two subsequent four year terms.

- ed) Each board member shall hold office from the first date of the term until the end of the term for which the member was appointed. Any member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring before the expiration of the term for which the member's predecessor was appointed shall hold office for the remainder of the unexpired term. Any member shall continue in office after the expiration date of the member's term until the member's successor takes office, or until a period of thirty days has elapsed, whichever occurs first.
 - i. Appointed members: A vacancy on the board shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment.
 - ii. Elected members: If the remaining portion of the unexpired term is nine months or less, the position will remain vacant until the next regularly scheduled election. If the remaining portion of the unexpired term is more than nine months, an election to elect a new board member shall be held in accordance with the election rules promulgated by the board.
- fe) An entity authorized to appoint or elect a member under subsection a) shall remove its appointee or representative from the board for any act of misconduct involving the trustee's duties, including breach of fiduciary duty and failure to properly discharge the duties of the trustee, to the extent permitted by state law.
- The board shall meet regularly and shall convene other meetings at the request of the chairperson or a majority of the members. A member who fails to attend at least two-thirds of the regular and special meetings of the board during any two-year period forfeits membership on the board.
- hg) The board shall report to council at least annually on the following issues:
 - i. Success at meeting the investment and funding objectives.
 - ii. Investment performance and attribution.
 - iii. Compliance with conflict of interest and ethics policies.
 - iv. Compliance with benefit delivery policies.
 - v. Results of external and internal audit findings and follow-up efforts.
 - vi. Board member attendance, travel, and educational efforts.
- <u>ih</u>) The board shall vote to disqualify any candidate from seeking election to the board or any member from remaining as a board trustee for any of the following reasons:
 - i. Finding of dishonesty in any civil proceeding or disciplinary decision.
 - ii. Conviction of a felony for an act committed while the candidate or member was an adult.

Connected Communities is one of the most ambitious and expansive pieces of legislation in recent history. The goals and aims of it are in alignment with the values of equity, sustainability, and growth, and the City

needs to ensure that the outcomes of the legislation are in alignment with that vision. At the center is the aim to make housing construction easier and more streamlined, resulting in more housing being built across the city. This intentional data tracking will help course-correct or drive additional investment if necessary, as well as have a better understanding of how the policy is shaping growth throughout Cincinnati.

The City has already begun the process of tracking Housing Unit Activity and Affordable Housing on CincyInsights, but there is room for further data collection to be precise about the development activity happening in neighborhoods as a *direct* result of the passage of Connected Communities. Additionally, there is ongoing work on tracking quality of life issues in the neighborhoods via CincyInsights. These efforts in coordination should give a wholistic picture of change that is occurring across the city so Council can set future policy and investments in an informed and equitable manner.

Council at its session on May 30, 2024, referred the following item for review and report.

MOTION, dated May 14, 2024, submitted by Councilmember Jeffreys, WE MOVE that the Administration reports back to Council in 60 days on the legal and financial implications of the proposed Charter amendment submitted on January 22, 2024, pertaining to Cincinnati's participation in its Metropolitan Planning Organization.

INTRODUCTION

A local organization called the Cincinnati Coalition for Transit and Sustainable Development is seeking an amendment to the City's Charter that would make the City's membership in the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments ("OKI") conditioned on OKI's amendment of its rules to provide proportional representation, under a theory that it would increase the City's weight in OKI's decision-making process. If OKI does not agree to alter its structure, the proposed Charter language might force the City to withdraw from OKI.

The City has received hundreds of millions of dollars in federal transportation funding through OKI in recent years. In addition, the Department of Transportation and Engineering relies on OKI and its professional staff for valuable expertise and support.

While the legal implications of a successful ballot measure are not certain, there is no viable alternative to OKI. The City's withdrawal from OKI would result in a significant loss of crucial transportation funding for the City, remove the City from the regional transportation planning process, and cause additional expenses for the City.

BACKGROUND

1. <u>The Proposed Charter Amendment</u>

The Cincinnati Coalition for Transit and Sustainable Development is sponsoring an election campaign financed by the Devou Good Foundation titled "Fair Share for Cincy" to place a ballot measure on the November ballot. The ballot measure would amend the City's Charter in an effort to mandate proportional representation at OKI, which is the region's Metropolitan Planning Organization ("MPO") for federally funded transportation planning.

The proposed amendment reads as follows:

Article XVII – Membership in a Metropolitan Planning Organization

- (1) The City may commence or maintain membership in a Metropolitan Planning Organization ("MPO") only when both of the following conditions are met: (a) the voting power of the governing board of the MPO is apportioned proportionally based on population, not including those statutorily-required voting members; and (b) members that represent local governments have at least 90% of the total votes on the governing board.
- (2) In the event that an MPO does not comply with section (1) of this Article, the City shall withdraw its membership from the body if the voting system is not corrected within 60 days of the effective date of this Article.

2. OKI's Creation and Structure

MPOs are creatures of federal statute, primarily under 23 U.S.C. Section 134 and 23 C.F.R. Section 450. An MPO is recognized as the entity that facilitates regional planning of transportation projects funded with federal dollars. 23 U.S.C. Section 134. MPOs are designated by agreement between the Governor and local governmental units representing at least 75 percent of the population, "including the largest incorporated city." 49 U.S.C. Section 5303(d)(1); 23 C.F.R. Section 450.310(b).

OKI was formed by eight member counties situated in Ohio, Kentucky, and Indiana. The founding counties adopted Articles of Agreement signed by the Governors of the three states. OKI also adopted By-Laws that designate 118 participants as members of OKI's Board of Directors, including 46 municipalities and multiple planning commissions, chambers of commerce, public transit authorities, state departments of

transportation, and environmental organizations. https://www.oki.org/about/the-oki-region/.

The Articles of Agreement provide that Cincinnati gets two seats on OKI's Board of Directors, including one elected official and one representative from the Planning Commission. Articles, Art. III.B.1.b and 1.e. Each member of the Board of Directors gets one vote and serves a one-year term. Articles, Art. III.B.4; By-Laws Article I, Section 2.g.

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS OF PASSAGE

If the Charter amendment passes, it is unlikely that OKI will agree to change its rules to give the City proportional representation. Amending the rules would require unanimous agreement of at least the eight founding counties and the Governors of the three states, if not all 118 members of the Board of Directors. 23 C.F.R. Section 450.310(j).

Importantly, there is not an alternative vehicle similar to OKI through which the City could obtain significant federal transportation funding. In addition, the City would most likely not be able to form its own MPO separate from OKI. Federal regulations favor only one MPO in a region. 23 C.F.R. Section 450.310(e) ("To the extent possible, only one MPO shall be designated for each urbanized area."). Further, designating a second MPO for the region would require the unanimous approval of OKI and the three Governors. *Id.* Neither OKI nor the governors would have any incentive to approve a second MPO.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

1. Recent Funding From OKI

The City of Cincinnati has approximately 18% of the OKI Ohio population. From 2010-2028, the residents of the City have benefitted from approximately 31% (\$233.9 million of \$745 million) of OKI's Ohio funds. If the City were not permitted to participate in OKI, funding could decrease. To illustrate the potential impact, the following is a breakdown of recent funds:

- City of Cincinnati Direct Grants \$143.3 million
- Grants from other public agencies e.g. Hamilton County (the Banks, Western Hills Viaduct, etc.) \$8.6 million
- MLK Interchange (SIB loan) \$9.8 million
- SORTA Grants within the City \$72.2 million

2. Additional Costs if the City is not Part of OKI

OKI provides many services to regional partners like the City at no cost. If the City leaves OKI and/or forms its own MPO, the costs for these services would be borne by the City. These services include the Long-Range Plan, the Travel Demand Model, and Air Quality and Congestion management, just to name a few, plus the cost to hire new staff.

CONCLUSION

Passage of the proposed Charter amendment could result in the City no longer receiving the benefits it has received by being part of OKI. These benefits include federal funds for City and regional projects, as well as services that are currently offered at no cost to the City.

The City Council at its session on April 24, 2024, adopted the following item:

MOTION, submitted by Councilmember Albi and Vice Mayor Kearney, WE MOVE that the City Administration prepare a report within 60 days to assess the feasibility of leveraging opt-intext messaging as a technology to better communicate with residents.

The purpose of this report is to provide pertinent information regarding the opt-intext messaging the City currently utilizes and communications enhancements underway.

BACKGROUND

The Telephone Consumer Protection Act (TCPA), enacted in 1991, restricts telemarketing calls, faxes and text messages. It specifically prohibits the use of auto dialers, artificial or prerecorded voice messages and text messages without prior express written consent from the recipient.

Key TCPA requirements include:

- 1. Obtaining prior express written consent from recipients before sending SMS messages.
- 2. Providing a clear and conspicuous disclosure that the recipient will receive future text messages.
- 3. Including an easy-to-use opt-out mechanism in every text message.

CINCYALERT

The City decided to partner with Hamilton County in 2018, using a common platform for Smart911, CincyAlert and Alert HC. This allows residents who work or live in one or both jurisdictions to maintain a single registration.

In the years following and due in part to capacity, the City primarily focused on promoting Smart911 as part of the ongoing work to improve the Emergency Communications Center (ECC). The ECC is responsible for sending CincyAlerts.

However, when City Manager Long was appointed in September 2022, she directed a renewed focus on promoting CincyAlert and revised internal operations to make better use of the system.

As stated in the background, the TCPA expressly prohibits the use of text messages without prior agreement by the recipient to opt-in. This opt-in mechanism is built into the CincyAlert system the City currently employs. More than 13,000 community members have created a file and opted in to emergency alerts through the system. Of those users, around 1,500 have also opted in to municipal alerts.

The City sends municipal alerts regarding topics such as City holidays, changes in trash pickup and road construction.

RECOMMENDATION

The City, under the direction of City Manager Long, has been strategically focused on identifying areas to improve communications and implementing updated communications policies. As such, the City Manager's Office has identified three strategic priorities that the Communications Office is prioritizing, including:

- 1. A new Strategic Communications Plan
- 2. A website and brand redesign
- 3. Updating City Hall Room 115 for improved internal and external communications functions

The City Manager's Communications staff has successfully completed the Strategic Communications Plan for the City and is currently training communications staff City-wide. A vendor has been selected for the website and brand redesign project and work will begin this fall. Additionally, plans have been finalized for the upgrades to Room 115 with work on that space also taking place this fall.

Considering the current capacity of City staff and the overall strategy to address communications, the Administration recommends continuing the current promotion of CincyAlerts to ensure the public is utilizing this critical communications resource both for emergency and municipal alerts. The City has been actively doing outreach on social media and through press announcements to encourage more community members to sign up for this service. The City welcomes support from Council members to publicly share this messaging. The Administration strongly recommends the continued use of CincyAlerts for text messaging services to avoid disparate systems, streamline communications and ensure we are capturing everyone who is interested in receiving information for both municipal and emergency alerts.

Attached is an Ordinance captioned:

MODIFYING Chapter 304, "Surety Bonds," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code by **AMENDING** Section 304-1, "Contractor's Bond," to remove language requiring approval as to form of personal and surety bonds, policies of insurance, and securities by the City Solicitor.

Approval of this Ordinance would modify Chapter 304, "Surety Bonds," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code to remove the requirement that the City Solicitor approve as to form personal or surety bonds or insurance policies that secure the performance of a contract with the City or compliance with any law regarding the deposit of money of the City. Section 304-1 currently does not require the City Solicitor to review surety bonds or insurance policies related to public vehicles, and this ordinance would remove the review and approval requirement for bonds and/or insurance policies required by other provisions of the Municipal Code, such as for street contractors and parking lot and garage operators. All surety bonds and insurance policies still must be approved as to sufficiency by the responsible departments.

MODIFYING Chapter 304, "Surety Bonds," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code by **AMENDING** Section 304-1, "Contractor's Bond," to remove language requiring approval as to form of personal and surety bonds, policies of insurance, and securities by the City Solicitor.

WHEREAS, Cincinnati Municipal Code ("CMC") Chapter 304-1, "Contractor's Bond," currently requires that the City Solicitor approve as to form all personal and surety bonds, policies of insurance, and securities required of City contractors, before such bonds, policies, or securities may be accepted; and

WHEREAS, the review of personal and surety bonds, policies of insurance, and securities as to form does not involve substantive legal review, but is instead limited to verification of signatures and dollar amounts; and

WHEREAS, CMC 304-1 currently requires personal and surety bonds, policies of insurance, and securities be reviewed and approved as to sufficiency by a designated officer or the Director of Finance, which adequately protects the City's financial interests, and those designative officers may ask the City Solicitor for advice regarding any legal issues concerning bonds or insurance policies that may arise; and

WHEREAS, to reduce redundancy and use City resources more efficiently, Council wishes to modify CMC 304-1 to eliminate mandatory, duplicative review of personal and surety bonds, policies of insurance, and securities by the City Solicitor; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That Section 304-1, "Contractor's Bond," of Chapter 304, "Surety Bonds," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 304-1. Contractor's Bond.

- (a) Except as provided in this section, every personal and surety bond, policy of insurance, and security, which law or ordinance may require any person, firm, or corporation to furnish to the city of Cincinnati as a condition of:
 - (1) the issuance, renewal, or reinstatement of a license or permit; or
 - (2) the exercise of a privilege; or
 - (3) as security for (i) the performance of a contract with the city or (ii) the compliance with any law, ordinance, or administrative requirement for the deposit of public moneys of the city,

shall be approved as to sufficiency by the officer designated for that purpose or by the director of finance, and as to form by the city solicitor, before such bond, policy, or security is accepted.

(b) The city solicitor is not required to approve as to form and legality the liability insurance policies provided to the city by public vehicle license applicants as required by Section 407-27 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code any personal or surety bond, policy of insurance, or security prior to its acceptance by the city, notwithstanding any such requirement within the municipal code or any provision of the Ohio Revised Code.

Section 2. That the proper City officials are authorized to take all necessary and proper actions to carry out the provisions of Section 1, including updating applicable rules and regulations and policies and procedures in accordance with the modifications to the Cincinnati Municipal Code provided for herein.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

MODIFYING Chapter 112, "Council Lobbying," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code, by ORDAINING Sections 112-1-C, "Clerk," 112-1-C2, "Client," and 112-1-R, "Regulated Official"; AMENDING Sections 112-1-A, "Actively Advocate," 112-1-C, "Compensation," 112-1-E1, "Engage," 112-1-F, "Financial Transaction," 112-1-L, "Legislation," 112-1-L1, "Legislative Agent," 112-1-P, "Person," 112-1-S, "Staff," 112-3, "Prohibitions," 112-5, "Registration of Legislative Agent and Employer," 112-7, "Statements of Financial Transactions," 112-11, "Exceptions," 112-15, "Lobbying Duties of the Clerk of Council," 112-17, "Powers of Office of Contract Compliance and Investigations," and 112-99, "Penalty"; and REPEALING Sections 112-1-E, "Employer," and 112-9, "Complaints; Liability for False Statement," all to streamline, update, and modernize the City's process for registering lobbyists.

Approval of this Ordinance would modify Chapter 112, "Lobbying" of the Cincinnati Municipal Code to streamline the registration process by moving it to an on-line system, adjusting the fees to reflect the current cost of services, and repealing as well as updating sections that are no longer sufficient.

WHEREAS, Chapter 112 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code requires that lobbyists who are compensated to lobby elected officials, members of their staffs, or certain City officials register with the Clerk of Council; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to streamline and update the lobbyist registration process, which has not been changed since 1997, to integrate intervening changes in the organization of the City administration, including the dissolution of the Office of Contract Compliance and Investigations and the creation of an Ethics and Good Government Counselor in the Law Department; and

WHEREAS, recent transparency initiatives require expansion of the registration and reporting requirements for lobbyists, requiring registration of those who lobby the City's independent boards, commissions, and advisory bodies; and

WHEREAS, there is also a need to revise the fee charged for lobbyist registration, which has not been updated since 1997, to take into account the increased costs associated with administering the registration process; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That new Sections 112-1-C, "Clerk," 112-1-C2, "Client," and 112-1-R, "Regulated Official," of Chapter 112, "Council Lobbying," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are ordained as follows:

Sec. 112-1-C. - Clerk.

"Clerk" means the clerk of council.

Sec. 112-1-C2. - Client.

"Client" means any person who, directly or indirectly, engages a lobbyist to actively advocate.

Sec. 112-1-R - Regulated Official.

"Regulated official" means the mayor, members of council, the city manager, assistant city managers, the director of any department created under the charter or administrative code of the city, and any person appointed by the mayor and council to any of the city's independent boards, commissions, or advisory bodies.

Section 2. That Sections 112-1-A, "Actively Advocate," 112-1-C, "Compensation," 112-1-E1, "Engage," 112-1-F, "Financial Transaction," 112-1-L, "Legislation," 112-1-L1, "Legislative Agent," 112-1-P, "Person," 112-1-S, "Staff," 112-3, "Prohibitions," 112-5, "Registration of Legislative Agent and Employer," 112-7, "Statements of Financial Transactions," 112-11, "Exceptions," 112-15, "Lobbying Duties of the Clerk of Council," 112-17, "Powers of Office of Contract Compliance and Investigations," and 112-99, "Penalty," of Chapter 112, "Council Lobbying," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are amended as follows:

Chapter 112 - Council Lobbying-Lobbyist Registration

Sec. 112-1-A. - Actively Advocate.

"Actively advocate" means to promote, advocate, or oppose the passage, modification, or defeat of any legislation by direct communication with any <u>regulated official or staff</u> member of the council or appointee of the council, the city manager, the director of any department listed in the Charter or Administrative Code of the City, or any member of the staff of any public officer or employee listed in this chapter. "Actively advocate" does not include the action of any person not engaged by an employer—who has a direct interest in legislation if the person and who, acting under Section 3 of Article article I₇ of the Ohio Constitution constitution, assembles together with other persons others to consult for their common good, instructs a public officer or employee who is listed in this chapter, or petitions that public officer or employee instruct a regulated official or staff member, or petition a regulated official or staff member for the redress of grievances, unless that person is engaged by a client for that purpose.

Sec. 112-1-C3. - Compensation.

"Compensation" means a salary, gift, payment, benefit, subscription, loan, advance, reimbursement, or deposit of money or anything of value; or a contract, promise, or agreement, whether or not legally enforceable, to make compensation provide a salary, gift, payment, benefit, subscription, loan, advance, reimbursement, or deposit of money or anything of value.

Sec. 112-1-E1. Engage; Engagement.

"Engage" means to make any arrangement, and "engagement" means any <u>such</u> arrangement, <u>whereby an individual is employed or retained-where a client employs or retains a lobbyist</u> for compensation to <u>act for or on behalf of an employer to</u> actively advocate.

Sec. 112-1-F. - Financial Transaction.

- (a) "Financial transaction" means a transaction or activity that is conducted or undertaken for profit and arises from the joint ownership, or the ownership or part ownership in common, of any real or personal property or any commercial or business enterprise, of whatever form or nature, between the following:
 - (1) A legislative agent, his or her employer, or a member of the immediate family of the legislative agent or his or her employer A lobbyist or client; and
 - (2) Any member of the council, appointee of the council, the city manager, the director of a department created under the Charter or Administrative Code of the City, or any member of the staff of a public officer or employee listed in this chapter Any regulated official or staff member.
- (b) For purposes of this section, if the lobbyist or client is an individual, "lobbyist" and "client" mean the individual, the individual's spouse, and the individual's dependent children. If the lobbyist or client is an entity, such as a limited liability company, corporation, partnership, trust, or unincorporated association, "lobbyist" and "client" mean the following:

(1) the entity itself;

- (2) the owners, members, or partners of such entity and their spouses and dependent children, provided that such owner, member, or partner owns or controls twenty percent or more of the entity; and
 - (3) the directors and principal officers of such entity and their spouses.

(c) "Financial transaction" does not include any transaction or activity described in this section if it is available to the general public on the same terms, or if it is an offer or sale of securities to any person listed in this chapter that is governed by regulation D, 17 C.F.R. 2301.501 to 2301.508, adopted under the authority of the "Securities Act of 1933," 48 Stat. 74, 15 U.S.C.A. and following, or that is governed by a comparable provision under state law.

Sec. 112-1-L. - Legislation.

"Legislation" means ordinances, resolutions, amendments, nominations, and any other matter pending before the council.

Sec. 112-1-L1. - Legislative Agent Lobbyist.

"Legislative agent Lobbyist" means any individual person, except a member of the council, a member of the staff of the council, or the city manager, who is engaged during at least a portion of his time by a client to actively advocate as one of his or her main purposes.

Sec. 112-1-P. - Person.

"Person" means any individual, <u>business</u>, <u>company</u>, <u>partnership</u>, trust, estate, business trust, association, <u>or corporation</u>, <u>or other legally recognized entity</u>; any labor organization or manufacturer association; any department, commission, board, <u>publicly supported</u> college-or, university, chapter, institution, bureau, or other instrumentality of the state; or any county, township, municipal corporation, school district, or other political <u>subchapter</u> subdivision of the state.

Sec. 112-1-S. - Staff.

"Staff" means council assistants those hired by members of council to work in their council offices and any city employee whose official duties are to formulate policy and who exercises administrative or supervisory authority or who authorizes the expenditure of city funds. "Staff" is limited to employees who are required to file a financial disclosure statement under Article article XXVI of the Administrative Code administrative code.

Sec. 112-3. - Prohibitions.

- (A<u>a</u>) No <u>legislative agent or employer <u>lobbyist</u> shall knowingly fail to register <u>an</u> engagement as required <u>under §</u> by section 112-5.</u>
- (<u>Bb</u>) No <u>person lobbyist</u> shall knowingly file a false statement that <u>fail to provide</u> information as required by <u>§ sections</u> 112-5 or 112-7 requires the person to file.
- (Cc) No person-lobbyist shall knowingly file a false statement that provide false information in response to the requirements of § sections 112-5 or 112-7 requires the person to file.

(d) No person shall knowingly cause a lobbyist to violate subsections (a), (b), or (c) of this section.

Sec. 112-5. - Registration of Legislative Agent and Employer Engagement and Updates.

- (Aa) Each legislative agent and employer lobbyist, within ten <u>business</u> days following an a client's engagement of a legislative agent the lobbyist, shall file register the engagement with the clerk of council an initial registration statement showing all of using the process and forms provided by the clerk and shall provide the following information:
 - (1) The name, business address, <u>phone number, email address,</u> and occupation of the <u>legislative agent lobbyist</u>;
 - (2) The name-and, business address, phone number, email address, and principal business of the employer-client on whose behalf the legislative agent lobbyist is actively advocating. For, except that, for the purposes of this section, where a trade association or other charitable or fraternal organization that is exempt from federal income taxation under subsection 501(c) of the federal Internal Revenue Code is the employer-client, the statement need not list the names and addresses of each member of the association or organization, so long as the association or organization itself is listed.
 - (3) A brief—description of the type of legislation to which the engagement relates; and
 - (4) Other information as determined by the clerk.
- (Bb) In addition to the initial registration statement required by division (A) of this section, each legislative agent and employer shall file with the clerk of council not later than the last day of January and July of each year, an updated registration statement that confirms the continuing existence of each engagement described in an initial registration statement and that lists the specific ordinances or resolutions on which the agent actively advocated under that engagement during the period covered by the updated statement, and with it any statement detailing the financial transactions required to be filed by § 112-7. Each lobbyist shall update all registered engagements that have not been terminated, including those that have expired, not later than the last business day of January and July of each year, each update covering the period ending the last day of the previous December and June, respectively. Lobbyists shall provide such updates using the process and forms provided by the clerk. Each such update shall do the following:
 - (1) Confirm the continuing existence of each the engagement described in the initial registration;
 - (2) Confirm the accuracy of the information provided in the initial registration;

- (3) Identify the specific legislation regarding which the lobbyist actively advocated under the engagement during the previous six-month reporting period;
- (4) Identify any additional types of legislation to which the engagement is anticipated to relate within the next six-month reporting period, if the engagement has not expired or been terminated;
- (5) Provide the details of any financial transactions required to be reported by section 112-7; and
 - (6) Provide other information as determined by the clerk.
- (Cc) If a legislative agent is engaged by more than one employer, the agent shall file a separate initial and updated registration statement for each engagement. If an employer engages more than one legislative agent, the employer need file only one updated registration statement under division (B) of this section, which shall contain the information required by division (B) of this section regarding all of the legislative agents engaged by the employer.

(D)

- (1) A change in any information required by division (A)(1), (2), or (B) of this section shall be reflected in the next updated registration statement filed under division (B) of this section.
- (2) Within thirty—28 calendar days after the termination of an engagement, the legislative agent—lobbyist who was employed under the engagement shall send written notification of the termination to the clerk of council update the registration to reflect such termination and shall include in such update any information required to be provided in an update under subsection (b) of this section, for the period up to and including the date on which the engagement was terminated.
- (Ed) Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, the clerk shall charge a registration fee for a lobbyist's initial registration of \$25-an engagement. No fee shall be charged for filing an initial updating or terminating a registration. The clerk shall determine and adjust the amount of the fee annually based on the estimated operational cost of administering the lobbyist registration statement. All money collected from this registration fee shall be deposited to the credit of the council lobbying fund created under \$112-15-program, and the fee determined by the clerk shall be effective upon approval by the city manager. The clerk shall post the fee on the city's website. An The clerk shall not charge a fee to an officer or employee of a state agency or city department who actively advocates in his such person's fiduciary capacity as a representative of that state agency or city department need not pay the registration fee prescribed by this chapter. As used in this section, "state agency" does not include a state institution of higher education as defined in ORC § 3345.031 O.R.C. Section 3345.011.

- (Fe) A lobbyist's engagement is registered as required by this chapter when the lobbyist receives notice from the clerk confirming the Upon registration pursuant to division (A) of this section, the legislative agent shall be issued a card by the clerk of council showing that the legislative agent is registered. The registration card and the legislative agent's registration shall be valid from the date of their issuance such registration confirmation is received until the next thirtieth last business day of November of an each odd-numbered year, at which time it shall expire unless earlier terminated pursuant to subsection (c) of this section.
- (Gf) The clerk of council shall be responsible for reviewing review each registration statement filed under and update required by this section and for determining to determine whether the statement registration or update contains all of the information required by this section, except that the clerk shall not be required to review information reported regarding financial transactions or contact or attempt to contact lobbyists regarding the reporting of financial transactions.
 - (1) If the clerk of council determines that the registration statement or update does not contain all of the required information or, the clerk shall make a reasonable attempt to contact the lobbyist using the contact information provided in the deficient registration or update, to notify the lobbyist of the deficiency.
 - (2) The clerk shall have no responsibility to inform lobbyists of their duties under this chapter, but if the clerk determines that a legislative agent or employer lobbyist has failed to file-register or provide a registration statement an update as required by this chapter, the clerk of council shall send written notification by certified mail to the person who filed the registration statement regarding the deficiency in the statement or to the person who failed to file the registration statement regarding the failure make a reasonable attempt to contact the lobbyist using whatever information is available to notify the lobbyist of the failure to register or update a registration.
- (g) Within 21 calendar days of the clerk's attempt to notify a lobbyist of a deficient registration or failure to register or update a registration, such lobbyist shall properly register or update the registration Any person so notified by the clerk of council shall, not later than 15 days after receiving the notice, file a registration statement or an amended registration statement that does contain all of so that it contains the information required by this section. If any person who receives a notice lobbyist whom the clerk has made a reasonable attempt to contact under this chapter fails to file properly register or update a registration statement or such an amended registration statement within this 15-day period the required time, the clerk of council shall notify the Office of Contract Compliance and Investigations (OCCI) refer such person to the ethics and good government counselor in the department of law, who may shall take appropriate action as authorized or required under § by section 112-17. If the clerk of council notifies OCCI under this chapter refers a person to the ethics and good government counselor, the clerk of council shall also notify in writing the city manager and each member of the council in writing of the pending investigation referral.

(Hh) On or before the 15th day of March of each year, the clerk of council shall, in the manner and form that he or she determines, publish a report containing statistical information on the registration statements filed under this section during the preceding year. The clerk shall provide any information received regarding unreported or improperly reported financial transactions to the ethics and good government counselor, who shall take appropriate action pursuant to section 112-17.

Sec. 112-7. - Statements Reporting of Financial Transactions.

- (A) Any legislative agent who has had any financial transaction with or for the benefit of any member of the council or appointee of the council, the city manager, or the director of a department created under the Charter or the Administrative Code of the City, or any member of the staff of any public officer or employee listed in this chapter, shall describe the details of the transaction, including the name of the public officer or employee, the purpose and nature of the transaction, and the date it was made or entered into, in a statement filed with the clerk of council with the updated registration statement required by division (B) of § 112-5. The statement shall be filed at the times specified in § 112-5. Each statement shall describe each financial transaction that occurred during the six calendar month period that ended on the last day of the month immediately preceding the month in which the statement is required to be filed.
- (B) Except as provided in division (D) of this section, any employer who has had any financial transaction with or for the benefit of any member of the council or appointee of the council, the city manager, or the director of a department created under the Charter or the Administrative Code of the City, or any member of the staff of any public officer or employee listed in this chapter, shall describe the details of the transaction, including the name of the public officer or employee, the purpose and nature of the transaction, and the date it was made or entered into, in a statement filed with the clerk of council with the updated registration statement required by § 112–5(b). The statement shall be filed at the times specified in § 112–5. Each statement shall describe each financial transaction that occurred during the six-calendar-month period that ended on the last day of the month immediately preceding the month in which the statement is required to be filed.
- (C) An employer or legislative agent who is required to file a statement describing a financial transaction under this section shall deliver a copy of the statement to the public officer or employee with whom or for whose benefit the transaction was made at least ten days before the date on which the statement is filed.
- (D) No employer shall be required to file any statement under this section or to deliver a copy of the statement to a public officer or employee with whom or for whose benefit the transaction was made if the financial transaction to which the statement pertains is reported by a legislative agent engaged by the employer.
- (a) Concurrent with each update to a registration required by section 112-5(b) and (c), lobbyists shall report all financial transactions occurring during the period the

update covers using the process and forms provided by the clerk. Lobbyists shall provide the following information:

- (1) The name of the lobbyist, client, or other person involved in the financial transaction;
- (2) The name of the regulated official or staff member for whose benefit the transaction was entered into;
 - (3) The purpose and nature of the transaction;
 - (4) The actual or anticipated value of the transaction;
 - (5) The date the transaction was made or entered into; and
 - (6) Other information as determined by the clerk.
- (b) The clerk shall require lobbyists to certify with each update that they have inquired of their clients and all relevant persons whose financial transactions are potentially reportable regarding an engagement whether any financial transactions have occurred during the reporting period and that the lobbyist has reported all such information, including information the lobbyist reports on the lobbyist's own behalf, truthfully and accurately.

Sec. 112-11. - Exceptions.

- (Aa) Sections 112-5 and 112-7 do not apply to <u>efforts to persons who</u> actively advocate by any of the following solely through any of the following:
 - (1) Appearances before meetings of the committees of the council or the full council, and or appearances before public hearings of the committees of the council; or
 - (2) News, editorial, and advertising statements Statements or articles published in bona fide newspapers, journals, or magazines, or through publicly accessible media, whether print, broadcast over radio or television, or online, and whether directly or through intermediaries;
 - (3) The gathering and furnishing of information and news by bona fide reporters, correspondents, or news bureaus to news media described in division (A)(2) of this section;
 - (4) Publications primarily designed for and distributed to members of bona fide associations or charitable or fraternal nonprofit corporations.

- (<u>Bb</u>) Sections 112-1 to 112-17 do not <u>affect apply to professional</u> services <u>provided in drafting ordinances</u> or resolutions, preparing arguments thereon, or in advising clients and rendering opinions as to the construction and the effect of proposed or pending legislation, if the services are not otherwise connected with actions to actively advocate.
- (Cc) Nothing in §§ sections 112-1 to 112-17 shall require the reporting of, or prohibit a member of the council from, prohibits any elected official from soliciting or accepting, or requires reporting of, a contribution from or expenditure by any person-if the, provided that such contribution or expenditure is reported in accordance with Chapters 115 and 117 of the Municipal Code otherwise subject to disclosure under applicable city law, including the charter.

Sec. 112-15. Lobbying Duties of the Clerk of Council-Regarding Lobbyists.

- (A) —The clerk of council-shall keep on file the statements establish processes and forms for the collection and maintenance of the registrations and updates required by \$\frac{\frac{8}}{2}\$ 112-5 and 112-7 of the Municipal Code this chapter. The clerk may promulgate and revise rules and regulations to achieve the purposes of this chapter, which shall become effective when approved by the city manager and posted on the city's website. Those statements—The registrations and updates required by this chapter, including reporting of financial transactions, are public records—and open to public inspection, and the clerk of council—shall computerize them so that the information contained in them—digitize the information submitted so that it is readily accessible to the general public. The clerk shall provide copies of the statements to the general public upon request and may charge a reasonable fee not to exceed the cost of copying and delivering each statement.
- (B) The clerk of council shall prescribe and make available an appropriate form for filing the information required by §§ 112-5 and 112-7 of the Municipal Code. The form shall contain the following notice in boldface type The clerk shall notify every person submitting any information required by this chapter of the following: "ANY PERSON WHO KNOWINGLY FILES A FALSE STATEMENT IS GUILTY OF FALSIFICATION UNDER SECTION 2921.13 OF THE REVISED CODE, WHICH IS A MISDEMEANOR OF THE FIRST DEGREE."
- (C) The clerk of council shall publish a handbook that explains in clear and concise language §§ 112-1 to 112-17 and 112-99 of the Municipal Code and make it available free of charge to members of the council, legislative agents, employers, and any other interested persons.
- (D) Not later than the last day of February and October of each year, the clerk of council shall compile from registration statements a complete and updated list of registered legislative agents and their employers and distribute the list to each member of the council and the city manager. The clerk shall provide copies of the list to the general public upon request and may charge a reasonable fee not to exceed the cost of copying and delivering the list.

- (E) The clerk of council may adopt rules as necessary to implement §§ 112-1 to 112-17, and any such rules adopted shall be adopted in accordance with ORC § 111.15.
- (F) The clerk of council shall exercise the powers and duties prescribed under §§ 112-1 to 112-17.
- (G) There is hereby created in the city treasury the Council Lobbying Fund No. 396. All money collected from registration fees prescribed under § 112-5 shall be deposited into the city treasury to the credit of the fund. Money credited to the fund and any interest and earnings from the fund shall be used solely for conducting the lobbying duties of the clerk of council and for the purchase of data storage and computerization facilities for the statements filed with the clerk under §§ 112-5 and 112-7.
- (H) The clerk of council shall issue a written report, not later than the thirty-first day of January of each year, to the mayor that lists the number of filings received during the immediately preceding calendar year.

Sec. 112-17. - Powers of Office of Contract Compliance and Investigations Action on Referrals for Investigation.

The Office of Contract Compliance and Investigations may ethics and good government counselor shall investigate compliance a referral received from the clerk regarding noncompliance with §§ 112-1 to 112-15 and this chapter or with ORC-O.R.C. Section 2921.13 of the Revised Code in connection with statements required to be filed under these sections and, in the event of an apparent violation,. The ethics and good government counselor shall report his or her the factual findings of any such investigation to the prosecuting attorney of involved parties, the city manager, and the City or of Hamilton County clerk, who shall institute such proceedings as are appropriate make such reports publicly available. The ethics and good government counselor shall report factual findings regarding criminal conduct to the appropriate authorities.

Sec. 112-99. - Penalty.

Whoever violates $\frac{\$-\text{section}}{\$-\text{section}}$ 112-5 (Aa), (Bb), (Cc), or (Dd) is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree.

Section 3. That existing Sections 112-1-E, "Employer," and 112-9, "Complaints; Liability for False Statement," of Chapter 112, "Council Lobbying," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are hereby repealed in their entirety.

Section 4. That the proper City officials are authorized to do all things necessary and proper to carry out the terms of Sections 1 through 3, including the promulgation and adoption of rules and regulations as provided therein.

(PLAs) for City Construction Projects

Ref. Document #202401150

At its session on April 24, 2024, the City Council referred for review and report:

MOTION, submitted by Councilmembers Johnson, Walsh, Owens and Jeffreys, WE MOVE that the Administration produces a report within ninety (90) days on the pros and cons of Project Labor Agreement (PLAs). This report should include potential impacts on worker wages, labor availability, project costs, project efficiency, worker safety, workforce diversity, the bidding process, and any other relevant information. It should also include the historic context of any other similar policies implemented or studied by the City. (STATEMENT ATTACHED)

Introduction

As defined by the US Department of Labor, Project Labor Agreements are pre-hire collective bargaining agreements with one or more labor organizations that establish the terms and conditions of employment for a specific construction project. These agreements, negotiated between construction unions and employers, include provisions such as binding clauses for all contractors and subcontractors, no-strike and no-lockout clauses, and established grievance and arbitration procedures. PLAs also determine the wages and benefits for all project workers and require contractors to source labor through a union hiring hall responsible for providing skilled workers. PLAs can include goals for hiring local community members, equity plans, strategies for recruiting workers from underserved communities, and mandates for small business participation.

Additional Context on PLAs

PLAs often mandate or encourage union participation. A "signatory" contractor is one that has signed an agreement with a labor union, outlining employment terms such as wages, hours, benefits, and other workplace rules. Being a signatory means that a contractor has agreed to work under the terms of a union agreement, which can impact their hiring practices, subcontracting policies, and overall project management. As signatory contractors to the associated union, their project labor agreements impose strict rules on subcontracting:

- Under a project labor agreement (PLA), they cannot subcontract work that falls under the jurisdiction covered by the PLA to any non-signatory contractor.
- Subcontractors become subject to the terms and provisions of the PLA.

Union Membership in Construction Industry

According to the Union Membership and Coverage Database and a 2023 report published by Allied Construction Industries and the University of Cincinnati's Economics Center, the union membership rate for the construction industry in Cincinnati's MSA is estimated to be about 10.5%.

Advantages:

- Standardized Wages and Benefits: PLAs ensure uniform wages, benefits, and working conditions across all contractors and subcontractors.
- Labor Peace and Stability: PLAs typically include no-strike clauses, reducing the risk of labor disputes and work stoppages.
- Skilled Workforce: PLAs often require the use of union labor, ensuring a pool of skilled and trained workers.
- Timely Project Completion: Reduced likelihood of delays due to labor disputes can lead to ontime project completion.
- Safety Standards: PLAs often include stringent safety standards and training programs.
- Enhanced Cooperation: Facilitates better coordination and cooperation among contractors, unions, and the project owner.
- Local Hiring Requirements: Can include provisions for hiring local workers, promoting local employment.
- Apprenticeship Programs: Supports training and apprenticeship programs, fostering the development of future skilled workers.

Disadvantages:

- Limited Competition: Restricts bidding to unionized contractors, potentially reducing the pool of bidders and increasing project costs.
- Exclusion of Non-Union Workers: Non-union contractors and workers may be excluded, limiting opportunities for some local businesses.
- Administrative Complexity: Implementing and managing PLAs can add administrative burdens and complexity to the project.
- Potential for Increased Disputes: While PLAs aim to reduce disputes, differences in interpretation of PLA terms can still lead to conflicts.
- Reduced Flexibility: PLAs may limit flexibility in hiring practices and workforce management.
- Impact on Small Businesses: Small, non-union businesses may find it difficult to compete or participate in PLA-covered projects.

Outreach:

The Department of Economic Inclusion conducted a survey with city-certified businesses and union partners to gauge the knowledge level and opinions on PLAs. The survey consisted of 10 impartial questions of which 4 were yes or no answers, 5 questions provided the opportunity for written answers, and one question asked the participant to leave any additional thoughts or comments. DEI's intention was to gather feedback on PLAs through a diversity and inclusion perspective for both small businesses and members of the workforce. In total, DEI received responses from 45 individuals. A summary of the findings can be provided upon request.

PLA's Impact on Cost

There is minimal city procurement data supporting the increased costs that PLAs might impose on projects, primarily due to the lack of recent projects utilizing PLAs.

Conclusion

Many city-certified SBEs, MBEs, and WBEs are not union-affiliated. Thus, requiring prime contractors to meet all PLA criteria may inadvertently exclude non-signatory subcontractors, regardless of their certification status.

Since the establishment of the Department of Economic inclusion in 2015, the City has worked diligently to lower the barriers to prime contract and subcontract participation on City contracts historically faced by minority-owned and women-owned businesses. There is an affirmative legislative finding in Chapter 324 of the Municipal Code that "it is in the best interest of the city to adopt measures to eliminate barriers that prohibit full and fair participation of MBEs and WBEs in city contracts." (CMC § 324-5(4)) However, without a thorough analysis on a project-by-project basis, a broad blanket approach to PLAs may unintentionally replace old barriers with new ones.

Potential Project Labor Agreement (PLA) requirements conflict significantly with both the stated legislative purpose and the specific provisions of the MBE/WBE Program, which was designed to remedy existing disparities in city contracting with minority-owned and women-owned firms. While both PLAs and the MBE/WBE Program serve important purposes, PLAs cannot be broadly applied to construction projects without substantially undermining the MBE/WBE Program. They also have the potential to reverse much of the economic inclusion progress made in the past nine years. A case-by-case approach to determine whether a project is suitable for a PLA, coupled with increased education and outreach, is advisable.

WHEREAS, Cincinnati Municipal Code ("CMC") Sections 714-99, "Penalties - Civil and Criminal," and 731-99, "Penalties - Civil and Criminal," currently require that all civil fines collected under Chapters 714 and 731 be deposited into a private lot abatement fund to support abatement activities and enforcement of Chapters 714 and 731; and

WHEREAS, a private lot abatement fund currently does not exist because abatement activities and code enforcement under the Private Lot Abatement Program only recently has begun to generate revenue; and

WHEREAS, because reduction in the amount of debris entering and potentially damaging the storm water system is beneficial to the maintenance of the stormwater system, the Department of Buildings and Inspections utilizes Stormwater Management Fund 107 resources for its Private Lot Abatement Program; and

WHEREAS, CMC 720-51 requires the deposit of revenue raised on behalf of the Stormwater Management Utility to be deposited in a stormwater fund for utility division purposes; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to amend CMC Sections 714-99 and 731-99 to remove the requirement that civil fines collected under Chapters 714 and 731 be deposited into a private lot abatement fund and to require the deposit of Private Lot Abatement Program revenue into Stormwater Management Fund 107; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That Sections 714-99, "Penalties - Civil and Criminal," of Chapter 714, "Littering," and 731-99, "Penalties – Civil and Criminal," of Chapter 731, "Weed Control," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 714-99. Penalties—Civil and Criminal.

(a) Violation of Section 714-5, 714-7, 714-9, 714-23, 714-24, 714-29, or 714-31 is a Class A1 Civil Offense.

- (b) Violation of Section 714-3, 714-17, 714-19, 714-21, 714-25, 714-27, or 714-33 is a Class B1 Civil Offense. Subsequent violation of these code provisions will constitute an additional Class B1 Civil Offense except for a subsequent violation of Section 714-33, which constitutes a Class C1 Civil Offense.
- (c) Violation of Section 714-11, 714-13, 714-15, 714-35, 714-37, or 714-39 is a Class C1 Civil Offense.
- (d) Any civil fines collected under this chapter shall be deposited into the private lot abatement fund to support Sections 714-45 and 714-46 abatement activities and enforcement of Chapter 714 Stormwater Management Fund 107 in accordance with CMC 720-51.
- (e) As an alternative to a notice of civil offense and civil fine, a violation of:
 - 1) Section 714-7 of this chapter may be cited as a misdemeanor of the first degree and shall carry with it a mandatory fine of \$1,000.
 - 2) Section 714-3, 714-13 or 714-19 of this chapter may be cited as a misdemeanor of the third degree and shall carry with it a mandatory fine of \$500.
 - 3) Any other provision of this chapter may be cited as a minor misdemeanor if it is a first offense which shall carry a mandatory fine of \$150, and a misdemeanor of the fourth degree if it is a second offense which shall carry a mandatory fine of \$250.
- (f) If an offender of Section 714-35, 714-37 or 714-39 has been previously convicted of violating Section 714-35, 714-37 or 714-39 of this chapter, the offender is guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree which shall carry a mandatory fine of \$1,000.

Sec. 731-99. Penalties—Civil and Criminal.

- (a) Any violation of the height restrictions specified in Section 731-3 shall constitute a Class C1 civil offense on the first day after the owner or person in charge of the property has received notice under Section 731-5 and Section 1501-13.
- (b) Any civil fines collected under this Chapter shall be deposited into the private lot abatement fund to support Section 731-9 and Section 731-10 abatement activities and enforcement of Chapter 731 Stormwater Management Fund 107 in accordance with CMC 720-51.

- (c) As an alternative to a notice of civil offense and civil fine, a violation of any provision of this Chapter is a minor misdemeanor.
- (d) If the offender has been previously convicted of violating any Section of this Chapter, a subsequent violation is a misdemeanor of the fourth degree.

Subject: Cincinnati Futures Commission – Response and Next Steps

On May 8, 2024, the City Council referred the following item for report:

MOTION, submitted by Mayor Aftab Pureval, WE MOVE that the Administration provide a report in 60 days regarding the "Cincinnati Futures Commission, A Vision for the Future Cincinnati" recommendations. This report will allow the Mayor and Council to be intentional around the recommendations that require policy guidance. (BALANCE OF STATEMENT ON FILE)

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this report is to respond to the Mayor's motion regarding the Cincinnati Futures Commission report. The Mayor and Council have made clear that their overarching goal for the City is equitable growth—growing our entire City in a way that drives increased economic prosperity but also leaves no one behind. To accomplish that goal, the City must have a strong financial footing so we can provide excellent city services and invest in our neighborhoods and residents.

I want to acknowledge the foresight and leadership of our Mayor in convening this commission, and I want to thank the business, labor, and civic leaders who volunteered their time to take on our most difficult challenges and recommend strategies for our City to thrive.

The hard work of the Commission has produced a robust and thoughtful road map for improving the finances of the City and for Cincinnati's continued growth. This report lays out proposed next steps for undertaking and vetting the Futures Commission recommendations. In this report, the recommendations are organized into three sections:

Section I – Recommendations Completed or Underway

Section II - Recommendations Requiring Additional Policy Guidance or a Vote of the Electorate

Section III – Recommendations Requiring Additional Due Diligence

As described below, work on a significant portion of the recommendations is either underway or even completed. This consistency of vision is notable and provides significant momentum for implementation of many recommendations. The recommendations addressed in Sections II and III will require additional public conversation, vetting, and decision-making. The Administration looks forward to working in tight coordination with our elected officials on those efforts.

I. Recommendations Completed or Underway

It is encouraging that many of the recommendations from the Futures Commission report are aligned with existing long-term Administration initiatives and policy initiatives, many that have been underway for one or more years. Of the twenty-five enumerated recommendations in the report, fourteen (56%) of the report recommendations are underway or completed.

<u>Connected Communities and Update Plan Cincinnati – Page 24</u>

The Futures Commission report supports passage of the Connected Communities legislation as well as recommends an update to Plan Cincinnati.

Over the last two years under the leadership of Mayor Aftab, Councilmember Harris, and Councilmember Cramerding, Connected Communities was thoughtfully developed. The policy includes pro-growth changes to equitably move our City forward. City Council considered and approved that legislation on June 5, 2024.

Plan Cincinnati is the City's comprehensive plan, and it has not been updated in over a decade. The City's FY 2025 Budget Update includes resources for undertaking a full update to Plan Cincinnati. The update process is being planned now and will be launched later in this fiscal year.

Industrial Redevelopment for Job Creation - Page 29

The Futures Commission report recommends investing resources to acquire and improve sites to support commercial and industrial development that will create good jobs. This is a strategy that is in line with previous actions of the Mayor and Council, with \$7 million in resources allocated in FY23 to an initiative with the Port Authority for industrial site acquisition and redevelopment and an additional \$1.3 million allocated to the same initiative in FY24. Those resources are still being deployed. Before allocating additional resources to this initiative, the Administration recommends completing the process to clearly establish strategic economic development objectives for the City, as discussed in detail in Section II of this report, and reviewing the structure and impact of the previous investment.

Neighborhood Growth Funding - Page 34

The Futures Commission report recommends investing additional resources to support development projects in neighborhoods, suggesting \$5 million annually for 10 years. The FY 2025 Budget Update includes over \$6.2 million in new resources to support this use, including an additional \$1 million allocated to the Neighborhood Business District Improvement Program, \$1 million for strategic acquisitions by the City, \$1 million for the new Quick Strike Fund, and another approximately \$3.2 million allocated to additional neighborhood development initiatives. These additional resources build on investments made over the past few years by the Mayor and Council for neighborhood growth by increasing funding to existing programs, establishing new programs, and providing funding directly to community development corporation projects. New programs like the Neighborhood Catalytic Capital Improvement Fund, Empower Neighborhoods program, and the Quick Strike Fund are directly putting dollars towards the use recommended by the Futures Commission.

Affordable Housing Leverage Fund Investments - Page 35

The Futures Commission report recommends increasing funding to the Affordable Housing Leverage Fund to \$10 million per year. Over the last several years the Mayor and Council have significantly increased contributions to this initiative. In FY24, the City contributed \$6.5 million to the Affordable Housing Leverage Fund. In FY25, this amount is projected at approximately \$7 million per year—with \$1.9 million in the approved FY 2025 Budget Update as well as an additional \$5 million expected from the carryover in the fall. Increases in short-term rental registration revenues and the changes to the stabilization policy introduced by the Mayor in February of 2022 have enabled this increased contribution. In addition to the sources above, the City's VTICA (Voluntary Tax Incentive Contribution Agreement) program generates a small but growing amount of revenue for the Affordable Housing Leverage Fund each year.

Historic trends predict increasing short-term rental revenues and VTICA revenues. That growth will drive increased contributions to the Affordable Housing Leveraged Fund, in line with the report's recommendation.

<u>Homebase and Community Development Corporation (CDC) Capacity Building – Page</u> 36

The Futures Commission report recommends increased funding to support CDC capacity building. Recent and continuing funding by the Mayor and Council for this purpose demonstrates significant existing alignment on this recommendation.

Prior to 2023 the City typically provided about \$600,000 a year in operating support to Homebase and neighborhood community development corporations. Beginning in 2023 the City nearly doubled that annual operating support to approximately \$1.1

million per year. This is in addition to the millions of additional dollars that have been invested in project support.

Before allocating additional resources to this initiative, the Administration recommends completing the process to clearly establish strategic economic development objectives for the City, as discussed in detail in Section II of this report, and reviewing the structure and impact of the previous investment.

Equitable Economy Recommendations - Pages 36-38

To achieve a more equitable economy, the report recommends (1) The above discussed investment in industrial redevelopment and (2) Additional investment of \$2.5 million annually in the Lincoln and Gilbert initiative to support the growth of minority-owned businesses.

To date, the City has provided \$5 million to the Lincoln and Gilbert initiative. Further, the City has significantly invested in growing minority-owned businesses—both through investments with partners supporting minority-owned businesses as well as through providing additional resources and policies for economic development projects that support minority-owned businesses. Before allocating additional resources to this initiative, the Administration recommends completing the process to clearly establish strategic economic development objectives for the City, as discussed in detail in Section II of this report, and reviewing the structure and impact of the previous investment.

<u>Police and Fire Operational Studies – Pages 47-48</u>

The Futures Commission report recommends that the City engage in an in-depth study of police and fire operations. That process is underway with a contractor already engaged to assess facility and operational needs of both police and fire. The study is analyzing operations to benchmark against peers, identify industry best practices, and suggest any adjustments to facilities and staffing necessary to maintain and improve public safety services. The City has engaged a vendor and the FY 2025 Budget Update includes \$2 million to fully fund this study.

The project is broken out into five phases:

- Phase A: Data Collection, June 2024 July 2024
- Phase B: Space and Programming Needs Assessment, June 2024 October 2024
- Phase C: Facilities Condition Assessment, August 2024 January 2025
- Phase D: Sustainability Strategy, September 2024 December 2024
- Phase E: Public Safety Facilities Master Plan, January 2025 July 2025

The report also mentions increased use of civilians within Police. Police Chief Teresa Theetge is leading an ongoing effort to examine the use of civilians for the work of the Cincinnati Police Department (CPD). In the FY 2025 Budget Update, there are

personnel changes that will return four sworn officers to the street. The City has also proposed civilianization efforts through the ongoing collective bargaining negotiation process.

It is important to highlight that the Futures Commission report's discussion related to public safety does not fully account for the realities of the collective bargaining negotiation process. The report states that the City should maintain its annual expense growth for public safety at 2.7% (Page 45). This recommendation is not feasible, without forced staffing reductions. Police and Fire expenditure growth is largely driven by wage increases negotiated through the collective bargaining process, which is controlled by state law. In the absence of a negotiated agreement, wage increases are decided by a third-party in mediation. Over the last ten years, this process has driven an average expense growth rate of 3.6% per year for CPD and 4.9% per year for Fire. Any plan to create a more sustainable financial structure for the City must account for the realities of collective bargaining.

Billing for Emergency Medical Services (EMS) – Page 48

The Futures Commission report recommends that the City adjust its policies around EMS fees and reimbursement to increase revenues, specifically by accessing additional federal funds through the Ground Emergency Medical Transport program. To do this, the State of Ohio must expand Medicaid benefits to encompass this program, and the City is underway in working with its lobbyist to advocate for this expansion. Additionally, in alignment with the stated goal of the recommendation, the City has already reviewed and updated its EMS billing rates.

Performance Management and Performance-Based Budgeting – Page 54

The Futures Commission report generally recommends leveraging data to improve public services—mentioning specifically applications for the Department of Public Services as well as budgeting. The Administration has been hard at work on this for several years and continues to make great strides, in line with the recommendation.

The adoption of data-based management practices has been a primary strategic goal of the Administration for City operations. These efforts include implementing a rigorous performance management process and putting the City on a three-year plan to migrate from pure continuation budgeting to performance-based budgeting.

The recommendation for use of performance management to improve Fleet operations is also aligned with ongoing efforts. The Administration has been working over the last two years to modernize our fleet management and routing processes—including investments in technology and staffing. The FY2025 Budget Update includes a new data analyst position to further this work.

This progress lays a deep foundation for lasting operational improvements, and the City appreciates the Futures Commission report's recommendation and recognition of this work's value.

Gainsharing - Page 55

The report recommends the adoption of a gainsharing strategy — a process by which employees who reduce costs while maintaining service standards can receive a share of the savings from increased operational efficiency. The City is employing a version of gainsharing strategy in its Green Cincinnati Revolving Loan Fund, where Departments can re-capture operating funds saved via sustainability projects. The FY 2025 Budget Update includes a significant contribution to this revolving loan fund.

The report identifies other opportunities to employ a gainsharing strategy to create additional operating efficiencies. The City Administration will work internally to identify feasible opportunities, including for fleet maintenance.

Cincinnati Southern Railway Recommendations – Pages 65-67

The Futures Commission report acknowledges the forthcoming benefits stemming from the sale of the Cincinnati Southern Railway. The report recommends focusing investment on road repaving; pedestrian-friendly infrastructure; and parks, recreation, and public safety facilities. It also recommends focusing investments on projects that will create operating budget savings.

In the FY 2025 Budget Update, the City laid out the first installment of the Cincy On Track initiative, an effort to provide a high-level of transparency on investment of the proceeds from the sale of the railway. Of the \$29.2 million available for this year, 59.7% is being invested in road and bridge repair projects—including pedestrian-friendly infrastructure such as the Complete Streets overhaul of Victory Parkway. The remaining resources are split among investments in parks, recreation, health, and other city facilities. These investments closely track the recommendation from the report.

FY26 will be the first year where the City expects to see a substantial increase in capital resources from the sale of the Cincinnati Southern Railway. To prepare the Administration continues to enhance the structure, sophistication, and transparency of capital resource allocation decisions. The report's recommendations will be incorporated into those efforts.

<u>Admission Tax Changes – Page 70</u>

The Futures Commission report recommends changing the City's Admission Tax to better capture revenue from resale of tickets through third-party resellers. In January of 2024, Council approved an amendment to the Cincinnati Municipal Code to accomplish this.

Parking Enforcement and Meters – Page 71

The Futures Commission report recommends increasing parking enforcement, expanding parking meter assets, and removing peak hour parking restrictions.

Work on increasing parking enforcement has been well underway for over a year through an Administration initiative to identify service delivery challenges and opportunities for increased efficiency and revenue generation. This work resulted in a staffing proposal that was included in the FY 2025 Budget Update. By converting existing, vacant part-time positions to full-time positions, adding four Parking Enforcement Officers, and filling all current vacant Parking Enforcement Officer positions, the City has more than doubled the number of deployed Parking Enforcement Officers as of July 1, 2024. This will allow for significant increases in service delivery and increased revenues. This work tightly aligns to the recommendation contained within the report.

Regarding the footprint of meters, the Administration is establishing a process for periodic curb usage review, which will include review for addition of on-street meters. Additional curb usage fees are also being explored.

The Futures Commission report also recommends removal of rush hour lane restrictions. Based on a motion dated May 31, 2022 (Item# 202201296) and outlined in an Administration report (Item# 202201915) DOTE has an ongoing initiative to reevaluate rush hour lane restrictions and remove these restrictions where possible. Recently rush hour lane restrictions have been removed on State Avenue in Lower Price Hill, Hamilton Avenue and North Bend in College Hill, Woodburn Avenue in East Walnut Hills, E. McMillan Avenue in Walnut Hills, and Observatory Avenue in Hyde Park. Upcoming removals are planned for W. McMillan Avenue in CUF, Burnet Avenue in Avondale, and Gilbert Avenue in Walnut Hills. Rush hour lane restrictions in the Central Business District are currently being studied and removals will be completed by mid-2025.

II. Recommendations Requiring Additional Policy Guidance or a Vote of the Electorate

Economic Development Strategic Objectives and Measures (Page 17) and Economic Development Service Delivery (Pages 22-23)

The Futures Commission report criticizes the City for a lack of clear communication of defined economic development goals and measures and also critiques the City's service delivery related to economic development.

While the Mayor and our elected officials have clearly articulated their goal of equitable growth for our City, a clear, written, and collective statement of strategic objectives for this growth from the Mayor and Council would be helpful in achieving that goal. It will enable the City Administration to offer specific recommendations about administrative structure, staffing, capital investments, and measurable metrics to track progress in achieving these objectives. The City Administration is prepared to facilitate a process to achieve this collective statement of strategic objectives.

We acknowledge that the service delivery challenges identified in the report are real, and we have been diligently focused on solutions. Many of the challenges identified in the report are the result of years of insufficient resources, lack of management oversight, and failure to prioritize long-term initiatives needed to address inefficiencies. Although these issues will take time to correct, significant process has already been made on addressing staffing challenges in the Department of Building and Inspections, streamlining processes in the Department of Community and Economic Development, and securing technology improvements for permitting and development applications.

The Futures Commission report recommends a consultant-led development services review and the establishment of an Office of Strategic Growth. The Administration recommends that consideration of these recommendations be sequenced after the clarification of strategic objectives (discussed above) is completed. This sequencing will ensure that, if pursued, these efforts are structured and aligned properly with those objectives.

<u>Increase Earnings Tax by 0.1% for Economic Development Initiatives – Page 39</u>

The Futures Commission report proposes a 0.1% earnings tax increase to fund economic development initiatives. As noted in the report, this requires voter approval. This change would raise approximately \$23 million per year. The proposed expenditures related to this recommendation are largely a question of economic development policy. If the City's elected officials choose to pursue this recommendation, the Administration is available to support that process and will develop an administrative plan for implementation. As described above and in line with the report, the Administration recommends that as a first step, the City's elected officials articulate their strategic objectives for economic development in a consolidated written statement to aid in communication to the public and structuring of any investments of resources.

Increase Earnings Tax by 0.05% for Public Safety Expenses – Page 49

The Futures Commission report recommends a 0.05% earnings tax increase to support public safety spending. As noted in the report, this will also require voter approval. This change would raise approximately \$11.5 million per year. If the City's elected officials choose to pursue this recommendation, one aspect to consider for this recommendation is how, as proposed, this revenue growth could lead to accelerated expense growth beyond the recommended 2.7% growth per year, in light of the collective bargaining process. Another aspect to consider is the timebound nature of the proposed tax increase. Public safety spending is primarily wages for personnel,

which is an ongoing expense. If the income tax increase were not renewed, adjusting to this significant loss of revenue would likely require layoffs.

<u>Create A Waste Collection Fee – Pages 52-53</u>

The Futures Commission report recommends establishing a waste collection fee. As noted in the report, the Charter requires voter approval for the proposed fee. The Futures Commission report projects that the proposed fee would raise \$164 million over ten years, or \$16.4 million per year. If the City's elected officials choose to pursue this recommendation, the Administration will develop a proposed plan for implementation, billing, and collection, including a plan for specifying criteria and verifying eligibility for the proposed reduced fee.

Redeploy Smale 0.1% Infrastructure Income Tax to Fund City Operations – Page 69

The Futures Commission report recommends passing an ordinance to redirect a portion of the revenue received under the City's 0.1% income tax, the "Smale Tax," for infrastructure spending. As proposed, this recommendation is not feasible. The Ohio Constitution strictly regulates municipal income tax processes and requires that (1) Every income tax be approved by the voters and (2) Income taxes must be used only for the purpose stated in the ballot language.

The Smale Tax was approved by the Cincinnati electorate in 1988 for the specific purpose of providing for "direct and indirect costs related to the construction, operation, maintenance, equipment and repair of the city's streets, bridges, parks and recreation areas, buildings, structures, fixtures, and other portions of the infrastructure." Given the Ohio Constitution's limits on municipal income tax and the stated purpose of the Smale Tax, the proposed change to how the Smale Tax is deployed requires approval by the electorate and may not be accomplished by an act of City Council alone.

III. Recommendations Requiring Additional Due Diligence

The Futures Commission report recommends some changes that require further due diligence before the City Administration can present options to the Mayor and Council. These include changes to the City's pension, sale of the assets of Greater Cincinnati Water Works, shared Parks and Recreation services, and the sale or lease of City real property assets.

<u>Transfer the City's Pension to the Ohio Public Employees Retirement System</u> (OPERS) – Pages 56-59

The City Administration will evaluate the report's recommendation that the City transfer the Cincinnati Retirement System (CRS) to the OPERS. The initial evaluation will be done by an internal working group and focused on determining the State's criteria for accepting CRS into OPERS and identifying impacts to the City's active and retired employees.

As a threshold matter, a transition of the CRS to OPERS would involve significant benefit changes for employees and retirees. Therefore, this recommendation must be diligently studied to understand those impacts before any decisions are made.

Further, any migration of CRS into OPERS is contingent upon court approval. The City's pension is subject to a Collaborative Settlement Agreement (CSA) that governs certain obligations of the City related to CRS. Pursuing the report's recommendation that CRS transfer to OPERS would require a renegotiation of CSA terms, which are currently in effect until 2045. Finally, any change impacting employees or retiree benefits could result in legal challenges from the parties to the CSA and existing members of the pension.

Once the initial evaluation of this recommendation is completed, the Administration will provide a formal report to the Mayor and Council to support additional policy discussions on this recommendation.

Regional Water Authority - Pages 59-64

The Futures Commission report recommends monetizing Greater Cincinnati Water Works (GCWW) by selling its assets to a newly created regional water district.

The recommendation is premised on the concept that the funds realized by the sale will provide cash resources that can be utilized as a lump sum contribution to CRS to raise its funding levels to what OPERS will require for the recommended transfer. The report estimates the cash payment for GCWW assets as \$680 million. The report does not provide an in-depth analysis of how this transaction would be structured, how ratepayers would be impacted by the sale, or how the resulting liability will impact the regional water authority. For context, all currently outstanding debt for GCWW operations is approximately \$422 million. It also does not provide an analysis on the impacts to current GCWW employees or to CRS from the loss of their contributions. The recommendation is further premised on the concept that GCWW's growth is being curtailed as a result of its current legal structure.

The report does acknowledge the need for additional extensive due diligence and voter approval to change the Cincinnati Charter to allow the transaction. The Administration agrees that additional and extensive due diligence of this recommendation is needed, including an analysis of the above premises. Further, the analysis must closely investigate the benefit to the City, as opposed to benefits to the region, from the proposed transaction—as there are many City-specific benefits that arise from GCWW being a city-owned enterprise.

Therefore, the Administration supports the report's recommendation of creating a dedicated task force comprised of, among others, GCWW and MSD staff and consultant experts as needed to fully examine this proposal. This task force will have to be structured with legal guidance.

Shared Services for Parks and Recreation Operations – Pages 49-51

The Futures Commission report recommends further diligence of several efficiency proposals related to Parks and Recreation operations and facilities—including shared services between the two departments and exploring outsourcing management of certain facilities to Great Parks of Hamilton County. The Administration recommends that the Park Board and Recreation Commission undergo a feasibility assessment and produce a report outlining the findings and opportunities.

Sale or Lease of City Assets – Page 72

The Futures Commission report recommends the divestiture or lease of City assets that do not support what the Commission considers core services of the City, including City-owned golf courses, parking assets, and Lunken Airport. The recommendation suggests that the sale or lease of these assets can generate revenue to the City or be leveraged as development incentives. Consistent with this recommendation, City staff will assemble a catalogue of City assets, and the City Solicitor will provide an opinion laying out the parameters for disposition. Once this process is complete, the creation of one or more task forces may be appropriate to perform necessary due diligence to understand the impacts of divesting each asset and make recommendations.

Conclusion

Thank you again to the business, labor, and civic leaders who volunteered their time to take on our most difficult challenges and recommend strategies for our City to thrive. As City manager, I am encouraged that the Futures Commission is in alignment with the vision that our elected officials have articulated, evidenced by the number of recommendations that are in close alignment with ongoing or completed policy and administrative initiatives. However, as noted above, some recommendations require further discussion and diligence.

The City Administration looks forward to supporting our elected officials as they undertake the challenging task of making decisions about the City's future. I am energized by the work that remains and look forward to creating a Cincinnati for all to thrive.

Subject: Emergency Ordinance – OTR Sidewalk Vending

Attached is an emergency ordinance captioned as follows:

MODIFYING Chapter 723, "Streets and Sidewalks, Use Regulations," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code by **AMENDING** Section 723-16, "Sidewalk Vending," to establish a new vending district in the Over-the-Rhine neighborhood.

The establishment of a new Sidewalk Vending district promotes expansion of sidewalk vending opportunities in the Over-the-Rhine neighborhood. This provides for identified sidewalk vending locations within the new district boundary which is adjacent to both the Downtown Vending District and the recently established FC Cincinnati Vending District.

The reason for the emergency is so new vendors can apply and begin to operate in the preferred summer and fall months this year. The Over-the-Rhine neighborhood may receive the economic and non-economic benefits associated with sidewalk vendors at the earliest possible time.

The Administration recommends passage of the attached emergency ordinance.

MODIFYING Chapter 723, "Streets and Sidewalks, Use Regulations," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code by **AMENDING** Section 723-16, "Sidewalk Vending," to establish a new vending district in the Over-the-Rhine neighborhood.

WHEREAS, revocable street privileges are the primary tool used by the City to provide sidewalk vendors access to the public right-of-way and to manage those vendors' occupancy of the public right-of-way; and

WHEREAS, Section 723-16, "Sidewalk Vending," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code, establishes a process whereby the City Manager may grant revocable street privileges to sidewalk vendors, allowing them to establish merchandise and food vending locations on City sidewalks within sidewalk vending districts; and

WHEREAS, to support the City's sidewalk vendors and expand access to sidewalk vending in the City, Council wishes to establish a new sidewalk vending district in the Over-the-Rhine neighborhood; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That Section 723-16, "Sidewalk Vending," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 723-16. - Sidewalk Vending.

- (a) Sidewalk Vending Program. The city manager or his or her designee is authorized to grant revocable street privileges for the placement of sidewalk vending locations in accordance with this section. This section governs merchandise and food vending on the sidewalks in the City's right-of-way. Mobile food vending within city streets is governed by Sections 723-41 through 723-50 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code.
- (b) Sidewalk Vending Rules and Regulations. The city manager is authorized to establish rules and regulations for the orderly and efficient administration of this chapter, including but not limited to rules governing application fees, vending practices, displays at vending locations, equipment and materials, health and safety standards, and authorized hours of operation. Changes to the rules and regulations must be approved by the city manager.
- (c) Vending Districts. The following sidewalk vending districts are the only areas in which individual sidewalk vending locations may be established by the city

manager or his or her designee. Peddlers and itinerant vendors authorized to operate under Chapter 839 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are prohibited from operating in these sidewalk vending districts, as stated in Section 839-13 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code.

- 1. The "Downtown Vending District" shall be defined as follows: the area within the public right-of-way within the bounds beginning at the intersection of the north property line of East Central Parkway and the east property line of Eggleston Avenue as projected northeastwardly; thence southeastwardly along the projected east property line, the actual east property line and the projected east property line of Eggleston Avenue to the south city corporate limit; thence west along the south city corporate limit to the west property line of Central Avenue as projected southwardly to the city corporate limit; thence northwardly along the west property line of projected Central Avenue and the actual west property line of Central Avenue to the north property line of West Court Street; thence eastwardly along the north property line of West Court Street to the west property line of Plum Street; thence northwardly along the west property line of Plum Street to the projected north property line of West Central Parkway; thence east along the projected and actual north property line of Central Parkway; continuing eastwardly along the north property line of East Central Parkway to the point of beginning.
- 2. The "Liberty/Dalton Street Vending District" shall be defined as the area within the public right-of-way beginning at a point being the intersection of the west right-of-way line of Dalton Street and the north right-of-way line of Flint Street. Thence north along the west right-of-way line of Dalton Street to the point of intersection with the south right-of-way line of Findlay Street. Thence east along the south right-of-way line of Findlay Street to the point of intersection with the east right-of-way line of Dalton Street. Thence south along the east right-of-way line of Dalton Street to the point of intersection with the north right-of-way line of Flint Street. Thence west along the north right-of-way line of Flint Street to the point of intersection with the west right-of-way line of Dalton Street, being the point and place of beginning.
- 3. The "Short Vine Vending District" shall be defined as the area beginning at a point being the intersection of the north right-of-way line of Corry Street and the east right-of-way line of Vine Street. Thence north along the east right-of-way line of Vine Street to the point of intersection with the south right-of-way line of Martin Luther King Jr. Drive. Thence west along the south right-of-way line of Martin Luther King Jr. Drive to the point of intersection with the west right-of-way line of Vine Street. Thence south along the west right-of-way line of Vine Street to the point of intersection with the north right-of-way line of Corry Street. Thence east

- along the north right-of-way line of Corry Street to the east right-of-way line of Vine Street, being the point and place of beginning.
- 4. The "University Hospital Vending District" shall be defined as the area beginning at a point being the intersection of the south right-of-way line of Piedmont Avenue and the west right-of-way line of Eden Avenue. Thence north along the west right-of-way line of Eden Avenue to the point of intersection with the north right-of-way line of Albert Sabin Way. Thence east along the north right-of-way line of Albert Sabin Way to the point of intersection with the east right-of-way line of Burnet Avenue. Thence south along the east right-of-way line of Burnet Avenue to the point of intersection with the south right-of-way line extended of Piedmont Avenue. Thence west along the south right-of-way line extended and the right-of-way line of Piedmont Avenue to the point of intersection with the west right-of-way of Eden Avenue, being the point and place of beginning.
- 5. The "FC Cincinnati Vending District" shall be defined as follows: the area within the public right-of-way within the bounds beginning at the intersection of the north property line of West Liberty Street and the west property line of John Street as projected easterly; thence to the east property line of Elm Street projected southerly to the south property line of West Liberty Street then projecting westerly along the south property line of West Liberty Street to the east property line of Central Parkway; thence projected southerly on the east property line of Central Parkway to the south property line of Charles Street; thence projecting westerly along the south property line of Charles Street to the west property line of Central Avenue; thence projecting northerly along the west property line of Central Avenue to the south property line of Ezzard Charles Drive; thence projecting westerly to the west property line of John Street; thence projecting northwesterly to the north property line of West Liberty Street.
- <u>6</u>. The "OTR Vending District" shall be defined as follows: the area within the public right-of-way within the bounds beginning at the intersection of the east right-of-way line of Sycamore Street and the north right-of-way line of East Liberty Street; thence westerly along the north right-of-way line of East Liberty Street to the east right-of-way line of Vine Street; thence westerly along the north right-of-way line of West Liberty Street to the east property line of Elm Street; thence south along the projected east right-of-way line of Elm Street to the south property line of West Liberty Street; then projecting westerly along the south property line of West Liberty Street to the east right-of-way line of Central Parkway; thence southerly along the east right-of-way line of Central Parkway and then eastwardly along the north right-of-way line of Central Parkway to the east right-of-way line of Sycamore Street; thence northerly along the east right-of-way line of Sycamore Street to the north right-of-way line of East Liberty Street.

- (d) Vending Locations. The city manager or his or her designee may designate sites within the defined vending districts for either food vending or merchandise vending and shall identify approved sites by maps, approximate address, or both. Additional sites may be requested in writing by persons interested in vending at specific locations which have not been designated for vending of the type proposed in the request. The city manager or his or her designee shall exercise sole discretion in determining the appropriateness of the requested location and shall notify the applicant in writing of the decision.
- (e) Temporary Locations. Temporary locations within the vending districts established in subsection (c) of this section for use in relocating sidewalk vendors from special event areas or for handling short-term (under seven days) demand for vending locations prompted by special events, holidays, sports championships, and other such occurrences, may be established and withdrawn by the city manager or his or her designee at any time.
- (f) Applications for Sidewalk Vending Locations. Persons desiring to obtain a revocable street privilege for a vending location shall submit an application on a form to be provided by the city manager or his or her designee. The city manager or his or her designee is authorized to charge a non-refundable application fee to be determined by the city manager.
- (g) Assignment of Vending Locations. Vending revocable street privileges for sidewalk vending locations will be awarded in accordance with the following:
 - 1. Each year, vendors with existing sidewalk vending locations may retain up to eight of their vending locations, upon provision of written notice to the city.
 - 2. New vending locations, and newly open vending locations not retained by a vendor, are to be awarded on a first come, first served basis.
 - 3. Applications for new or newly available vending locations shall be considered and awarded, in the order in which they are received, only to qualified applicants who submit proper and complete applications.
 - 4. Existing vendors seeking to retain one or more (up to eight) of their vending locations, and applicants seeking a new vending location, all must submit their applications within the deadlines for each step of the process. The application periods and deadlines shall be established in the rules and regulations governing the sidewalk vending program.
 - 5. In a given year, if deemed necessary because of high demand for new vending locations, the city manager or his or her designee may implement another method for awarding new locations, including but not limited to a

- lottery or another random drawing method, to ensure fairness both to existing vendors and new vendors.
- 6. The provisions of this subsection (g) do not change the revocability of vending revocable street privileges addressed in subsection (h) of this section and in Chapter 718 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code.
- (h) Vending Revocable Street Privilege. The city manager or his designee shall issue a vending revocable street privilege for each vending location awarded upon payment of the required fee set forth in the rules and regulations for the sidewalk vending program. Vending revocable street privileges for vending locations issued pursuant to this chapter are also governed by Chapter 718 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code and are revocable at any time as set forth in Chapter 718. In the event of revocation not caused by any act or omission of the vendor, the city shall make good faith efforts to accommodate the vendor by identifying an alternative vending location, or, if no alternative locations are available, the city will refund a prorated amount of the annual fee for the vending revocable street privilege based on the number of months of the year that the vendor had the vending revocable street privilege.
- (i) Vending During Special Events. When city council passes an ordinance in connection with a special event which temporarily prohibits vending in a specified area within any vending district except that which is authorized by the special event sponsor, and such area includes established sidewalk vending locations, or when, as a result of lawful construction or demolition or a significant change in the use of the street or sidewalk space in the vending district, it is necessary to eliminate an established vending site, the city manager or his or her designee may designate a temporary alternative sidewalk vending location within one of the defined vending districts established in subsection (c) of this section. The city manager or his or her designee shall designate temporary locations for sidewalk vending on an as-needed basis. The location of such temporary sites shall be at the sole discretion of the city manager or his or her designee.

Section 2. That the proper City officials are hereby authorized to take all necessary and proper actions to carry out the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare and shall, subject to the terms of Article II, Section 6 of the Charter, be effective immediately. The reason for the emergency is the immediate need to allow the Administration to establish vending locations so

that the Over-the-Rhine neighborhood may receive	the economic and non-economic benefits

On May 7, 2024, the Climate, Environment, and Infrastructure Committee referred the following for a report:

MOTION, submitted by Councilmembers Harris, Walsh, Jeffreys and Owens WE MOVE that the administration partner with METRO to engage in their METRO Pass program to provide interested City of Cincinnati Employees with discounted monthly passes. This should be promoted through the annual employee survey with eventual consideration of further subsidizing the passes to help recruit and retain talent.

The following report outlines the process by which the City of Cincinnati can partner with METRO to offer discounted monthly bus passes to interested employees. Specifically, it provides a detailed explanation of the program referenced by Council, METRO Pass Program, out of Minneapolis/St. Paul Minnesota and the roles, responsibilities, and costs associated. The report also details current offerings by Cincinnati's Southwest Ohio Regional Transit Authority (SORTA/Metro).

Additionally, the report clarifies the purpose of the annual Temp Check survey and explores its potential utility in assessing employee interest in the METRO Pass program. Furthermore, it considers the inclusion of questions in the survey to determine employee willingness to cover the costs through payroll deductions.

METRO PASS PROGRAM

Metropass is a program offered by Metro Transit, out of Minneapolis/St. Paul Minnesota, that provides employees of participating organizations with unlimited-ride transit passes at a deeply discounted rate. Employers can choose to cover the full cost, subsidize part of it, or pass the cost to employees. The program requires an initial one-year commitment, after which it moves to monthly billing. It helps reduce commuting stress, lowers transportation costs, and supports sustainable travel options.

The Metropass program requires participating employers to make at least a commitment of an initial year period before moving to monthly billing. In addition to actively promoting the METRO Pass program to eligible employees to ensure maximum participation, employers must designate a

Metropass administrator who would be responsible for setting up an account on the secure administrator site, submit participant names, verify active passes monthly for accurate billing schedule and conduct orientation sessions, distribute the physical Metropass to employees, and remind participants of usage terms while managing the ordering, cancellation, replacement, and suspension of passes through the administrator site.

The METRO Pass program costs \$83 per employee each month, compared to the \$120 regular monthly pass, and provides unlimited access to regional buses and trains. Employers can estimate the total monthly cost by multiplying \$83 by the number of participating employees. For instance, if 100 employees participate, the monthly cost would be \$8,300/month or \$99,600 a year. Employers have the option to either pass the full cost to employees through a payroll deduction, subsidize part of the cost, or fully cover the cost.¹

SORTA/METRO PASS PROGRAMS IN CINCINNATI

SORTA/Metro offers several transit pass options, although there is not an exact equivalent to the Metropass program found in Minneapolis/St. Paul advertised on its site.

SORTA/Metro provides a variety of passes to suit different commuting needs. The 30-Day Rolling Passes include the Hamilton County Local pass at \$80, which is valid for unlimited rides within Hamilton County for 30 days. The Hamilton County Express pass costs \$106 and includes Routes 52X and 72X, while the Suburban County Express pass is priced at \$150 and covers Routes 42X, 71X, and 82X. Additionally, the Metro/TANK pass is available for \$105, allowing unlimited travel within Hamilton County and on all local TANK routes.

For shorter-term needs, SORTA/Metro offers Day Passes. The Hamilton County Local Day Pass is priced at \$4.00 and provides unlimited rides within a 24-hour period. The Metro/TANK Day Pass, costing \$5.00, offers unlimited travel on both Metro and TANK buses for 24 hours.

In addition to these passes, SORTA/Metro offers Stored Value Cards in increments of \$10, \$20, and \$30, which function like cash for fare payments.

Special programs are also available, such as the Fare Deal Program, which offers half-price fares for seniors, individuals with disabilities, and others who meet specific eligibility criteria. This program includes a monthly sticker priced at \$40. Another program, the Metro Veterans Program, provides discounted fares for veterans.

While SORTA/Metro does not currently offer an exact equivalent to the Metropass program for area employers, efforts have been made to explore similar options. In 2022, the City of Cincinnati's Department of Human Resources (HR) requested that Metro consider providing a bulk discount for City employees, either as a flat rate discount of 10-20% or through employer or employee contributions. At that time, SORTA/Metro needed to work with their ticketing and payment solutions vendor, Masabi, to test integration with the Transit app technology for handling bulk payments.

Since 2022, there has been no further engagement between HR and SORTA/Metro regarding this initiative. The HR department presumed that SORTA/Metro was exploring potential avenues and recommendations for such a partnership that could benefit not just the City of Cincinnati but also other area employers.

TEMP CHECK EMPLOYEE SURVEY

The City of Cincinnati plans to release its second annual Temp Check survey during the open enrollment period in October 2024. This survey is essential for evaluating various aspects of the workforce, including job satisfaction, employee morale, engagement levels, and overall organizational effectiveness.

To ascertain employee interest in participating in a program like Metropass, the following questions could be included in the upcoming Temp Check survey:

- "Do you currently use public transit for your commute?"
- "If a subsidized public transit pass program were available, how likely would you be to use public transit for your commute?"
- "Would you be willing to cover the cost of the public transit pass through a payroll deduction if the program provided you with significant savings?"

SUMMARY

In closing, this report explores the potential for the City of Cincinnati to collaborate with SORTA/Metro to offer discounted monthly transit passes to its employees, modeled after the Metropass program in Minneapolis/St. Paul. It also highlights the opportunity for the City to use the annual Temp Check survey to assess employee interest and willingness to participate in and potentially cover the costs of the program.

Should SORTA/Metro possess a program comparable to the Metropass that is not yet advertised to area employers but is willing to extend it to the City, it will be necessary for City Council and the Administration to decide whether to fully or partially subsidize the cost per participate, or have employees cover the cost entirely. Additionally, an administrator must be designated to manage the program, ensuring active participation and accurate billing.





MAY 2024 MONTHLY FINANCIAL REPORTS

The following report provides an update on the City of Cincinnati's financial condition as of the month ending May 31, 2024. Variances are based on current year estimates and prior year activity in attached schedules.

A more detailed explanation of revenues is attached for review, including reports comparing current year actual revenue vs. forecasted revenue and prior year actual revenue vs. current year actual revenue. Both of those reports are presented on a monthly and year-to-date basis.

The chart below portrays the performance of actual revenue collected against the forecasted revenue collected through May 31, 2024 and shows that actual revenue of \$487.5 million was above forecasted revenue of \$457.8 million by \$29.7 million.



The major revenue components of the General Fund are listed in the table below. This table highlights the year-to-date variance (favorable and unfavorable) in General Fund revenue collections as compared to forecasted revenue collections. Each major category that differs significantly from forecasted collections will be discussed in further detail.

General Fund (favorable variance) is \$29.7 million above the amount forecasted through May in the FY 2024 Budget. This is the eleventh month's report for the fiscal year. What follows is an explanation of significant variances of individual General Fund revenue components.

General Property Tax (favorable variance) is \$4 million above estimate. Increased property values in the first half of CY 2024 led to this positive variance.

Income Tax (favorable variance) is \$12.5 million above the forecasted amount. Income Tax revenue was not projected to increase in FY 2024; however, withholding payments and net profits have exceeded estimates.

Admission Tax (favorable variance) is \$2.3 million above estimate. Revenue from summer concerts and larger attendance for baseball games contributed to the positive variance in this category.

Short Term Rental Excise Tax (favorable variance) is \$508k above the forecasted amount. The demand for and identification of short-term rentals continues to increase.

Licenses & Permits (unfavorable variance) is \$1.9 million below the forecasted amount. Energy aggregation is lagging the estimate due to the gas program getting started later in the 2nd quarter and solar field capacity market changes. A mid-year change in permitting for sidewalk closures is also adding to the negative variance. General Building and HVAC are trending lower than estimated as well.

Fines, Forfeitures and Penalties (unfavorable variance) is down \$1.2 million. Parking fine revenue is still below estimate. Upon closer monitoring, estimates will be reduced for the next fiscal year. The inability to maintain a full complement of enforcement officers and collections contributed to the negative variance.

Investment Income (favorable variance) is \$8.6 million above the forecasted amount. A stronger than expected economy and unpredicted Federal Reserve rate hikes in late 2023 have resulted in higher interest earnings than originally estimated.

Police (favorable variance) is up \$2.6 million. This is because of a backlog of impounded vehicles released for sale, an increase in details, and a large payment from prior year charges which was received this year. These events were not factored into the current year estimates so this category should finish the year ahead of the forecast.

Fire (unfavorable variance) is \$1.2 million below the forecasted amount. A partner of CFD, that collects their EMS revenue experienced a cyberattack that has delayed payments since February. This category will most likely finish below forecast as payments are not expected until late June at the earliest.

Parking Meters (unfavorable variance) is down \$819k. This is a planned unfavorable variance due to an administrative change to the recording of parking meter revenue.

Other (favorable variance) is \$4.9 million above forecast. A one-time accounting adjustment for Health Reimbursement Arrangements, a payment on an unplanned contract for Fire and a prior year FEMA reimbursement for Health are contributing to this positive variance.

Restricted Funds:

Municipal Golf (favorable variance) is up \$1.7 million. CRC Golf has outperformed local and national trends in the last few years. The Toptracer technology also continues to generate revenue in excess of expectations.

Hazard Abatement (unfavorable variance) is down \$494k. The variance is due to the timing of receiving a grant reimbursement. The reimbursement should be received before year end and this fund will finish on estimate.

Cincinnati Health District (favorable variance) is \$213k above the estimate. This is due to a prior year reimbursement that was received but not expected therefore, the reimbursement was not factored into the estimate for this fiscal year.

As required by state and local laws, this ordinance declares the necessity of levying assessments to reimburse the City for the cost and expense of repairing, reconstructing, and constructing concrete sidewalk and driveways on certain properties (Exhibit No. 1) abutting the following streets within the City of Cincinnati: Ault View Avenue, Bedford Terrace, Blue Rock Street, Briarcliffe Avenue, Cleinview Avenue, Curzon Avenue, Del Monte Place, Delridge Drive, Delta Avenue, Eighth Street, Erie Avenue, Galbraith Road, Grace Avenue, Hamilton Avenue, Harrison Avenue, Herschel Avenue, Jerry Lane, Lantana Avenue, Linwood Avenue, Lookout Drive, Lookout Circle, Madison Road, McMicken Avenue, Minot Avenue, Mourningridge Drive, Mount Hope Avenue, North Bend Road, Observatory Avenue, Parkway Avenue, Purcell Avenue, Reading Road, Redway Avenue, Relleum Avenue, Riddle Street, Riverside Drive, Scottwood Avenue, Suire Avenue, Summit Road, Suncrest Drive, Victory Parkway, Zinsle Avenue for a total amount of \$181,888.92.

We have notified the abutting property owners of the need for these repairs. After providing time for property owners to arrange for repairs, the City directed its contractor to complete the remainder. Abutting property owners were then billed the cost of the repairs performed by the City's contractor.

With passage of this ordinance, bills not paid within thirty days will be assessed as provided by the Ohio Revised Code and the Cincinnati Municipal Code. These amounts are scheduled to be paid over a three-year, five-year, or ten-year period, as indicated on the attached Exhibit.

The Administration recommends passage of the attached ordinance.

LEVYING assessments for unpaid costs incurred by the City of Cincinnati in making emergency repairs to sidewalks, sidewalk areas, curbs, and gutters at various locations in the City through the City of Cincinnati's Sidewalk Safety Program, in accordance with Cincinnati Municipal Code Sections 721-149 through 721-169.

WHEREAS, Cincinnati Municipal Code Chapter 721 requires property owners to keep the sidewalks, sidewalk areas, curbs, and gutters abutting their properties safe and in good repair; and

WHEREAS, Cincinnati Municipal Code Section 721-165 authorizes the City to make emergency repairs to sidewalks, sidewalk areas, curbs, and gutters without prior notice to the abutting property owner when necessary to provide for public safety and also to bill the owner for the cost of the work; and

WHEREAS, City inspectors documented the need for emergency sidewalk repairs adjacent to each of the properties listed in the attached Attachment A (the "Properties"); and

WHEREAS, the City performed the repairs after the owners of the Properties received written notice to make the repairs and failed to do so; and

WHEREAS, Council thereafter passed Resolution 46-2024 declaring the need for the emergency sidewalk repairs and the need to assess the Properties for repair and administrative costs incurred by the City in making the repairs; and

WHEREAS, the owners of the Properties have each agreed to have their respective properties assessed to reimburse the City for its costs, and the Clerk of Council has not received any objections to the assessments; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Cincinnati Municipal Code Sections 721-149 through 721-169, Council hereby levies assessments on those Properties for which repair and administrative costs remain outstanding following the property owners' failure to pay such amounts within thirty days of being billed, which assessments shall be certified to the County Auditor and shall be collected in the same manner as real estate taxes; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That Council hereby assesses those properties identified on the attached Attachment A (the "Assessed Properties"), incorporated herein by reference, for outstanding

repair and administrative costs incurred by the City in making emergency repairs to the sidewalks, sidewalk areas, curbs, and gutters abutting the Assessed Properties.

Section 2. That each of the Assessed Properties is listed in Attachment A together with the amount of the assessment, the length of the assessment period, and reference to the resolution previously passed by Council giving notice of the City's intent to assess each property.

Section 3. That the assessments shall be payable in cash to the City Treasurer within thirty days after the passage of this ordinance or, at the option of each property owner, in semi-annual installments for the assessment period.

Section 4. That the assessments not paid in cash within thirty days are to be certified to the County Auditor by the City Treasurer with interest at the rate of 7.09 percent for three-year assessments, 6.93 percent for five-year assessments, and 6.95 percent for ten-year assessments.

Section 5. That notes and bonds of the City may be issued in anticipation of the collection of the assessments.

Section 6. That any amount received as a result of the assessments levied herein shall be deposited into the Sidewalk Special Assessment Fund No. 791.

Section 7. That a property owner's right under Section 721-159 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code to file a protest against an assessment shall expire 180 days following the date of the first tax bill containing a sidewalk assessment for the protested work.

Section 8. That the Clerk of Council is hereby directed to cause notice to be published once in a newspaper of general circulation within the City of Cincinnati, which notice shall state that the assessments have been made, that they are on file with the Clerk of Council, and that they are available for public inspection and examination by persons interested therein.

Approval of this Ordinance authorizes the following:

- 1. the establishment of capital improvement program project account no. 980x232x252365, "UC Area Pedestrian Safety Grant PID 121859," to implement pedestrian safety and street calming measures at various locations on Clifton Avenue, Jefferson Avenue, and Martin Luther King Drive around the University of Cincinnati campus (the "UC Traffic Calming project");
- 2. the City Manager to accept and appropriate a Highway Safety Improvement Program ("HSIP") Abbreviated Safety Fund grant awarded by the Ohio Department of Transportation ("ODOT") in the amount of up to \$335,005 to capital improvement program project account no. 980x232x252365, "UC Area Pedestrian Safety Grant PID 121859";
- 3. the Director of Finance to deposit the grant resources into the capital improvement program project account;

- 4. the City Manager to accept a grant of in-kind materials valued at up to \$75,000 from the HSIP Abbreviated Safety Fund through ODOT to install quick-build curb-extensions around the University of Cincinnati campus ("HAM Cincinnati Ped PO-UC project");

The City applied for HSIP grants on April 2, 2024, and was awarded an amount of up to \$335,005 to implement pedestrian safety and street calming measures at various locations on Clifton Avenue, Jefferson Avenue, and Martin Luther King Drive around the University of Cincinnati campus (the "UC Traffic Calming project"). The City was also awarded in-kind materials valued at up to \$75,000 to install quick-build curb-extensions around the University of Cincinnati Campus (the "HAM Cincinnati Ped PO-UC project"). No resources will be accepted without the authorization of the City Council.

Acceptance of the HSIP grants of funds and in-kind materials does not require any matching funds, and there are no new FTEs/full time equivalents associated with the HSIP grants.

Implementing pedestrian safety and street calming measures is in accordance with the "Connect" goal to "[d]evelop an efficient multi-modal transportation system that supports neighborhood livability" and strategy to "[p]lan, design, and implement a safe and sustainable transportation system" as described on pages 127-138 of Plan Cincinnati (2012).

The reason for the emergency is the immediate need to begin work to meet established project deadlines.

The Administration recommends passage of this Emergency Ordinance.

AUTHORIZING the payment of \$60,000 from the Department of Community and Economic Development General Fund non-personnel operating budget account no. 050x164x0000x7289 as a moral obligation to McCormack Baron Salazar for consulting services provided to the City regarding the Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grant application process.

Approval of this Emergency Ordinance authorizes the payment of \$60,000 from the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) General Fund non-personnel operating budget account no. 050x164x0000x7289 as a moral obligation to McCormack Baron Salazar (MBS) for services provided to the City related to the Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grant application process.

In August 2023, the City was negotiating a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Cincinnati Metropolitan Housing Authority (CMHA) as part of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) application process for the Choice Neighborhood Implementation Grant for the West End Choice Neighborhoods Initiative. The City, as "Co-Applicant," and CMHA, as "Lead Applicant," intended to submit a fiscal year 2023 Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grant application, with MBS providing services as co-developer to prepare the application and lead the development team in refining, augmenting, and finalizing the grant plan.

MBS provided consulting services as a co-developer for the HUD Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grant application for the West End Choice Neighborhoods Initiative. This initiative aimed to develop a comprehensive plan to transform the West End neighborhood and revitalize key public housing sites: Stanley Rowe Towers A and B, Stanley Rowe Rowhouses, and Liberty Street Apartments.

MBS was designated as the housing implementation entity, while their subconsultants worked as the implementation entity for the transformation plan. The City Administration, in collaboration with the CMHA, engaged MBS for their expertise in the grant application process to prepare a grant application to be submitted to HUD in December 2023. MBS and their subconsultants provided services including grant writing, legal services, coordinated multiple meetings, and drafted numerous documents to prepare a full Choice Neighborhood Implementation Grant application by the December 2023 deadline. After MBS conducted consulting

services related to this grant application, the City Administration informed CMHA and MBS that the City was not going to proceed with the 2023 Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grant Application. Due to the nature of these services, which were completed before a formal contract was established, a moral obligation payment is required to compensate MBS for their contributions. The \$60,000 payment is intended to reimburse MBS for services rendered, which were essential for the grant application process.

The reason for the emergency is the immediate need to pay MBS in a timely manner for consulting services provided to the City.

The Administration recommends passage of this Emergency Ordinance.

to assist an innovative project to create real, lasting impact in the community and establish data-driven, evidence-based metrics for monitoring the success of organizations receiving funding; and

WHEREAS, beginning in FY 2025, Council will continue to utilize the human services priorities and funding percentages established in Ordinance No. 17-2023, but wants to modify the human services funding policy to create a new plan that will not include funding for a large-scale Impact Award in the second year of the biennial budget (budget update) and, instead, will allocate 33 percent of human services funding to organizations that further the work of the category selected in the first year of the biennial budget for the Impact Award; and

WHEREAS, 33 percent of FY 2025 human services funding therefore will be allocated to organizations that further the work of the FY 2024 Impact Award category, which is eviction prevention and housing stabilization; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That the City of Cincinnati's process for human services funding for the first year of the biennial budget beginning in FY 2026 shall include an Impact Award for one large-scale social innovation project and shall use a multi-year funding cycle for all human services funding as described in this ordinance.

Section 2. That the City's human services funding priorities for the first year of the biennial budget, beginning with FY 2026 and extending to subsequent budgets and fiscal years, are to allocate up to 33 percent of appropriated human services funding for the Impact Award, with any balance, if less than 33 percent is allocated to the large-scale social innovation project, allocated to organizations that further the work of the category selected for the Impact Award; 25 percent for Comprehensive Workforce Development Support; twenty percent for Youth Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction; ten percent for Supporting, Securing, and Stabilizing Housing for High-Risk Populations; ten percent for Emergency Wrap-Around Services through Project LIFT; and two precent for overhead.

Section 3. That the City's human services funding priorities for the second year of the biennial budget (budget update), beginning with Fiscal Year 2025 and extending to subsequent

budgets and fiscal years, are to allocate 33 percent of appropriated human services funding for organizations that further the work of the category selected in the first year of the biennial budget for the Impact Award; 25 percent for Comprehensive Workforce Development Support; twenty percent for Youth Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction; ten percent for Supporting, Securing, and Stabilizing Housing for High-Risk Populations; ten percent for Emergency Wrap-Around Services through Project LIFT; and two percent for overhead.

Section 4. That the United Way and any organizations assisting the City with evaluating human services funding applications use the funding policy described in Sections 1 through 3 in evaluating applications for human services funding.

Section 5. That the proper City officials are authorized to do all things necessary and proper to comply with the provisions of Sections 1 through 4.

Section 6. That this ordinance shall be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare and shall, subject to the terms of Article II, Section 6 of the Charter, be effective immediately. The reason for the emergency is the immediate need to establish the City's human services funding priorities so that they can be taken into operational account by the City's human services funding partners in forthcoming human services funding allocations.

Subject: Emergency Ordinance - Amending Cincinnati Municipal Code

Chapter 203

Attached is an Emergency Ordinance captioned:

MODIFYING the provisions of Chapter 203, "Employees' Retirement System," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code by AMENDING Section 203-49, "Survivor Benefits," to implement survivor benefit changes recommended by the Cincinnati Retirement System Board.

The CRS Survivor Benefit was established in 1961 and was loosely modeled after the Survivor benefit provided by the Social Security System. This benefit is available to CRS members who have at least 18 months service and who die in service and not eligible at the time of their death for a monthly retirement benefit as provided for in the Cincinnati Municipal Code Chapter 203 which governs the Cincinnati Retirement System. The various monthly Survivor benefit amounts are determined annually by a formula set out in Chapter 203.49. The current Survivor benefit amounts are standardized based on the number of surviving family members and do not vary based on the deceased member's annual salary.

The Survivor benefit is paid in addition to the refund of the deceased member's CRS contributions which are paid to their designated beneficiary on record as well as the standard City life insurance benefit of \$50,000. The current Survivor Benefit is difficult and cumbersome to administer because of: wide ranging age and eligibility thresholds for surviving family members; stipulated time intervals between payments to different family members; and requires continuous monitoring over multiple decades and meticulous record keeping for CRS.

To remedy this situation, the CRS is proposing to implement a one-time lump sum payment, equivalent to 2/3 of the deceased member's salary. This approach is more common among public sector defined benefit retirement plans across the country and is more efficient (payment is immediate) and more equitable (benefit amount is tied to deceased member's annual salary) than the current arrangement.

The reason for the emergency is the necessity to implement this new arrangement at the earliest possible date (September 1, 2024).

The Administration recommends passage of this Emergency Ordinance.

MODIFYING the provisions of Chapter 203, "Employees' Retirement System," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code by **AMENDING** Section 203-49, "Survivor Benefits," to implement survivor benefit changes recommended by the Cincinnati Retirement System Board.

WHEREAS, the Cincinnati Retirement System Board ("Board") desires to provide a one-time lump sum survivor benefit payment equal to two-thirds of a deceased active member's current annual rate of pay as reflected in the City's payroll system to be divided equally among the deceased active member's surviving spouse and minor children in lieu of ongoing monthly payments of survivor benefits as currently provided in Chapter 203 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, currently under certain circumstances a surviving spouse, any minor children, and dependent parents of a deceased active member are entitled to monthly payments, which are adjusted annually for the increase in average hourly earnings as measured by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics; and

WHEREAS, following a review of the current policy related to survivor benefits, the Board has determined that a one-time lump sum payment equal to two-thirds of the deceased active member's current annual rate of pay as reflected in the City's payroll system will not result in an increase of the Cincinnati Retirement System's ("CRS") unfunded liability; and

WHEREAS, due to the administrative burden on CRS staff who must maintain records regarding the deceased active member's surviving spouse until the surviving spouse reaches eligibility age, the Board no longer wants to provide ongoing monthly payments of survivor benefits; and

WHEREAS, the Board voted to provide a one-time lump sum survivor benefit payment equal to two-thirds of the deceased active member's current annual rate of pay as reflected in the City's payroll system to be divided equally among the deceased active member's surviving spouse and minor children in lieu of ongoing payments of survivor benefits, and Chapter 203 must be revised to implement those changes; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That existing Section 203-49, "Survivor Benefits," of the Cincinnati Municipal

Code is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 203-49. Survivor Benefits.

In the event of the death of an Active Member, including a Member on leave of absence without pay for a period of not more than one year, who was a contributing Member of the Retirement System for at least 18 months prior to death and by reason of whose death no benefit is payable pursuant to Section 203-63(b), there shall be paid to, or on behalf of, such survivors who qualify under the provisions of this section the amounts hereinafter indicated, which amounts shall be in addition to the ordinary death benefit payable pursuant to Section 203-45.

- (a)(1) If an Active Member dies on or before August 31, 2024 and is survived by a spouse, such spouse shall receive a pension payment of \$157.50 per month for life or until remarriage. Such pensionpayment shall begin on the first day of the month next following the last day for which final compensation is paid for the services of the deceased Active Member if survivor benefits are payable pursuant to paragraph subsection (b)(1) hereof and shall continue to be paid as long as such spouse remains unmarried and survivor benefits are payable pursuant to paragraph subsection (b)(1) hereof. Effective the first of the month next following the 62nd birthday of such spouse, if the deceased Active Member had less than 15 years of Creditable Service, or effective the first of the month next following the 50th birthday of such spouse, if the deceased Active Member had 15 years of Creditable Service or more, such pensionpayment shall be paid irrespective of any benefits payable pursuant to paragraphsubsection (b)(1) hereof. If no benefits are payable pursuant to paragraph subsection (b)(1) hereof, such spouse shall begin to receive the pension payment effective on the first day of the month following the 62nd birthday of such spouse, if the deceased Active Member had less than 15 years of Creditable Service, or effective the first of the month next following the 50th birthday of such spouse, if the deceased Active Member had 15 years of Creditable Service or more.
 - (2) If an Active Member dies on or after September 1, 2024, and the Active Member is survived by a spouse, and the Active Member has no natural or adopted minor children, including natural children of the Active Member conceived prior to the Active Member's death, such surviving spouse shall receive a one-time lump sum payment equal to two-thirds of the deceased Active Member's current annual rate of pay as reflected in the city's payroll system.
 - (3) If an Active Member dies on or after September 1, 2024, and at the time of the Active Member's death the Active Member is survived by a spouse and the Active Member's natural or adopted minor child or children, including natural children of an Active Member conceived prior to the Active Member's death, the Active Member's surviving spouse and minor children shall receive a one-time lump sum payment equal to two-thirds of the deceased Active Member's current annual rate of pay as reflected in the city's payroll system to be divided equally among the surviving spouse and eligible surviving children. In the event the eligible surviving children are not the natural or adopted children of the surviving spouse, payment shall be made to the parent or guardian of such child or children.
- (b)(1) If an Active Member dies on or before August 31, 2024 and is survived by a spouse and an Retiree's Active Member's natural or adopted minor child or children,

including natural children of an Active Member conceived prior to the Active Member's death, there shall be paid during the life of the surviving spouse to the surviving spouse or to the guardian of such child or children in the event such child or children are not in the custody of the surviving spouse the amount of \$157.50 per month for one eligible child for as long as only one child meets the eligibility requirements hereinafter set forth or the amount of \$270 per month for two or more eligible children, for as long as two or more children meet the eligibility requirements hereinafter set forth.

(2) If an Active Member dies on or before August 31, 2024 and is not survived by a spouse or if the spouse dies or remarries during the dependency of the Active Member's minor child or children, —there shall be paid to the parent or guardian of such child or children, during the period there is no living spouse, the amount of \$157.50 per month for one eligible child for as long as only one child meets the eligibility requirements hereinafter set forth, the amount of \$315 per month for two eligible children for as long as two children meet the eligibility requirements hereinafter set forth, or the amount of \$427.50 per month for three or more eligible children for as long as three or more children meet the eligibility requirements hereinafter set forth.

In case a guardian is appointed for a surviving child by reason of the probate court adjudging such child to be mentally or physically incompetent, the Board may pay the guardian survivor benefits as provided in this section for the use and benefit of such child during the period of incompetency, notwithstanding the fact that such child may be over 18 years of age.

For the purpose of computing benefits pursuant to subsection (b) for the death of an Active Member on or before August 31, 2024, Aa natural child of a deceased Active Member shall be considered eligible for the purpose of computing benefits pursuant to this paragraph from the first of the month next following the child's birth or the death of the deceased Active Member, whichever is the latter date, until such child reaches 18 years of age or marries, whichever occurs first. In the case of a legally adopted child of the deceased Active Member, such child, in addition to the eligibility requirements hereinbefore fixed for a natural child of the deceased Active Member, must in order to be eligible to be considered for the computation of benefits pursuant to this paragraph subsection (b) have received at least one-half of the child's support from the deceased Active Member during the 12 months immediately prior to the death of the deceased Active Member.

(3) If an Active Member dies on or after September 1, 2024, and at the time of the Active Member's death, the Active Member is survived by an Active Member's natural or adopted minor child or children, including natural children of an Active Member conceived prior to the Active Member's death, and the Active Member is not survived by a spouse, a one-time lump sum payment equal to two-thirds of the deceased Active Member's current annual rate of pay as reflected in the city's payroll system shall be divided equally among the eligible surviving children, which shall be payable to the parent or guardian of such child or children.

- If, at the time of an Active Member's death or within 120 days following the Active Member's death, a guardian has been appointed for an adult surviving child by reason of the probate court adjudging such child to be mentally or physically incompetent, there shall be paid survivor benefits in the amount of \$157.50 per month to the guardian for the use and benefit of such child during the period of incompetency, notwithstanding the fact that such child is over eighteen years of age.
- (ed) If an Active Member dies on or before August 31, 2024 and is survived by a dependent father or mother, or both, who received more than one-half of their support from the deceased Active Member during the 12 months immediately prior to the death of the Active Member and this fact is established to the satisfaction of the Board within one year after the death of the Active Member, the dependent father or mother, or both, shall receive a pensionpayment in an amount fixed by the Board which shall not be less than \$112.50 nor more than \$157.50 per month each. If the benefits payable pursuant to this paragraph (ed) together with the benefits payable pursuant to the preceding paragraphs of this section exceed the limitations fixed by paragraph (eh), the benefits payable pursuant to this paragraph (ed) shall be reduced to meet the requirements of paragraph (eh).

If an Active Member dies on or after September, 1, 2024, no benefit for a dependent parent is available under this section.

- (e) Should any payments be made pursuant to this section to any person in excess of the payments due said person under the terms of this section, either because of the City's inability to determine the income of such person or otherwise, said overpayment shall be deducted from benefits thereafter payable to such person and no further benefits shall be payable to such person until such overpayment is fully recovered. Nothing herein shall be construed to in any way limit the right of the Retirement System to in any way limit to recover overpayments in any other manner provided by law.
- Effective January 1, 1999, the monthly benefit amounts detailed in Sections sections (a), (b) and (c) herein, shall be adjusted for the increase in average hourly earnings that has occurred between June 1987 and June 1998 as measured by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. Effective January 1, 2000, and every January thereafter, monthly benefits will be adjusted based on the increase in average hourly earnings occurring during the immediately preceding July through June period as measured by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, not to exceed three (3) percent per year.
- (dg) For the purpose of this section the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:
 - (i) "Widow," "widower," "surviving Surviving spouse," "wife" or "husband" shall mean the person legally married to the deceased Active Member on the day of such Active Member's death as evidenced by an undissolved ceremonial marriage and who has, in the opinion of the Board, either lived with the deceased Active Member as spouse immediately prior to the Active

Member's death or has taken care of the children of the <u>Active</u> Member for at least one year immediately prior to the <u>Active</u> Member's death or in the event there is no such person the person, if any, the deceased Member has held out to the public as his or her spouse for at least one year immediately prior to the Member's death and who has been designated by the deceased Member as his or her spouse by written designation duly filed with the Board.

- (ii) "Child" shall mean a natural child, <u>including natural children of an Active Member conceived prior to the Active Member's death</u>, or a legally adopted child.
- (eh) In no event shall more than \$427.50 per month as adjusted according to the terms of the last paragraph of subsection (ef) hereof, be paid pursuant to this section by reason of the death of an Active Member.
- (fi) No person finally adjudged guilty either as a principal or an aider, abettor, or procurer of the aggravated murder (ORC 2903.01), the murder (ORC 2903.02), or the voluntary manslaughter (ORC 2903.03) of an Active Member shall be eligible to receive the benefits payable pursuant to the provisions of this section by reason of the Active Member's death. For the purpose of this section, such person shall be considered as having predeceased the Active Member killed.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare and shall, subject to the terms of Article II, Section 6 of the Charter, be effective immediately. The reason for the emergency is the immediate need to implement the changes to survivor benefits by the date specified in the amended Section 203-49.

Attached is an Emergency Ordinance captioned:

AMENDING Ordinance No. 228-2012 passed by City Council on June 20, 2012, as previously amended by Ordinance No. 246-2013, Ordinance No. 179-2014, Ordinance No. 272-2015, Ordinance No. 268-2016, Ordinance No. 213-2017, Ordinance No. 244-2018, Ordinance No. 321-2019, Ordinance No. 270-2020, Ordinance No. 311-2021, Ordinance No. 237-2022, and Ordinance No. 306-2023, for the purpose of reducing those special assessments levied and to be collected in 2025 (with tax year 2024 property taxes) based upon a report of the administrator for bonds issued by the Port of Greater Cincinnati Development Authority related to the Oakley Station development project.

BACKGROUND/CURRENT CONDITIONS

The Public Infrastructure Improvements for the Oakley Station project were funded by special obligation bonds issued against future revenue streams from a Project Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District put in place on the project site and back stopped by a Special Assessment levied on the properties within the project site. Each year, the Port Authority, as the TIF and Special Assessment Administrator, issues an annual report determining the appropriate level of Special Assessments to be certified to the properties in the coming tax year.

DEVELOPER INFORMATION

The Port of Greater Cincinnati Development Authority disbursed the bonds and serves as the TIF and Special Assessment Administrator. The Developer for Oakley Station is USS Realty, LLC.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT UPDATE

The 2024 Administrator's Report determined that actual TIF revenues and projected TIF revenues for the 2024 (collect 2025) tax year are adequate to cover all bond obligations and have additional reserves on hand, so the Special Assessment for this year may be lowered to \$0.00.

State law requires the City to certify assessments to the County Auditor no later than the second Monday in September, which is September 9th this year. In order to hit that deadline, it needs to be introduced directly into Budget & Finance Committee on August 5, for passage by Council on August 7th.

RECOMMENDATION

The Administration recommends passage of this Emergency Ordinance to reduce the Special Assessment amounts, as recommended based on the annual Administrator's Report.

(v) the aggregate required Certified Annual Installments of the Special Assessments to be certified by the City to the Hamilton County, Ohio Auditor and collected by the Hamilton County, Ohio Treasurer in 2025 (with 2024 taxes) (i.e., the applicable Certified Annual Installments after applying the Annual Service Payment Credits, as allocated in accordance with the Administrator's Report), is \$0.00, requiring the annual Special Assessments for tax year 2024 to be reduced from the current aggregate Certified Annual Installments amount of \$653,370.00 to \$0.00 consistent with the Administrator's Report; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, Hamilton County, Ohio:

Section 1. That the Special Assessments levied in Ordinance No. 228-2012, passed by Council on June 20, 2012 (as amended, the "Assessing Ordinance"), shall be reapportioned consistent with the current (2024) report of the administrator (the "Administrator") appointed by the Port of Greater Cincinnati Development Authority (the "Port Authority") for bonds issued by the Port Authority and secured by an assignment of the Special Assessments (the "Administrator's Report"), and that Exhibit A referenced in the Assessing Ordinance and most recently amended in Section 1 of Ordinance No. 213-2017, passed by Council on August 9, 2017, is hereby amended and restated in its entirety, as follows:

That each of the remaining Certified Annual Installments (as defined in the Cooperative Agreement referred to and defined in the recitals to this ordinance) of the Special Assessments levied in the Assessing Ordinance is hereby apportioned and allocated, or reapportioned and reallocated, consistent with the apportionments and allocations of the Special Assessments provided for under Section 1 of this ordinance, and that Exhibit D, referenced in and attached to the Assessing Ordinance and most recently amended in Section 2 of Ordinance No. 213-2017 and restated in its entirety in Attachment A referenced in that Section 2 and attached to Ordinance No. 213-2017, is hereby amended in its entirety to read as set forth in Attachment A to this ordinance, incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 3. Section 5. AUTHORIZING the payment of \$10,250 to Power Equipment Solutions, Inc. from the Department of Parks Cincinnati Riverfront Park Fund 329 non-personnel operating budget account no. $329 \times 202 \times 8000 \times 7413$ for charges related to golf cart rentals used by the Cincinnati Parks Department from April 1, 2024, through May 12, 2024, pursuant to the attached then and now certificate from the Director of Finance.

Approval of this Emergency Ordinance authorizes the payment of \$10,250.00 from existing resources in the Department of Parks Cincinnati Riverfront Park Fund 329 non-personnel operating budget account no. 329x202x8000x7413 to Power Equipment Solutions, Inc. ("Contractor") for charges related to golf cart rentals used by the Parks Department from April 1, 2024, through May 12, 2024, pursuant to the attached then and now certificate from the Director of Finance.

The City entered into a contract beginning on April 1, 2024, with the Contractor for golf cart rental services for the Parks Department. Although the Parks Department received a request to encumber funds for the contract in March 2024, staff turnover and procurement processes resulted in a delay in approving the encumbrance. The request to encumber funds to the contract was not approved until May 12, 2024, which was 41 days after the Contractor began providing services. During the period preceding the approval, and pursuant to the terms of the contract, Contractor provided the Parks Department with services amounting to \$10,250.00.

Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Section 5705.41(D)(1), the Director of Finance issued the attached certificate, verifying that a sufficient sum was appropriated and in the City Treasury for the purpose of paying such charges under the contract both at the time the contract began and at the time the attached certificate was issued.

The reason for the emergency is the immediate need to pay Power Equipment Solutions, Inc. for the outstanding charges in a timely manner.

Subject: Emergency Ordinance - CRS Retiree Healthcare Point System

Amendment

Attached is an Emergency Ordinance captioned:

MODIFYING the provisions of Chapter 203, "Employees' Retirement System," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code by AMENDING Section 203-0, "Legislative Finding," and Section 203-44, "Health Care Benefits for Membership Dates On and After January 9, 1997," to clarify that subsequent court orders in the case of Sunyak, et al. v. City of Cincinnati, et al. Case: 1:11-cv-00445-MRB, in the United States District Court, Southern District of Ohio, Western Division supersede the provision of Chapter 203 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code and to implement the new points system agreed to by the parties to the collaborative settlement agreement.

The Cincinnati Municipal Code Chapter 203.44 provides that CRS Members who have a CRS membership date from January 9, 1997, to December 31, 2015, are subject to the Point System for determining the member's share of the monthly healthcare premiums. Under the Point System, the sum of the member's service credit (in whole years/no fractions) and the member's age at separation (in whole years/no fractions), provide a point total for determining the member's share of the monthly retiree healthcare premiums.

As a result of the Point System, determining monthly healthcare premiums for eligible CRS members who retire has been adjusted to make the 10% subsidized premium available to members with 85 points (it previously required 90 points) and the 20% subsidized premium available to members with 80 to 84 points.

The reason for the emergency is to implement this change to be effective at the earliest possible date. The Administration recommends passage of this Emergency Ordinance.

MODIFYING the provisions of Chapter 203, "Employees' Retirement System," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code by AMENDING Sections 203-0, "Legislative Finding," and 203-44, "Health Care Benefits for Membership Dates On and After January 9, 1997," to clarify that subsequent court orders in the case of Sunyak, et al. v. City of Cincinnati, et al., Case: 1:11-cv-00445-MRB, in the United States District Court, Southern District of Ohio, Western Division, supersede the provisions of Chapter 203 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code and to implement the new points system for health care premiums for certain retirees as agreed to by the parties to the collaborative settlement agreement.

WHEREAS, in 2015 the City of Cincinnati entered into a collaborative settlement agreement ("CSA") to resolve claims made by members of the Cincinnati Retirement System in the case of Sunyak, et al. v. City of Cincinnati, et al. ("Pension Litigation"), Case: 1:11-cv-00445-MRB, in the United States District Court, Southern District of Ohio, Western Division; and

WHEREAS, the CSA required the parties to the Pension Litigation to continue to negotiate several remaining issues after the execution of the CSA, including changes to the percentages of healthcare premiums that certain retired members are required to pay for healthcare coverage ("Points System"); and

WHEREAS, the parties to the Pension Litigation have agreed on changes to the Points System and the Court has entered an order in the Pension Litigation requiring that the agreed upon changes be implemented; and

WHEREAS, the Cincinnati Retirement System desires to revise the Cincinnati Municipal Code to conform with the Court order and to make clear that subsequent orders from the Court related to the Pension Litigation supersede the provisions of the Municipal Code; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That existing Sections 203-0, "Legislative Finding," and 203-44, "Health Care Benefits for Membership Dates On and After January 9, 1997," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are amended to read as follows:

Sec. 203-0. Legislative Finding.

The Council established a Retirement System for employees of the City of Cincinnati by the passage of Ordinance No. 412-1931 on June 22, 1931, and the Retirement System became operational on August 1, 1931. This system was established as a defined benefit plan and provides for retirement benefits, including survivor benefits, based on age, years of service and

wages. The system has been continuously maintained since its establishment, and has been modified from time to time in order to define and modify, as appropriate, benefits provided to its Members. The system is overseen by a Board of Trustees, which operates under the provisions of Article XV of the Adm. Code of the City. The trustees administer the system and invest its assets. Trustee duties are to be performed solely in the interests of the Members and their Optionees and Beneficiaries, for the exclusive purpose of providing benefits to Members and their Optionees and Beneficiaries and defraying the reasonable expenses of administering the system. Such duties are to be performed with the care, skill, prudence, and diligence more particularly described in this Chapter. The system is recognized by the State of Ohio. The system is a qualified benefit plan under the laws and regulations set forth in the U.S. Internal Revenue Code.

There are some Members of the system who are current or former employees of the University of Cincinnati and University Hospital, which institutions were formerly, in whole or in part, under the jurisdiction of the City. There are also some Members of the system who are current or former employees of Hamilton County, which employee functions were transferred from the jurisdiction of the City of Cincinnati to Hamilton County over the years. There are specific Ohio Revised Code provisions that recognize the Membership of these non-City employees in the Cincinnati Retirement System.

On May 7, 2015, a Collaborative Settlement Agreement was entered in the case of Sunyak, et al. v. City of Cincinnati, et al. (the City of Cincinnati Pension Litigation), Case: 1:11-cv-00445-MRB, in the United States District Court, Southern District of Ohio, Western Division. To the extent that there is any conflict between the provisions of Chapter 203 and the terms of the Collaborative Settlement Agreement or any subsequent court orders in the City of Cincinnati Pension Litigation, the terms of the Collaborative Settlement Agreement and any subsequent Pension Litigation court orders shall govern.

Sec. 203-44. Health Care Benefits For Membership Dates On and After January 9, 1997.

- (a) In addition to other benefits provided in this chapter, the Retiree health care benefits described in this Section shall be provided to the following persons:
 - (i) A Member whose most recent membership enrollment date is on or after January 9, 1997 and on or before December 31, 2015, and who:
 - (A) Retired on or after August 1, 2011 and on or before January 1, 2016 with 15 years of Membership Service and who is not entitled to benefits under Section 203-42 or 203-43, or
 - (B) Retires on or after February 1, 2016 and who is at least 60 years of age with a minimum of 20 years of Membership Service and who is not otherwise eligible for health care benefits under Section 203-42 or Section 203-43, or

- (C) Retires on or after February 1, 2016 with 30 or more years of Creditable Service consisting of a minimum of 20 years of Membership Service and who is not otherwise entitled to benefits under Section 203-42 or Section 203-43.
- (ii) Persons receiving the benefits of a retirement optional allowance under Section 203-63 of this Chapter, and who are eligible for benefits under Section 203-48 of this Chapter, provided that the Member satisfied the requirements of paragraph (i) above at the time the Member retired and who is not otherwise entitled to benefits under Section 203-42 or Section 203-43.
- (iii) Members whose most recent membership enrollment date is on or after January 9, 1997 and who are not covered by the provisions of the Collaborative Settlement Agreement and who retire on or after February 1, 2016 and on or before January 1, 2017 and who have at least 15 years of Membership Service.
- (iv) Each surviving spouse, and each eligible dependent child or orphan of a deceased Active Member who would have been eligible for benefits under this section, who is receiving survivor benefits as provided in Section 203-49 of this Chapter, provided that:
 - (A) the deceased Active Member's most recent membership enrollment date is on or after January 9, 1997 and on or before December 31, 2015; and
 - (B) a surviving spouse may only obtain benefits if the surviving spouse possessed a valid marriage certificate or other proof of marriage recognized by the State of Ohio, dated prior to the date of the Active Member's death. However, if the deceased Active Member dies on or after January 1, 2019, the surviving spouse is eligible for coverage only if the spouse was not legally separated from the deceased Active Member at the time of the deceased Active Member's death.

Accordingly, the provisions of Section 203-33 of this Chapter, which provide for Service Retirement Allowances after vesting, shall not entitle Members who are so vested to health care benefits under the provisions of this Section unless such Members also qualify for health care benefits under the provisions of this Section.

- (b) The benefits to be provided under this Section are:
 - (i) Medical and prescription drug coverage similar to the most favorable plan available to active Employees, excluding Police, Fire, and Building & Trade unions; and subject to Member premium contributions described in (c) below; and

- (ii) Dental and vision insurance coverage shall be purchased and fully paid for by the Retiree, their surviving spouse, and their eligible dependents or orphans.
- (iii) Any person eligible to receive healthcare coverage under this Chapter who is eligible for coverage under Medicare shall apply for Medicare coverage and provide documentation to the Retirement System that is acceptable to the Retirement System that confirms either acceptance or denial for such coverage. To the extent allowable under applicable federal law, coverage under this Section for any person who is eligible to be covered under Medicare shall be secondary to coverage of such person under Medicare. The benefit payable under this Section shall be reduced by the greater of: (a) the amount actually paid by Medicare Part A and Part B; or (b) the amount Medicare would pay if the person were enrolled in Medicare Part A and/or Part B. A person is considered eligible for Medicare for these purposes during any period such person has coverage under Medicare Part A or Part B or, while otherwise qualifying for coverage under Medicare Part A or Part B, does not have such coverage under Medicare Part A (premium free) or Part B solely because such person has refused, discontinued, or failed to make any necessary application or applicable payment for Medicare Part A or Part B coverage.
- (c) Except for dental and vision insurance coverage, the percentage of the full funding rates, or premiums, for medical and prescription drug coverage to be paid by the Retirement System on behalf of persons entitled to benefits under this Section shall be based on a formula consisting of the sum of (i) the number of the Member's full years of Creditable Service, and (ii) the Member's age at the earlier of the Member's Retirement date or the date that the Member ceased to be an Active Member, with each such full year of Membership Service and each such year of age at Retirement date counting as one point each. Years of age at Retirement shall mean years of age at the birthday immediately preceding the earlier of the Member's Retirement date or the date that the Member ceased to be an Active Member. The number of full years of Creditable Service and the years of age at Retirement date shall be added together and shall result in the payment of medical and prescription drug coverage in the following percentage amounts:

9590% of full cost or full premiums for 90 85 points

7580% of full cost or full premiums for 80 to 8984 points

5060% of full cost or full premiums for 70 to 79 points

2540% of full cost or full premiums for 60 to 69 points

If a Member's total points are less than 60, the Member is only eligible for individual medical and prescription drug coverage. The Retirement System will pay 25% of the premium for individual medical and prescription drug coverage. No spouse or family coverage is available.

A Member's years of Creditable Service shall be used for the purpose of determining the points of a Member under this subsection (c), but will not include years of Creditable Service credited under a previous Service Retirement Allowance provided under this Chapter.

- (d) If a Member leaves the City service prior to Retirement and is entitled to a deferred Service Retirement Allowance and such Member is entitled to benefits under this Section, no benefits shall be provided to the Member until the Member reaches the later of their normal retirement date, or their Medicare eligibility age.
- (e) Any Inactive Member who is rehired on or after January 1, 2016 shall not be eligible for benefits under this Section.
- (f) The director of retirement shall adopt rules and procedures necessary to implement this Section.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare and shall, subject to the terms of Article II, Section 6 of the Charter, be effective immediately. The reason for the emergency is the immediate need to implement the changes to the health points system as agreed to by the parties to the Collaborative Settlement Agreement.
