- Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act = Bipartisan Infrastructure Deal
= Bipartisan Infrastructure Law
- \$1.2 Trillion (\$550 Billion in new funding)
- +2,500 Pages of legislation
- +350 Programs across federal departments and agencies

General Parameters

- Increased funding for existing programs – 5 FY horizon
- Adds \$550 billion new investments
 - Transportation: \$284 billion
 - \$110 billion for roads, bridges
 - Core Infrastructure: \$266 billion

Funding Mechanisms

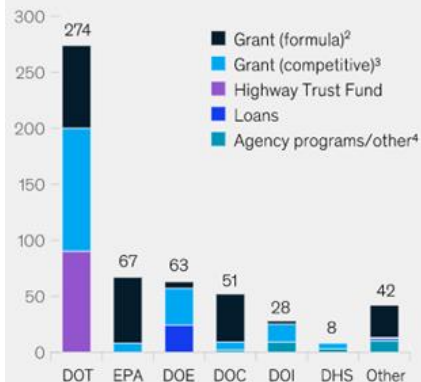
Three Delivery Methods

- Direct Federal Procurement
- Federal Grants
- Suballocations from States
 - Grants
 - Loans

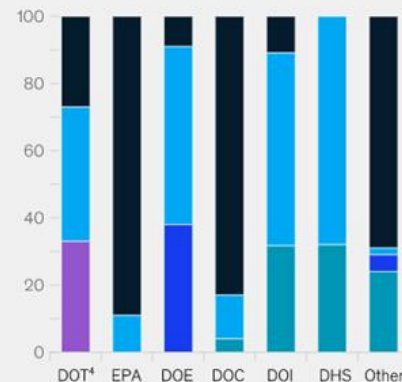
The Department of Transportation will direct more than half of all new funding under the US Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.

City Considerations to Access

- Operationalizing the Administration response
 - *City Manager's Office*
 - *Project / program lead and tracking opportunities; identify and pursue key opportunity areas, establishes applicability per regulations / eligibility; informs grant strategy and coordinates development*
 - *Primary impacted agencies/departments*
 - *Technical specifications; pre-application studies/plans development, app requirements, grant writing; project delivery*
 - *Department of Transportation & Engineering*
 - *Enterprise Technology Solutions (ETS)*
 - *Greater Cincinnati Water Works*
 - *MSD of Greater Cincinnati*
 - *Office of Environment & Sustainability*
- Leveraging external partnerships, early and frequent communications
- Maintaining relationships with lead agencies
