BACKGROUND:

On August 23, 2021, an application for the designation of St. Mark Church as a Local Historic Landmark was submitted by the Evanston Community Council. The application was deemed complete by the Urban Conservator on August 24, 2021. According to the Cincinnati Zoning Code (§1435-07-2-B), an application for the designation of a Local Historic Landmark shall be forwarded to the City Planning Commission following a public hearing of the Historic Conservation Board.

On October 11, 2021, the Historic Conservation Board (HCB) held a public hearing on the Local Historic Landmark designation application. After receiving evidence and testimony from the Urban Conservator and proponents of the designation, a quorum of six board members voted unanimously to approve and recommend St. Mark Church to the City Planning Commission and City Council for approval.

The City Planning Commission is charged with determining whether to follow the recommendation of the Historic Conservation Board (§1435-07-2-B-C). In making such determination, the City Planning Commission shall consider the following factors:

- 1) The relationship of the proposed designation to the comprehensive plans of the city and of the community in which the proposed Historic Landmark is located; and
- 2) The effect of the proposed designation on the surrounding areas and economic development plans of the city; and
- 3) Such other planning and historic preservation considerations as may be relevant to the proposed designation.

The City Planning Commission has the duty to decide whether to approve or disapprove the designation and forward its decision, whether favorable or not, along with the conservation guidelines, to City Council.

Setting:

St. Mark Church occupies a 2.3-acre site at the northeast corner of the intersection of Montgomery Road and Duck Creek Road in Evanston. The church faces Montgomery Road at an angle with a grassy lawn to the north and a small parking area to the south. The former parish school is located at the south side of the lot, facing Duck Creek Road. At the rear of the property is a paved parking lot.

This property consists of Hamilton County Parcel 058-0001-0002, which is bounded on the north by Interstate 71, on the east by Stacey Avenue, on the south by Duck Creek Road, and on the west by Montgomery Road. To the south, across Duck Creek Road, are three adjoining cemeteries: Walnut Hills, United Jewish, and Catholic Calvary.

Historical Overview:

Cincinnati's population growth in the early twentieth century resulted in new business districts, churches, and schools to serve the growing population. The Archdiocese of Cincinnati purchased land for a church in 1906 and the original church building, a modest frame structure that also housed a school, was built soon afterward. The cornerstone for the present St. Mark Church was laid in 1914 and the completed church building was dedicated in 1916.

At its height, the St. Mark congregation consisted of 1,200 families. As the neighborhood's demographics changed, St. Mark became a predominantly African American parish, one of several in the city. As years passed, the neighborhood was adversely impacted by urban sprawl. Many longtime members moved to new suburbs, and Evanston's social and economic vitality slowly declined. The construction of Interstate 71 in 1972 resulted in the demolition of many homes to make way for the highway.

In 2010, the Archdiocese of Cincinnati merged St. Mark with three other predominantly African American parishes: St. Agnes in Bond Hill, St. Martin de Porres in Lincoln Heights, and St. Andrew in Avondale. Housed in the St. Agnes building, the new parish church was renamed the Church of the Resurrection. St. Mark has been vacant for ten years and the church structure is in need of repairs due to serious water infiltration.

General Description:

St. Mark Church is a locally rare and significant example of the Italian Renaissance Revival style applied to a church building. It is a large, basilica-plan church with transept and semicircular apse. The church is largely unaltered on the exterior, looking much as it did as when constructed in 1916. The walls are covered with light brown brick and terra cotta facing. The main façade features three doorways, brick pilasters with stone capitals, and a broken pediment topped by a cross. It is sheltered by an arcaded porch with circular medallions, carried by four columns with pronounced entasis. The front-gabled roof is covered with imported Roman orange tile. To the right of the church stands a freestanding six-story, 130-foot bell tower.

The interior of the church features a barrel-vaulted, coffered ceiling with arcaded side aisles. The space is illuminated by two tiers of stained-glass windows, most of which remain in place, crafted by Zettler of Munich, Germany. The main and side altars and the pews been removed from the space.

Significance:

St. Mark Church is nominated as significant under Criterion 3 of the Cincinnati Zoning Code (§1435-07-1):

- 3. Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, method of construction or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction;
- St. Mark Church meets Criterion 3 for architectural significance as a significant and well-preserved example of the Italian Renaissance Revival style. Imposing scale and formal design, incorporating classical details such as columns and round arches and balustrades, are the most dominant features of this style.
- St. Mark is the only known Cincinnati work by Chicago architect Henry Schlacks. Associate architects Joseph Steinkamp and Brother, who designed numerous significant properties in Cincinnati, also contributed to its design.

ANALYSIS:

According to the Cincinnati Zoning Code (§1435-01-H3), certain findings must be made before a Local Historic Landmark can be designated by City Council. The building must be found to have historic significance. Historic significance means that the attributes of the landmark must possess integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association, and:

- 1. That are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history; or
- 2. That are associated with the lives of persons significant in our past; or
- 3. That embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period or method of construction, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction; or
- 4. That has yielded, or may be likely to yield information important in history or prehistory.
- St. Mark Church is nominated under Criterion 3, "Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, method of construction or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction".
- St. Mark Church is a locally rare and significant example of the Italian Renaissance Revival style applied to a church building. The designation report and the documentation provided indicates that the building meets the criteria. The building incorporates identifiable features of low-pitched roof, symmetrical facade, masonry, impressive size and scale, round arch entrance and windows, and classical details including columns, dental molding, and pilasters. The church also includes additional high style elements including imported terracotta roof tiles and a 130-foot-tall bell tower. The building was designed by prominent architect Henry Schlacks, with local support by the architects Joseph Steinkamp and Brother. This is the only known work by Henry Schlacks within Cincinnati.

In summary, staff recommends the designation of St. Mark Church under section §1435-07-1(a)(3) of the Zoning Code. The documentation in the attached designation and staff reports provides conclusive evidence that all required findings may be made for the proposed designation under criterion 3. The proposed conservation guidelines for the structure are sufficient and have been included.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

The Department of City Planning and Engagement held a virtual public staff conference on the proposed designation on September 16, 2021. Notices were sent to property owners within a 400-foot radius of

the subject property, the property owner, and the Evanston Community Council. The applicants, City staff, the property owner's representative, and members from the public were in attendance. Eight people spoke in support of the proposed designation and three people spoke against the proposed designation, including the property owner's representative.

The Historic Conservation Board also held a public hearing at its meeting on October 11, 2021. Nine attendees spoke in support of the proposed designation. More than fifty letters and emails of support for the proposed designation were received, in addition to two petitions, with more than seven hundred signatures, in support of the proposed designation have been received and are included as Exhibit D.

All property owners within a 400-foot radius of the subject property, the property owner, and the Evanston Community Council were sent notification of the November 19, 2021 City Planning Commission meeting on November 4, 2021, in addition to all staff conference attendees.

CONSISTENCY WITH PLANS:

Plan Cincinnati (2012)

The proposed designation is consistent with the Sustain Initiative Area of *Plan Cincinnati*, specifically the Goal to, "Preserve our natural and built environment" (p. 193). This designation will help to preserve this architecturally significant building, making the building eligible for state historic rehabilitation tax incentives to be used to renovate the church building.

Evanston Work Plan (2019)

The proposed designation is consistent with the Evanston Work Plan, a plan of action created by the Evanston community for the Evanston community. It is specifically consistent with the Goal in the Celebrating and Preserving Evanston section to "Build upon its rich history through the preservation of buildings and the stories from residents past and present who shaped the neighborhood". Within that goal is the action step to "Submit the application to the City designating St. Mark's as an historic landmark" (p. 76).

RECOMMENDATION:

The staff of the Department of City Planning and Engagement recommends that the City Planning Commission take the following actions:

- 1) APPROVE the proposed designation of St. Mark's Church as a Local Historic Landmark at 3500 Montgomery Road in Evanston under criterion 3 of the Cincinnati Zoning Code (§1435-07-1a) and;
- 2) ADOPT the conservation guidelines.



Introduction

This report represents the finding and recommendation for local historic landmark designation of the former St. Mark's Church in Evanston. The Cincinnati Preservation Association prepared this report.

Background

The Evanston Community Council has an interest in the preservation of the St. Mark's church building. Closed since 2010, it is vacant and deteriorating. It is the wish of the Community Council to acquire the building and repurpose it as a multi-purpose arts, community and event center.

Research

Research was conducted using the resources of the Cincinnati Preservation
Association. Resources include various newspaper articles, the Federal Writers
Project's Cincinnati: A Guide to the Queen City and Its Neighbors (1943), the Cincinnati
Historic Inventory, and Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps of Cincinnati.

Statement of Significance

St. Mark's is a locally rare and significant example of the Italian Renaissance Revival style applied to a church building. Its design reflects the influence of Classicism as applied to a house of worship in the early 20th century. The church is largely unaltered on the exterior, looking much as it did as when constructed in 1916. Although some sacred artifacts, as well as the pews, were removed from the interior when the church closed, the building retains its original stained glass windows and decorative finishes. St. Mark's is the only known Cincinnati work by Chicago ecclesiastical architect Henry Schlacks. Associate architects Joseph Steinkamp and Brother, who designed numerous significant properties in Cincinnati, also contributed to its design. St. Mark's building received a rating of Excellent by a citywide inventory of historic properties undertaken in 1977. The church is currently being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places by the Evanston Community Council.

Description of Property

Structure. St. Mark's church building occupies a 2.3 acre site on Montgomery Road just south of Interstate 71. Parcel ID 058-0001-0002-00. It is a large, basilica-plan church with transept and semicircular apse. The walls are covered with light brown brick and

terra cotta. The main façade features three doorways, brick pilasters with stone capitals, and a broken pediment topped by a cross. It is sheltered by an arcaded porch with circular medallions, carried by four columns with pronounced entasis. A large rose window bears images of angels playing musical instruments. The front-gabled roof is covered with imported Roman orange tile. To the right of the church stands a freestanding six-story, 130-foot campanile.

Inside, the nave features a barrel-vaulted, coffered ceiling with arcaded side aisles. The space is illuminated by two tiers of stained glass windows crafted by Zettler of Munich, Germany, most of which are still in place. The larger windows depict episodes in the life of Christ, while the smaller ones feature abstract, geometrical designs. The main and side altars and the pews been removed from the sanctuary.

The chancel walls, as well as bands crossing the ceiling of the nave, are covered with stylized floral stenciling. Sheltering the chancel is a baldachin of Breccia marble with star-sprinkled mosaic dome and pierced marble carvings, supported by pairs of richly carved marble composite columns. Encircling the chancel is a mural depicting angels and apostles.

At either side of the sanctuary, where the side altars formerly were located, are surviving mosaics dedicated to the Christ Child, the Virgin Mary and St. Joseph. A mural, painted by Leo Mirabile, represents the Lamb of God. Black and white marble tiles cover the chancel floor.

The church building's lower level formerly housed parish recreational and social activities and, later, social service programs. The utilitarian spaces feature modern finishes including concrete floors, dropped ceilings and fluorescent lights as well as 1950s-era knotty pine paneling.

Inside the church, the nave features a barrel-vaulted, coffered ceiling with arcaded side aisles. The space is illuminated by two tiers of stained glass windows, most of which remain in place, crafted by Zettler of Munich, Germany. The larger windows depict episodes in the life of Christ, while the smaller ones feature abstract designs. The main and side altars and the pews been removed from the space.

The chancel walls, as well as bands crossing the ceiling of the nave, are covered with stylized floral stenciling. Sheltering the chancel is a baldachin of Breccia marble with star-sprinkled mosaic dome and pierced marble carvings, supported by pairs of richly carved marble composite columns. Encircling the chancel is a mural depicting angels and apostles.

Flanking the main altar are side altars featuring mosaics dedicated to the Christ Child, the Virgin Mary and St. Joseph. A mural, painted by Leo Mirabile, represents the Lamb of God. Black and white marble tiles cover the chancel floor.


The church building's lower level formerly housed recreational activities and, later, social service programs. The utilitarian spaces feature modern finishes including concrete floors, dropped ceilings and fluorescent lights as well as 1950s-era knotty pine paneling.

Site. St. Mark's parish buildings are located on the east side of Montgomery Road between Duck Creek Road and Interstate 71. The church faces Montgomery Road at an angle with a grassy lawn to the north and a small parking area to the south. The former parish school is located at the south side of the lot, facing Duck Creek Road. At the rear of the property is a paved parking lot.

Setting. St. Mark's is located in Evanston, a former suburb later absorbed by Cincinnati. To the north, past I-71, is the Evanston business district. To the east is a row of six American Foursquare residences on Stacey Avenue. To the south, across Duck Creek Road, are three adjoining cemeteries: Walnut Hills, United Jewish and Catholic Calvary. To the west, across Montgomery Road, is a row of four brick and frame residences and an apartment building.

Boundary

This property consists of Parcel 058-0001-0002-00 of the Hamilton County Auditor's records. The parcel is bounded on the north by Interstate 71, on the east by Stacey Avenue, on the south by Duck Creek Road, and on the west by Montgomery Road (US 22-Ohio Route 3).



Justification of Boundary

The above-described boundary constitutes the entire parcel.

Findings

Compatibility With Plan Cincinnati

Sustain Goal 2b: "Preserve Our Built History. Preserve our built history with new development incentives and regulatory measures. Cincinnati's rich history is best exemplified through our historic buildings and by the built-environment that helps define a neighborhood's character...." Landmark designation allows for preservation of a highly significant structure in danger of destruction. It will further allow for state historic rehabilitation tax incentives to be used to renovate the church building, thereby preserving this true Cincinnati landmark for future generations to appreciate and enjoy.

Planning Considerations

Summary of Findings

According to Chapter 1435 of the Cincinnati Zoning Code (Historic Preservation), certain findings must be made before a historic structure can be designated by City Council. The structure must be found to have historic significance. Historic significance means that that the attributes of a district, site, or structure that possess integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association, and:

- 1. That are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history; or
- 2. That are associated with the lives of persons significant in our past; or
- 3. That embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period or method of construction, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction; or
- 4. That has yielded, or may be likely to yield information important in history or pre-history.'

St. Mark's Church has historical significance according to Chapter 1435 of the Cincinnati municipal code. The church building meets Criterion 3 for architectural significance as a significant and well-preserved example of the Italian Renaissance Revival style. This style developed at the end of the Victorian period of architecture. Like the earlier Italianate style, the Italianate Renaissance Revival was modeled on the buildings of the 16th century Italian Renaissance. However, Italian Renaissance Revival buildings are much closer stylistically to the original Renaissance forms than their Italianate predecessors. Imposing scale and formal design, incorporating classical details such as columns and round arches and balustrades, are the most dominant features of this style.

The Italian Renaissance Revival style was first popularized on the East Coast by architects such as McKim, Mead & White as early as the 1880s. This elegant style is seen mostly in grandly scaled, architect-designed structures, such as mansions or public buildings.

St. Mark Church Historical Overview

"Erected at a cost of \$150,000, [St. Mark] seats 850, exclusive of the choir gallery and two votive chapels accommodating 150. The exterior is of brick with terra cotta facing, colored to match Roman Travertine stone, with Verona façade and free-standing campanile tower. The roofing is of imported Roman tile. Imposing marble altars and bas-relief statues are in the interior" (Cincinnati: A Guide to the Queen City and Its Neighbors, American Guide Series [Cincinnati, Ohio: The Wiesen-Hart Press, 1943], p. 317).

During the early 20th century, Cincinnati's growing population expanded along arterial streets to the north, east and west, such as Montgomery Road, Harrison Avenue and Madison Road. In these expanding suburban neighborhoods, new business districts, churches and schools were established to serve the growing populations annexed by Cincinnati.

One of the neighborhoods that benefited from this expansion was the east side community of Evanston, which was annexed by Cincinnati in 1911. The *Cincinnati Guide* describes Evanston as "a pleasant suburb, with a small factory district along the tracks and middle-class suburban homes to the east" (ibid., p. 316).

A major landmark of the new community was St. Mark Catholic Church, at the intersection of Montgomery and Duck Creek roads. The congregation was founded in 1905 and staffed by the Missionaries of the Precious Blood order. The Archdiocese of Cincinnati purchased land for a church in 1906 and the original church building, a modest frame structure that also housed a school, was built soon afterward (date not confirmed). The cornerstone for the present St. Mark's Church was laid in 1914 and the completed church building was dedicated in 1916.

Decline and Renewal. At its apex in the mid-20th century, 1,200 families worshiped at St. Mark. Over time, as the neighborhood's demographics changed, St. Mark became a predominantly African American parish: one of several in the city. As years passed, the neighborhood was adversely impacted by urban sprawl. Many longtime members moved to new suburbs, and Evanston's social and economic vitality slowly declined. Another blow to the neighborhood was the construction in 1972 of Interstate 71 nearby. Hundreds of homes were demolished for the highway, thereby draining vitality from the neighborhood and starving the church of its congregation.

In 2010, the Archdiocese of Cincinnati merged St. Mark's with three other predominantly African-American parishes: St. Agnes in Bond Hill, St. Martin de Porres in Lincoln Heights, and St. Andrew in Avondale. Housed in the St. Agnes building, the new parish church was renamed the Church of the Resurrection.

In the late 20th century, the growing popularity of the Latin Mass among traditionalist Catholics led the Archdiocese to consider the now-vacated St. Mark as a new location for traditional Latin liturgy. However, the plan failed to materialize.

Now vacant for ten years, St. Mark's is in urgent need of repairs. The building suffers from serious water infiltration, plaster damage and mold infestation and is a target for vandals.

The Evanston Community Council sees the revitalization of St. Mark's as a primary goal for their community. The Council is leading the effort to save and repurpose the historic church as a community, arts and event center. In addition to being nominated as a City landmark, St. Mark's also is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places.

Architectural Context. The popularity of classically inspired church buildings increased dramatically in the late 19th and early 20th centuries as America became enamored of grand Classical architecture based on Renaissance precedents. The Classical architecture of ancient Greece and Rome, along with its reinterpretations in Italy, France, England, and Germany during the 15th through 19th centuries, became the basis for several inter-related revivalist architectural styles, including the Renaissance Revival, that were important in the United States in general during the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Buildings such as the brownstone row house complex for Henry Villard (1882-1885) on New York's Madison Avenue, the Boston Public Library (1888-1895), and Judson Memorial Church on New York's Washington Square (1888-1893), all by prominent New York architects McKim, Mead, & White, were early expressions of this change in architectural taste. In addition, the elaborate Classical style of the World's Columbian Exposition was a watershed event in American architecture and generated great and widespread enthusiasm for Classical architectural styles throughout the United States.

The Renaissance Revival style was particularly important in the design of early 20th - century church buildings. Both church hierarchies and architects increasingly saw Classical architecture as an appropriate style for churches and related religious buildings. Christianity's early history, rooted in the Classical culture of ancient Rome, and the great Christian churches of the 5th and 6th centuries that were the earliest

grand architectural expressions of this religious faith, made Classicism seem both rationally and emotionally appropriate for modern church buildings. Classicism's rebirth as the architectural style of choice for 15th-century Italian Renaissance church buildings and its subsequent importance for church architecture during the next four centuries solidified these important associations with Christianity. The "American Renaissance" of the late 19th and early 20th centuries saw the construction of impressive classically inspired buildings for American government agencies, libraries, museums, and churches through the 1920s.

Architect Henry J. Schlacks. Henry John Schlacks (1867-1938) was one of Chicago's most prominent church architects in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, a period of tremendous growth for the city's neighborhoods and the construction of churches. Born to German parents in Chicago, Schlacks attended St. Peter School before working as a draftsman for the noted architectural firm of Adler & Sullivan. He then received two years of architectural education at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, America's premier architectural school in the late 19th century, followed by extensive travel in Europe. While touring the continent, he observed historic buildings first-hand, including churches, that would inspire his later practice. Upon his return to Chicago, Schlacks entered into a partnership with fellow architect Henry Ottenheimer, another former Adler & Sullivan draftsman, in 1891. Four years later, in 1895, Schlacks began solo practice. Although Schlacks designed a variety of building types during his career, he soon became known as a specialist in ecclesiastical architecture. In *To Build the Catholic City*, author Edward R. Kantowicz called Schlacks "the master of Catholic church architecture in Chicago."

Joseph G. Steinkamp and Brother, architects. Joseph G. Steinkamp began his career working in the architectural office of his father, Joseph B. Steinkamp. He later worked on his own account until he was joined by his younger brother, Bernard F. Steinkamp, as Joseph G. Steinkamp & Brother, around 1900. The two worked together and on their own for about half a century.

The Steinkamp brothers went on to design and construct numerous apartment buildings for the Emery family in the downtown core and in the inner suburbs, usually located on streetcar lines. These include The Waldo apartment building at Eighth and Elm streets (a contributing building in the Ninth Street Historic District), the Roanoke Apartments in the Clifton gaslight district, and Haddon Hall in Avondale (National Register, 1982). The brothers' early 20th-century works include the Young Men's Mercantile Library Building (1902) on Walnut Street. Other notable works of the firm included the Tudor Revival buildings of the Xavier University campus in Evanston; the Robertson Building at Seventh and Race streets, a reinforced concrete office building with unusual Celtic

interlace cladding of "Lawson's Composite Cut Stone"; and the Art Deco-style American Building at Central Parkway and Walnut Street.

Italian Renaissance Revival context.

"The Italian Renaissance Revival style was first popularized on the East Coast by architects such as McKim, Mead & White as early as the 1880s. The most predominant feature of this style is its imposing scale and formal design incorporating classical details such as columns and round arches and balustrades. This style can take several distinction forms, but all variations are almost always of masonry (usually stone) construction. One version of the style features a large rectangular building, usually three or more stories in height, topped by a flat roof with a crowning balustrade. Another common feature for this flat roof version...is a rusticated stone first floor with upper floors having a smooth finish. Porch arcades and porticos are often seen in this version as well. The other most common form of this style features a hipped roof, often of clay tile, with broadly overhanging, bracketed eaves.

"This elegant style is seen mostly in up-scale, architect-designed buildings, such as mansions or public buildings" (Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission, "Pennsylvania Architectural Field Guide, Italian Renaissance Revival Style, 1890-1930" (available online at http://www.phmc.state.pa.us/).

Identifiable features of Italian Renaissance buildings include

- 1. Low-pitched hipped or flat roof
- 2. Symmetrical façade
- 3. Masonry construction
- 4. Impressive size and scale
- 5. Round arch entrance and windows
- 6. Classical details: columns, pilasters
- 7. Roof line parapet or balustrade
- 8. Arcaded and rusticated ground level

Representative Italian Renaissance Revival buildings in Cincinnati

Residential:

Herschede Mansion, 3886 Reading Road (Samuel S. Godley, architect, c. 1908): Outstanding example of Italian Renaissance executed in limestone with decorative window treatment, hipped tile roof.

May Mansion, 3723 Washington Avenue (McMiller & Taft, architects, built 1911). Imposing stone mansion with two levels of stone steps leading to an open veranda spanning the front of the house. The three doorways are framed by Tuscan columns with plain capitals. Above is a heavy architrave with dentils and a projecting belt course. Listed in National Register, 1996.

Public:

Cincinnati Gymnasium & Athletic Club (John Scudder Adkins, architect, 1902): Located in downtown Cincinnati, this imposing brick building is trimmed with stone and metal elements including rusticated stone courses, molded balustrade and trimmed windows. National Register, 1983.

Mt. Echo Park Pavilion (Rendigs, Panzer & Martin, architects, 1928). "The handsome shelterhouse, 825 feet above sea level, has a pavilion with columns that support a series of arches. These arches provide an artistic frame of a vast panoramic view that can be had from the pavilion" (*The Cincinnati Guide*, op.cit., p. 464).

Ault Park Pavilion (Fechheimer & Ihorst, architects, 1930). The pavilion is faced with tile and supported by a quintuple arch. It is built into the side of a hill with a double flight of steps and a cascading backlit water fountain.

Madisonville Public Library (c. 1920). One-story, stucco-clad building, low and rectangular in form, under a hipped Spanish tile roof. A triple arch and delicate iron balustrade span the recessed porch.

ALTERATION AND REHABILITATION REVIEW CRITERIA:

GENERAL GUIDELINES

- 1. Avoid removing or altering historic material or distinctive architectural features; If it's original and in fairly good condition, try to keep it and repair it.
- 2. Don't try to make the building look older than it really is. This also applied to any future additions to the building. Do not try and make new additions look like they are original to the building.
- 3. A later addition to an old building may have gained significance on its own. Don't assume it's worthless just because it's not part of the original building.
- 4. Repair rather than replace whenever possible. If replacing, replicate the original
- 5. Be sensitive to distinct features and examples of skilled craftsmanship.
- 6. Surface cleaning should be done by the gentlest means possible. Don't sandblast or use other abrasive methods. Cleaning may not be necessary at all.
- 7. New additions should look new. They should be compatible with the existing structure but should not try to copy the old building.
- 8. Uncover original design features that may be buried under layers of improvements.
- 1. MATERIALS: REPAIR OR MATCH THE ORIGINAL AS CLOSELY AS POSSIBLE.

Original materials should be repaired, restored and reused whenever possible. Original materials should not be removed or covered. Where necessary, missing or deteriorated material should be replaced with appropriate recycled or new materials that match the original as closely as possible to:

WINDOWS: SHOULD REMAIN OPEN

The original pattern of window openings and their shape and configuration should not be altered. Window openings should not be reduced, enlarged or filled in on street facades. Replacement windows should match the original in size, shape, design and material. Vinyl replacement windows shall not be permitted.

2. Building code and egress requirements are different from what they were when the buildings were constructed. Conversion or window openings to door openings is allowed in order to meet egress and life and safety requirements.

- ORNAMENTATION: KEEP ORIGINAL ORNAMENTATION
 The existing architectural features that give buildings their character such as decorative piers, columns, brackets, decorative brickwork and terra cotta should be preserved. The addition of inappropriate and out-of-character features should be avoided.
- 4. MASONRY CLEANING: NEVER SANDBLAST OR DON'T CLEAN Cleaning of masonry is generally discouraged. If cleaning is necessary, it should be done by the least damaging method available, ranging from washing with a mild detergent and soft bristle brushes to chemical cleaning. Sandblasting is not an ace[table method for cleaning: is destroys brick and lessens the life of buildings. Sandblasting brick severely damages the surface.
- 5. SILICONE: AVOID WATER REPELLENT COATINGS
 Water repellant coatings (silicone) should never be used unless there is actual
 water penetration through the masonry units themselves, and if the problem is
 not caused by faulty or missing mortar, poorly functioning gutters and
 downspouts, or rising ground water.
 If water is penetrating through the masonry to interior surfaces, then only the
 affected area should be treated, and only after the masonry has been allowed to
 dry. Painting is more permanent and provides a good measure of waterproofing
 to masonry walls.
- PAINTING: IF IT WAS PAINTED, PAINT IT AGAIN
 Painted brick buildings should be repainted rather than stripped or cleaned to reveal the natural brick color. The color of trim and decorative detailing on a building should contrast with the wall paint color.
- 7. REPOINTING: USE THE RIGHT CEMENT AND MATCH MORTAR JOINTS. Remember that older, softer bricks require a softer mortar. In general, the mortar joint should be concave, as this gives the greatest bond of mortar to brick. Have a test sample analyzed and match the composition and color.
- 8. APPURTENANCES/AWNINGS: NO NOT COVER IMPORTANT FEATURES
 All appurtenances, such as light fixtures and signs, should be compatible with the
 building upon which they are to be installed. The installation of canvas canopies
 and awnings is permissible but should not obscure or require the removal of
 significant architectural features. Canopies and awnings mad of material other
 than canvas are discouraged unless there is precedence for the building or
 architectural style.
- 9. UTILITY/SYSTEM INSTALLATION: PLACE THEM INCONSOICUOUSLY \
 The installation of utility and mechanical systems such as water or gas meters, and central air conditioning units, should be inconspicuously placed and screening should be provided; the installation of such systems should be avoided on the street façade.

10. WALLS AND FENCES: RETAIN THE ORIGINAL

Existing retaining walls, gates and fences should be repaired and retained whenever possible. The installation of chain link fence shall be prohibited on the property.

11.PARKING: LOTS SHOULD BE SCREENED AND LANDSCAPED.
Parking should be designed so as not to detract from the visual quality of the district.

Screening should be sufficient to minimize the view or parked vehicles from other properties, from the street, and other public areas. Screening may employ masonry walls, landscaping and fencing. The design of this screening should be compatible with the district.

Within the interior of parking lots, there should be adequate landscaping, including planting islands containing trees to provide shade and to break up large areas of paving.

- 12. DEMOLITION: PERMITTED ONLY UNDER CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES

 Demolition of existing buildings shall not be permitted unless one of the following conditions exist:
 - a. Demolition has been ordered by the Director of Buildings & Inspections for reasons of public health and safety;
 - b. The owner can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Historic Conservation Board that the structure cannot be reused nor can a reasonable economic return be gained from the use of all or part of the building proposed for demolition. This review will be governed by Section 1435-09: Alterations and Demolitions: Certificate of Appropriateness; Minimum Maintenance, of the Cincinnati Zoning Code, ordained by Ordinance No. 217-2012, 1, effective July 20, 2012. Any updates, modifications, or amendments to this section of the Cincinnati Zoning Code or legislation that supersedes Chapter 1435 of the Cincinnati Zoning Code which is established as the "Historic Preservation Code," shall be considered the governing law. +
 - c. The demolition request is for an inappropriate addition, or a building of a later period, and the demolition of said structure will not adversely affect the streetscape as determined by the Historic Conservation Board.

NEW CONSTRUCTION/ADDITIONS: COMPATIBLE BUT NOT REPLICAS

New construction should not try to imitate the old, but should be compatible with respect to the following:

MATERIALS: The type of materials and their color, texture, scale and detailing should be compatible with the original building. Predominant materials are brick and stone.

SCALE: The scale of new work and its constituent parts should be compatible with the original building and the scale of its parts.

FORM: the shape, massing and proportions of new work should be compatible with the original building.

DETAILING: the detailing including, but not limited to, the following features and their placement on additions and new construction should be compatible with the building:

Walls roofs windows

Eaves cornices chimneys

Doors appurtenances

HEIGHT: The height of an addition should not exceed the height of the original building.

SETBACK: The setback of new buildings should be comparable to the siting of the original building.

HISTORIC INTEGRITY: Compatibility of new work to original work is required, but imitation of old work in new construction should be avoided.

If original openings are filled in on the side or rear elevations, the outline of the original opening should remain apparent by setting new infill material back from the surface and leaving original sills and lintels in place.

THESE GUIDELINES ARE NOT CAST IN CONCRETE.

They do not force you to do work on your property. They do not force you to "take the property back to the way it was." They can be waived or adjusted if the owner shows that sticking to the guidelines would cost more than he/she could afford. Ordinary repair and maintenance does not require review by the Historic Conservation Board.

Applicants are encouraged with consult with Historic Conservation Board staff before they finalize their plans and formally apply for a building permit.




Figure 2 Overall view of St. Mark from Montgomery Road. View to the NE.




Figure 3 Close-in view of church and campanile from front lawn. View to the NE.




Figure 6 View of interior of church from choir loft, with organ in foreground.




Figure 9 Detail view of mosaic wall treatment and brass cabinet for storage of holy oil.




Figure 12 Archival postcard view of St. Mark's Church (undated).

Nature of Request:

The applicant is requesting a Local Historic Landmark Designation for the property generally located at 3500 Montgomery Road, known as St. Mark's Church. The landmark designation is sought for the building and the site on the parcel 058-0001-0002.

The property has a determination of eligibility from the State Historic Preservation Office in regards to a submitted National Register Questionnaire. The property would be eligible under Criterion C: Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, method of construction or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction.

The applicants are also seeking National Register Individual Listing Status for this property.

The Evanston Community Council has authority to submit the application for designation of the property per 1435-07-2-A.

1435-07-2-A: Application for the consideration of the designation of a Historic District, Historic Landmark or a Historic Site may be made by the filing of a designation application, in such form as the Historic Conservation Board may prescribe, by the owner of the subject property or by the owner of a property within the area proposed to be designated, by Council or a member of Council, by the City Manager, by the Urban Conservator, by the City Planning Commission, or by a local community organization, including, but not limited to, preservation associations and community councils. No Historic Structure or Historic Site may be demolished or excavated during the pendency of a designation application, which commences upon the filing of a complete designation application.

Summary and Background:

From the Designation Report:

St. Mark's is a locally rare and significant example of the Italian Renaissance Revival style applied to a church building. Its design reflects the influence of Classicism as applied to a house of worship in the early 20th century. The church is largely unaltered on the exterior, looking much as it did as when constructed in 1916. Although some sacred artifacts, as well as the pews, were removed from the interior when the church closed, the building retains its original stained-glass windows and decorative finishes. St. Mark's is the only known Cincinnati work by Chicago ecclesiastical architect Henry Schlacks. Associate architects Joseph Steinkamp and Brother, who designed numerous significant properties in Cincinnati, also contributed to its design. St. Mark's building

received a rating of Excellent by a citywide inventory of historic properties undertaken in 1977.

Designation Review:

Historic Significance

Staff finds that, based on the attributes and architectural integrity as set forth in the Designation Report, 3500 Montgomery Road, meets the requirements prescribed in Chapter 1435, specifically §1435-07-1, "Becoming a Becoming a Historic Structure; Determination of Historic Significance".

The Cincinnati Zoning Code (CZC) § 1435-07-1(a), specifies that a structure or group of structures may be deemed as having Historic Significance if it has at least one of the following attributes:

- 1. Association with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history; or
- 2. Association with the lives of persons significant in our past; or
- 3. Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, method of construction or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction; or
- 4. That has yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in prehistory or history.

The Criteria in Chapter 1435-07-01 is based off of the criteria for the National Register of Historic Places and in fact models the language exactly.

The Historic Conservation Board is tasked with determining if it meets one of the Criteria set forth in Chapter 1435-07-1 of the Cincinnati Zoning Code and making a recommendation to the Cincinnati Planning Commission and City Council based on its significance.

The applicant is nominating 3500 Montgomery Road, St. Mark's Church, under Criterion 3: Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, method of construction or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction.

In Staffs review of the designation report and the documentation provided the building meets the criteria in the following ways:

Criterion 3: Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, method of construction or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction.

- The church is an excellent example of Italian Renaissance Revival Style and incorporates identifiable features of low-pitched roof, symmetrical facade, masonry, impressive size and scale, round arch entrance and windows, and classical details including columns, dental molding and pilasters.
- The church includes additional high style elements including imported terracotta roof tiles and a 130-foot tall campanile.
- The building was designed by prominent ecclesiastical architect, Henry Schlacks with local support by the architects Joseph Steinkamp and Brother. This is the only known work by Henry Schlacks within Cincinnati.

Conservation Guidelines

The Cincinnati Zoning Code (CZC) § 1435-07-2-C. - Adoption of Conservation Guidelines.

"Conservation guidelines shall promote the conservation, development and use of the Historic Landmark, Historic District or Historic Site and its special historic, architectural, community or aesthetic interest or value. Insofar as practicable, conservation guidelines shall promote redevelopment and revitalization of Historic Structures and compatible new development within the Historic District. The guidelines shall not limit new construction within a Historic District to a single period or architectural style but may seek to preserve the integrity of existing Historic Structures. Conservation guidelines shall take into account the impact of the designation of a Historic Landmark, Historic District or Historic Site on the residents of the affected area, the effect of the designation on the economic and social characteristics of the affected area, the projected impact of the designation on the budget of the city, as well as all of the factors listed in paragraph 1435-07-2-B(c) above. Conservation guidelines shall address Non-Contributing Structures. Approved conservation guidelines shall be published on the City's website and be made available for public inspection in the office of the Urban Conservator."

Staff finds that the proposed Guidelines for 3500 Montgomery Road, St. Mark's Church, present best practice approaches in seeking to preserve the integrity of the exterior of the building while allowing a compatible reuse of the building. The proposed Conservation Guidelines cover changes to the exterior of the building for features that are part of the integrity and significance of the building and site. The interior is not proposed to be subject to local review.

The proposed guidelines are also compatible with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Historic Preservation.

The applicant submitted proposed guidelines to Historic Conservation and City Planning Staff. Historic Conservation Staff has not proposed any changes.

Other Considerations:

Prehearing Results

- September 16, 2021 A Joint Staff Conference was held with the Department of City Planning. The applicants, city staff, the property owner's representative and members from the public were in attendance. Eight people spoke in support of the designation, three people spoke against the designation including the property owner's representative.
- A wrecking permit was submitted for the building on September 16, 2021 by the Archbishop of Cincinnati.

Comments Provided to Staff: The applicants are seeking Local landmarking status and a National Register Individual listing to be eligible for both State and Federal Historic Tax Credits.

There have been 55 letters and emails of support for the designation, including one that proposed a back up offer of purchase for redevelopment of the building. Two petitions have been submitted with signatures in support of the landmark designation. One petition has 31 signatures the other has 686 signatures.

Consistency with Plan Cincinnati (2012): This designation is consistent with the Plan Cincinnati goal embodied in the Sustain Initiative, specifically goal #2, preserving our built history as outlined in pages 197-198 of the plan.

The designation of the property is a specific action step listed in the City of Cincinnati adopted Evanston Work Plan on page 76 under the goal "Evanston builds upon its rich history through the preservation of buildings and the stories from residents past and present who shaped the neighborhood."

Recommendation:

Staff recommends the Historic Conservation Board take the following actions:

- RECOMMEND to the Cincinnati City Planning Commission (CPC) and to the Cincinnati City Council (CC) for the designation of the entire Tax Parcel 058-0001-0002, also referred to as 3500 Montgomery Road and known as St. Mark's Church as a Historic Landmark and the adoption of the related Historic Conservation Guidelines subject to the following conditions:
 - a. Any construction proposed upon the proposed Historic Landmark shall comply with the proposed Historic Conservation Guidelines (Exhibit B).
- RECOMMEND to the State Historic Preservation Board for the National Register Individual designation of the entire Tax Parcels Tax Parcel 058-0001-0002, also referred to as 3500 Montgomery Road and known as St. Mark's Church.

- a. Staff will submit a letter on behalf of the Historic Conservation Board with the above recommendation.
- 3. FINDING: The Board makes this determination per Section 1435-07-1:
 - (a) That it has been demonstrated that the 3500 Montgomery Road/St. Mark's Church meets §1435-07-1(a)(3) as the building maintains integrity and "Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, method of construction or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction."
 - (b) 3500 Montgomery Road National Register Questionnaire was supported as potential eligible by the State Historic Preservation Office.
 - (c) The designation of this property as a Local Historic Landmark will help facilitate the application for State Historic Tax Credits.

I strongly support the historic designation of this church for so many reasons. This building is iconic, a survivor of the erasure of Evanston's business district when I-71 divided the neighborhood in two (not an uncommon story for many urban black neighborhoods at that time). It is a community centerpiece, existing for over 100 years as a place to worship, gather, and celebrate. Its architecture is inspired by that of two churches in Italy, a very intentional design by famed architect Henry Schlacks, founder of the Notre Dame University School of Architecture.

St. Mark has many, many more years of service in it. The construction is solid, its bones are good. It is ready for investment. It can once again serve the community of Evanston and residents from all over Greater Cincinnati as a center for events, outreach, and more. More than one interested party has attempted to purchase the church from the Archdiocese, but they remained determined to sell to a developer who would destroy this church. It is our belief that the goals of the Archdiocese are limited to only financial gain and elimination of any reminders of a diocese that was once thriving, but is now rapidly shrinking.

We are at a loss for why anyone finds it acceptable to raze structures like these. St. Mark gives its neighbors a sense of place, a sense of history, grounding. If we do not give it historic protections, it will be yet another huge loss for the City of Cincinnati, an embarrassment in our history books, and further permission for future developers to disregard the needs of the communities they claim to serve.

 having been closely inspired by the Italian churches of St. Marie in Trastevere and St.
 Marie in Cosmedio.
- The second being a property strongly associated with a significant figure in Cincinnati
 history--this being a local designation rather than a national, designed by Henry J
 Schlacks, founder of the Architecture School at Notre Dame University and architect of
 Xavier University's original campus buildings.

I drive through Evanston regularly to and from Walnut Hills HS with my daughter, and the last thing Evanston needs is another empty lot, especially as the connections into both Walnut Hills and to Norwood are finally picking up momentum with new development. There's some renewed optimism in some circles about the King Records project, and the Woodburn Avenue corridor is seeing new housing and residents attracted there by the character and potential of the neighborhood, among other great initiatives led by the Port Authority and the City.

We believe it is important to use the tools available to protect our cultural institutions and heritage, and a local landmark designation is one of the best tools we have here in Cincinnati to prevent the unnecessary and irretrievable demolition of these historic structures. If removed, we may never see the likes of anything like St. Mark again.

Thank you for all the work you do and for protecting our cultural landmarks, and the contributing historic fabric of our city at all scales.

Hello Beth.

I am writing to you today as an Evanston resident to express my sincere hope that the Historic Conservation Board of Cincinnati votes to designate St. Mark Church as a historic local landmark. With 68.1% of the residential real estate in the Evanston neighborhood built no later than 1939, and some built considerably earlier, this neighborhood has a greater concentration of historic residences than 97.7% of all neighborhoods in America. In this regard, this neighborhood truly stands out as special, and a place where the history and legacy of St. Mark Church can carry on. In supporting this decision, the board has an opportunity to preserve a 115 year-old institution - giving light to a vision of renewal that the neighborhood so deeply yearns for.

What inspired me to write this letter is the fact that Cincinnati is a vibrant city that is experiencing both population and economic growth at new and exciting levels, but at the same time, we cannot ignore the challenges that the Evanston community is facing as it relates to gentrification, rising property taxes and the erosion of this historically black neighborhood over time. We know city growth comes along with negative consequences for some residents. For example, the Evanston neighborhood stands out for having 88.4% of children in this area living in poverty; an extraordinarily high percentage compared to other neighborhoods in the nation. This is but one issue that can be improved if the neighborhood were to gain ownership of the church. Other notable goals for the use of a restored St. Mark are: operating a food pantry for the insecure, providing programs for youth and a space for isolated senior citizens of the community, as well as creating space for commerce, culture and art.

In order to maintain the diversity and uniqueness of each neighborhood, it is imperative to work with community leaders to ensure that its assets are leveraged to support the needs of neighborhood. The neighborhood council along with other Evanston residents have a plan to transform the church into the

St. Mark Center which would serve as a cultural, artistic, and neighborhood hub with tenant stakeholders that will attract and serve people throughout greater Cincinnati. I hope that the reasons above and the additional rationale you are given lend to your support. Thank you for taking the time to consider this request and I encourage you to vote in support of designating this church as another one of Cincinnati's increible historic landmarks.

As a Cincinnati resident and member of The Mark Board working to conserve St. Mark Church as a Historic landmark, I am submitting the following request and information in support of the conservation of this wonderful, historic landmark. My grandparents, Francis and Loretta Niemer, lived on Bevis Ave. starting in the 1920s, and my mother, Agnes G. Niemer Morand, attended St. Mark Church and grade school and married my father, Robert F. Morand, following his return from WWII at St. Mark Church. I attended St. Mark Church when visiting my grandparents in Evanston in my youth and have great memories. I have the 50th Anniversary 1905-1955 booklet celebrating the Golden Jubilee of St. Mark Church following the establishment of the church in 1905 from my Grandparents personal archive. This 1955 booklet provides a great foundation of the early history of the parish and architectural structure of the church which supports its value as a historic landmark for the city of Cincinnati and the nation. I am sharing in my request for the conservation of St. Mark

information from my grandparents 1955 Golden Jubilee booklet for the Historic Conservation Board's consideration.

In the early part of the year 1905, a group of Catholic men of the community called Evanston, a suburb of Cincinnati at that time, met to establish a new parish in this vicinity. On June 22, 1905, the Catholics of Evanston were told by the archbishop that a parish in Evanston would be established and Fr. Mark Hamburger, C.PP.S, was appointed the pastor on June 21, 1905. Miss Mary Klinckhamer, a resident of the sparcely settled Cincinnati suburb donated an aggregate area of her estate on which to build the church. The first mass of the residents was held in her home on August 15, 1905.

A surveyor staked off the grounds on October 10, 1905, and ground for the new building was broken on October 17, 1905. On April 25, 1906 the laying of the cornerstone and its blessing occurred during the Patronal Feast of the parish.

The temple in the church is of Roman Basilica style architecture. Its classic design has barrel-shaped vaulted ceiling and interior columns similar to that of St. Peter's in Rome at that time. Bricks were matched to the color of Roman Travertine stone and the roof resembles Roman tile. The floors of church aisles are Roman mosaic; the wainscoating, marble; and doors and trim solid oak. In 1955 the church had a seating capacity of 950, not including the choir gallery and two votive chapels. Included in the architecture of the church is Botticino marble, mosaic ceiling, Breccia marble, and Carrara marble. Zettler art glass windows and Feuerstein stations, painted in oil upon copper were provided by church societies. The art glass windows could not be shipped from Europe until 1919 due to World War I. The erection of the Pipe Organ in the church was done in 1933. It should be noted that the retaining wall which is currently a problem was also a problem for the parish during the early years of its history and was reinforced in 1951.

The parishioners created a Recreation Center where they could gather in wholesome recreation under the auspices of the church. They wanted the parish to serve as the center where its members can find facilities for relaxing amid cheerful surroundings and pleasant company. The Mark Board will continue to support this part of the church's history by forming the St. Mark Center where Evanston and surrounding community residents can meet and socialize which will impact their Social Determinants of Health. Looking back over the 116 years upon the humble beginnings of St. Mark Church, the Evanston forefathers had the foresight to found a new parish in a growing community in 1905. A great community occurred and now can be remembered and preserved through the conservation and celebration of St. Mark Church as a historical landmark.

Having just returned from a historic tour of Normandy and Provence, France, I truly believe the historic conservation of St. Mark Church is critical to the preservation of the memories of its founders and the beautiful architecture that exists and can be treasured. St. Mark Church is a monumental tribute to the very identity of Cincinnati. Please do not let this treasure be destroyed, rather conserve it in memory of its founders and future generations to see and enjoy. Thank-you

I'm writing to help the community of Evanston designate St. Mark Cathedral as a local landmark on October 4th. Congruent with various portions of Criterion 4 of the National Park Service's criteria for national landmark, this striking and beautiful building would seem to be clearly eligible for designation as a national or local landmark.

The church is an outstanding example of the American Italianate cathedrals of the early 20th century and having been closely inspired by the Italian churches of St. Marie in Trastevere and St. Marie in Cosmedio.

The property is also strongly associated with a significant figure in Cincinnati history having been designed by Henry J Schlacks, founder of the Architecture School at Notre Dame University and architect of Xavier University's original campus buildings. And the troubled history of the neighborhood should not be forgotten: The construction of Interstate 71 in 1972, which passed adjacent to the church, led to hundreds of homes being razed, further starving St. Mark of its congregation. By the late 20th century, St. Mark had just a small congregation of mostly African-American Catholics. The last thing any community needs (but especially burdened communities like Evanston) is another empty lot.

I believe it is important to use the tools at our disposal to protect our cultural institutions and heritage, and a local landmark designation is one of the best tools we have to prevent the unnecessary demolition of these historic structures which, if properly reimagined and reinvigorated, can serve the community for decades more. If removed, we may never see the likes of this kind of a architectural and community heritage in Evanston again. Part of the role of the landmarking process is both to connect us to our past but also inspire our future through recognition of such truly remarkable accomplishments as the church and campanile of St. Mark.

I drive through Evanston regularly to and from Walnut Hills HS with my daughter, and the last thing Evanston needs is another empty lot, especially as the connections into both Walnut Hills and to Norwood are finally picking up momentum with new development. Hello Beth.

I am writing to you today as an Evanston resident to express my sincere hope that the Historic Conservation Board of Cincinnati votes to designate St. Mark Church as a historic local landmark. With 68.1% of the residential real estate in the Evanston neighborhood built no later than 1939, and some built considerably earlier, this neighborhood has a greater concentration of historic residences than 97.7% of all neighborhoods in America. In this regard, this neighborhood truly stands out as special, and a place where the history and legacy of St. Mark Church can carry on. In supporting this decision, the board has an opportunity to preserve a 115 year-old institution - giving light to a vision of renewal that the neighborhood so deeply yearns for.

What inspired me to write this letter is the fact that Cincinnati is a vibrant city that is experiencing both population and economic growth at new and exciting levels, but at the same time, we cannot ignore the challenges that the Evanston community is facing as it relates to gentrification, rising property taxes and the erosion of this historically black neighborhood over time. We know city growth comes along with negative consequences for some residents. For example, the Evanston neighborhood stands out for having 88.4% of children in this area living in poverty; an extraordinarily high percentage compared to other neighborhoods in the nation. This is but one issue that can be improved if the neighborhood were to gain ownership of the church. Other notable goals for the use of a restored St. Mark are: operating a food pantry for the insecure, providing programs for youth and a space for isolated senior citizens of the community, as well as creating space for commerce, culture and art.

In order to maintain the diversity and uniqueness of each neighborhood, it is imperative to work with community leaders to ensure that its assets are leveraged to support the needs of neighbood. The neighborhood council along with other Evanston residents have a plan to transform the church into the

St. Mark Center which would serve as a cultural, artistic, and neighborhood hub with tenant stakeholders that will attract and serve people throughout greater Cincinnati. I hope that the reasons above and the additional rationale you are given lend to your support. As a Cincinnati resident and member of The Mark Board working to conserve St. Mark Church as a Historic landmark, I am submitting the following request and information in support of the conservation of this wonderful, historic landmark. My grandparents, Francis and Loretta Niemer, lived on Bevis Ave. starting in the 1920s, and my mother, Agnes G. Niemer Morand, attended St. Mark Church and grade school and married my father, Robert F. Morand, following his return from WWII at St. Mark Church. I attended St. Mark Church when visiting my grandparents in Evanston in my youth and have great memories. I have the 50th Anniversary 1905-1955 booklet celebrating the Golden Jubilee of St. Mark Church following the establishment of the church in 1905 from my Grandparents personal archive. This 1955 booklet provides a great foundation of the early history of the parish and architectural structure of the church which supports its value as a historic landmark for the city of Cincinnati and the nation. I am sharing in my request for the conservation of St. Mark

information from my grandparents 1955 Golden Jubilee booklet for the Historic Conservation Board's consideration.

In the early part of the year 1905, a group of Catholic men of the community called Evanston, a suburb of Cincinnati at that time, met to establish a new parish in this vicinity. On June 22, 1905, the Catholics of Evanston were told by the archbishop that a parish in Evanston would be established and Fr. Mark Hamburger, C.PP.S, was appointed the pastor on June 21, 1905. Miss Mary Klinckhamer, a resident of the sparcely settled Cincinnati suburb donated an aggregate area of her estate on which to build the church. The first mass of the residents was held in her home on August 15, 1905.

A surveyor staked off the grounds on October 10, 1905, and ground for the new building was broken on October 17, 1905. On April 25, 1906 the laying of the cornerstone and its blessing occurred during the Patronal Feast of the parish.

The temple in the church is of Roman Basilica style architecture. Its classic design has barrel-shaped vaulted ceiling and interior columns similar to that of St. Peter's in Rome at that time. Bricks were matched to the color of Roman Travertine stone and the roof resembles Roman tile. The floors of church aisles are Roman mosaic; the wainscoating, marble; and doors and trim solid oak. In 1955 the church had a seating capacity of 950, not including the choir gallery and two votive chapels. Included in the architecture of the church is Botticino marble, mosaic ceiling, Breccia marble, and Carrara marble. Zettler art glass windows and Feuerstein stations, painted in oil upon copper were provided by church societies. The art glass windows could not be shipped from Europe until 1919 due to World War I. The erection of the Pipe Organ in the church was done in 1933. It should be noted that the retaining wall which is currently a problem was also a problem for the parish during the early years of its history and was reinforced in 1951.

The parishioners created a Recreation Center where they could gather in wholesome recreation under the auspices of the church. They wanted the parish to serve as the center where its members can find facilities for relaxing amid cheerful surroundings and pleasant company. The Mark Board will continue to support this part of the church's history by forming the St. Mark Center where Evanston and surrounding community residents can meet and socialize which will impact their Social Determinants of Health. Looking back over the 116 years upon the humble beginnings of St. Mark Church, the Evanston forefathers had the foresight to found a new parish in a growing community in 1905. A great community occurred and now can be remembered and preserved through the conservation and celebration of St. Mark Church as a historical landmark.

Having just returned from a historic tour of Normandy and Provence, France, I truly believe the historic conservation of St. Mark Church is critical to the preservation of the memories of its founders and the beautiful architecture that exists and can be treasured. St. Mark Church is a monumental tribute to the very identity of Cincinnati. Please do not let this treasure be destroyed, rather conserve it in memory of its founders and future generations to see and enjoy. Thank-you

Hello Beth-

I'm writing to help the community of Evanston designate St. Mark Cathedral as a local landmark on October 4th. Congruent with various portions of Criterion 4 of the National Park Service's criteria for national landmark, this striking and beautiful building would seem to be clearly eligible for designation as a national or local landmark.

The church is an outstanding example of the American Italianate cathedrals of the early 20th century and having been closely inspired by the Italian churches of St. Marie in Trastevere and St. Marie in Cosmedio.

The property is also strongly associated with a significant figure in Cincinnati history having been designed by Henry J Schlacks, founder of the Architecture School at Notre Dame University and architect of Xavier University's original campus buildings. And the troubled history of the neighborhood should not be forgotten: The construction of Interstate 71 in 1972, which passed adjacent to the church, led to hundreds of homes being razed, further starving St. Mark of its congregation. By the late 20th century, St. Mark had just a small congregation of mostly African-American Catholics. The last thing any community needs (but especially burdened communities like Evanston) is another empty lot.

I believe it is important to use the tools at our disposal to protect our cultural institutions and heritage, and a local landmark designation is one of the best tools we have to prevent the unnecessary demolition of these historic structures which, if properly reimagined and reinvigorated, can serve the community for decades more. If removed, we may never see the likes of this kind of a architectural and community heritage in Evanston again. Part of the role of the landmarking process is both to connect us to our past but also inspire our future through recognition of such truly remarkable accomplishments as the church and campanile of St. Mark.

Dear Honorable Members of the Historic Conservation Board:

I write to express support for the landmark designation of St. Marks Church in Evanston. The 1916 building is an exceptional example of Italian Renaissance Revival style and clearly meets the requirements for landmark designation. Designed by prominent Chicago ecclesiastical architect Henry Schlacks, St. Marks is one of the finest examples of basilicaplan church architecture in the Midwest. Schlacks, considered by many to be the finest of Chicago's church architects, was trained at MIT and in the offices of Adler & Sullivan before starting his own practice. He founded the Architecture Department at the University of Notre Dame.

Does St. Marks meet the Criteria for Landmark Designation?

Yes, St. Marks also meets the requirements for designation because of its role within the built environment of Evanston. The location of St. Marks at the intersection of Montgomery Road and I-71 gives it a unique role in bridging the devasting impact of the interstate that divided Evanston. The size, visibility and prominence of the structure contribute to its role in establishing the urban context for the neighborhood of Evanston neighborhood. It is a critical anchor at a critical location.

It is also the type and quality of structure the zoning code identifies as eligible for designation. It should be designated a landmark because it meets the following requirement of the zoning code:

1435-01-H3. - Historic Significance

- (a) the attributes or characteristics of a district, site or structure that possess integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association;
- (d) a district, site or structure that embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period or method of construction;

The designation would also support the five of the Specific Purposes identified in 1435-03.

Can a Church be Designated as a Landmark?

Yes, in fact religious structures make up one of the largest categories of building types of current landmarks. Of the forty-eight landmarks, seven are religious are churches or synagogues. These include Covenant-First Presbyterian Church, Holy Cross Monastery, Plum Street Temple, St. Louis Church, St. Francis Desales Church, St. Francis Xavier Church, and St. Peter-in-Chains Cathedral. Many more churches are protected by being located within local historic districts. There is a specific exception allowing the designation of a church as a landmark if "...it is a religious property deriving primary significance from architectural or artistic distinction or historical importance; (1435-07-1.(b)). St. Marks meets and exceeds this threshold due to the architectural quality of its design and construction.

Would Designation Create an Economic Hardship for the Owner?

Designation itself would not create an economic hardship. The question of economic hardship is not one of the criteria for designation. The issue would be addressed in an application for a Certificate of Appropriateness at a hearing. The zoning code provides detailed criteria for the Historic Conservation Board to consider at that time. The designation process does not provide a format for the owner, the community organizations nor the public to provide the detailed evidence required for a determination of economic hardship.

Would Designation Support for Community Plans and Goals?

Yes, and most importantly, designation should be granted because it supports long-term community plans and goals. In addition to the Cincinnati Plan that calls for preservation, Evanston has plans that the designation would support. Evanston has an engaged, active community organization that is seeking to repair decades of damage to the built environment of the neighborhood. That work is especially challenging because of the public policy decisions that divided Evanston when I-71 was routed through the neighborhood. The loss of St. Marks would further erode neighborhood continuity. Designation as a landmark would be an important step toward achieving their vision.

As a Cincinnati resident and member of The Mark Board working to conserve St. Mark Church as a Historic landmark, I am submitting the following request and information in support of the conservation of this wonderful, historic landmark. My grandparents, Francis and Loretta Niemer, lived on Bevis Ave. starting in the 1920s, and my mother, Agnes G. Niemer Morand, attended St. Mark Church and grade school and married my father, Robert F. Morand, following his return from WWII at St. Mark Church. I attended St. Mark Church when visiting my grandparents in Evanston in my youth and have great memories. I have the 50th Anniversary 1905-1955 booklet celebrating the Golden Jubilee of St. Mark Church following the establishment of the church in 1905 from my Grandparents personal archive. This 1955 booklet provides a great foundation of the early history of the parish and architectural structure of the church which supports its value as a historic landmark for the city of Cincinnati and the nation. I am sharing in my request for the conservation of St. Mark information from my grandparents 1955 Golden Jubilee booklet for the Historic Conservation Board's consideration.

In the early part of the year 1905, a group of Catholic men of the community called Evanston, a suburb of Cincinnati at that time, met to establish a new parish in this vicinity. On June 22, 1905, the Catholics of Evanston were told by the archbishop that a parish in Evanston would be established and Fr. Mark Hamburger, C.PP.S, was appointed the pastor on June 21, 1905. Miss Mary Klinckhamer, a resident of the sparcely settled Cincinnati suburb donated an aggregate area of her estate on which to build the church. The first mass of the residents was held in her home on August 15, 1905.

A surveyor staked off the grounds on October 10, 1905, and ground for the new building was broken on October 17, 1905. On April 25, 1906 the laying of the cornerstone and its blessing occurred during the Patronal Feast of the parish.

The temple in the church is of Roman Basilica style architecture. Its classic design has barrel-shaped vaulted ceiling and interior columns similar to that of St. Peter's in Rome at that time. Bricks were matched to the color of Roman Travertine stone and the roof resembles Roman tile. The floors of church aisles are Roman mosaic; the wainscoating, marble; and doors and trim solid oak. In 1955 the church had a seating capacity of 950, not including the choir gallery and two votive chapels. Included in the architecture of the church is Botticino marble, mosaic ceiling, Breccia marble, and Carrara marble. Zettler art glass windows and Feuerstein stations, painted in oil upon copper were provided by church societies. The art glass windows

could not be shipped from Europe until 1919 due to World War I. The erection of the Pipe Organ in the church was done in 1933. It should be noted that the retaining wall which is currently a problem was also a problem for the parish during the early years of its history and was reinforced in 1951.

The parishioners created a Recreation Center where they could gather in wholesome recreation under the auspices of the church. They wanted the parish to serve as the center where its members can find facilities for relaxing amid cheerful surroundings and pleasant company. The Mark Board will continue to support this part of the church's history by forming the St. Mark Center where Evanston and surrounding community residents can meet and socialize which will impact their Social Determinants of Health. Looking back over the 116 years upon the humble beginnings of St. Mark Church, the Evanston forefathers had the foresight to found a new parish in a growing community in 1905. A great community occurred and now can be remembered and preserved through the conservation and celebration of St. Mark Church as a historical landmark.

Having just returned from a historic tour of Normandy and Provence, France, I truly believe the historic conservation of St. Mark Church is critical to the preservation of the memories of its founders and the beautiful architecture that exists and can be treasured. St. Mark Church is a monumental tribute to the very identity of Cincinnati. Please do not let this treasure be destroyed, rather conserve it in memory of its founders and future generations to see and enjoy. Thank-you

Dear Board,

I am writing in support of the proposed local landmark listing for St. Mark's Church in Evanston. I am an Evanston resident and a volunteer board member of "The Mark", a non-profit formed with the intent to try and acquire the St. Mark's Church building and repurpose it as a community center. I am also a registered architect with over 15 years of experience working on historic rehabilitation projects. I have been through the building and the potential for rehabilitation and reuse is extremely strong. The building is structurally sound and provides open unobstructed spaces in the main church building along with smaller leasable spaces in the rectory building. Historic fabric is intact throughout both buildings, making it an excellent candidate for state and federal historic tax credits.

Unfortunately, the Church of the Resurrection and the Archdiocese of Cincinnati have not continued to maintain or fully secure the building in the past couple years, leading to ongoing water damage and vandalism, and have recently shown they have no regard for maintaining the building AT ALL in their real estate transaction (despite there being multiple offers and interested parties that do want to maintain the building). They have even gone as far as to apply for a demolition permit. The architectural integrity of this grand building that has stood in Evanston for over 100 years deserves the protection of a local landmark listing to put the burden of proving the building must be torn down on the applicant. This building is an important focal point and central node of the neighborhood of Evanston, with a tower that can be seen from miles away in the surrounding neighborhoods. Removing the building would further deteriorate the historic fabric and collective memory of a neighborhood that has already been unjustly cut and divided by the I-71 corridor. The desire and drive to rehabilitate and revive the building exists, if only the owners would recognize the value of the building to the neighborhood and city at large.

I respectfully request you vote in favor of making St. Mark's Church a local landmark.

RE: Support for the Landmark Designation of St. Marks Church in Evanston

Dear Honorable Members of the Historic Conservation Board:

I write to express support for the landmark designation of St. Marks Church in Evanston. The 1916 building is an exceptional example of Italian Renaissance Revival style and clearly meets the requirements for landmark designation. Designed by prominent Chicago ecclesiastical architect Henry Schlacks, St. Marks is one of the finest examples of basilicaplan church architecture in the Midwest. Schlacks, considered by many to be the finest of Chicago's church architects, was trained at MIT and in the offices of Adler & Sullivan before starting his own practice. He founded the Architecture Department at the University of Notre Dame.

Does St. Marks meet the Criteria for Landmark Designation?

Yes, St. Marks also meets the requirements for designation because of its role within the built environment of Evanston. The location of St. Marks at the intersection of Montgomery Road and I-71 gives it a unique role in bridging the devasting impact of the interstate that divided Evanston. The size, visibility and prominence of the structure contribute to its role in establishing the urban context for the neighborhood of Evanston neighborhood. It is a critical anchor at a critical location.

It is also the type and quality of structure the zoning code identifies as eligible for designation. It should be designated a landmark because it meets the following requirement of the zoning code:

1435-01-H3. - Historic Significance

- (a) the attributes or characteristics of a district, site or structure that possess integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association;
- (d) a district, site or structure that embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period or method of construction;

The designation would also support the five of the Specific Purposes identified in 1435-03.

Can a Church be Designated as a Landmark?

Yes, in fact religious structures make up one of the largest categories of building types of current landmarks. Of the forty-eight landmarks, seven are religious are churches or synagogues. These include Covenant-First Presbyterian Church, Holy Cross Monastery, Plum Street Temple, St. Louis Church, St. Francis Desales Church, St. Francis Xavier Church, and St. Peter-in-Chains Cathedral. Many more churches are protected by being located within local historic districts. There is a specific exception allowing the designation of a church as a landmark if "...it is a religious property deriving primary significance from architectural or artistic distinction or historical importance; (1435-07-1.(b)). St. Marks meets and exceeds this threshold due to the architectural quality of its design and construction.

Would Designation Create an Economic Hardship for the Owner?

Designation itself would not create an economic hardship. The question of economic hardship is not one of the criteria for designation. The issue would be addressed in an application for a Certificate of Appropriateness at a hearing. The zoning code provides detailed criteria for the Historic Conservation Board to consider at that time. The designation process does not provide a format for the owner, the community organizations nor the public to provide the detailed evidence required for a determination of economic hardship.

Would Designation Support for Community Plans and Goals?

Yes, and most importantly, designation should be granted because it supports long-term community plans and goals. In addition to the Cincinnati Plan that calls for preservation, Evanston has plans that the designation would support. Evanston has an engaged, active community organization that is seeking to repair decades of damage to the built environment of the neighborhood. That work is especially challenging because of the public policy decisions that divided Evanston when I-71 was routed through the neighborhood. The loss of St. Marks would further erode neighborhood continuity. Designation as a landmark would be an important step toward achieving their vision.

I am writing you to advocate on behalf of St. Mark Church in Evanston. I hope that the Historic Conservation Board sees fit to designate the structure as a landmark and approve the necessary associated zoning change.

As an architect with a background in historic preservation, it is easy to recognize the importance of this structure as a fine example of church design by Henry J. Schlacks, who founded the Architecture School at Notre Dame University, which today stands as the United States' preeminent institution for teaching classical architecture. For this reason alone, it is worthy of the designation.

More importantly, however, the structure needs to be preserved as an anchor to the community, as a direct living link back to the neighborhood's history, and as an important armature for its future health. If the building is left to be demolished, we are guaranteed that nothing as inspiring and stately will replace that phenomenal Italianate tower at the intersection of Montgomery and Duck Creek. It alone is a landmark in the strictest sense of the word.

If nothing else, as a lifelong Kentucky resident, I can tell you I've looked up countless times from I-71 as I driven along and enjoyed seeing that tower each and every time I've whisked by at 55 miles per hour for the last 30+ years. Not many buildings command your attention at that speed. This highly visible gem should be a point of pride for the city and reason enough to grant it landmark status. When I drive into other cities and am greeted by empty lots, warehouses, office towers, or other uninspiring buildings along the highway, I am not compelled to stop like I am when I see St. Mark Church.

I hope that the Historic Conservation Board will vote to grant St. Mark's its landmark status and that this endeavor moves successfully through the Planning Commission and City Council. Cincinnati is a unique city and a great city, and it owes part of this greatness to its fantastic built environment, of which St. Mark's is an important piece.

As a Cincinnati resident and member of The Mark Board working to conserve St. Mark Church as a Historic landmark, I am submitting the following request and information in support of the conservation of this wonderful, historic landmark. My grandparents, Francis and Loretta Niemer, lived on Bevis Ave. starting in the 1920s, and my mother, Agnes G. Niemer Morand, attended St. Mark Church and grade school and married my father, Robert F. Morand, following his return from WWII at St. Mark Church. I attended St. Mark Church when visiting my grandparents in Evanston in my youth and have great memories. I have the 50th Anniversary 1905-1955 booklet celebrating the Golden Jubilee of St. Mark Church following the establishment of the church in 1905 from my Grandparents personal archive. This 1955 booklet provides a great foundation of the early history of the parish and architectural structure of the church which supports its value as a historic landmark for the city of Cincinnati and the nation. I am sharing in my request for the conservation of St. Mark information from my grandparents 1955 Golden Jubilee booklet for the Historic Conservation Board's consideration.

In the early part of the year 1905, a group of Catholic men of the community called Evanston, a suburb of Cincinnati at that time, met to establish a new parish in this vicinity. On June 22, 1905, the Catholics of Evanston were told by the archbishop that a parish in Evanston would be established and Fr. Mark Hamburger, C.PP.S, was appointed the pastor on June 21, 1905. Miss Mary Klinckhamer, a resident of the sparcely settled Cincinnati suburb donated an aggregate area of her estate on which to build the church. The first mass of the residents was held in her home on August 15, 1905.

A surveyor staked off the grounds on October 10, 1905, and ground for the new building was broken on October 17, 1905. On April 25, 1906 the laying of the cornerstone and its blessing occurred during the Patronal Feast of the parish.

The temple in the church is of Roman Basilica style architecture. Its classic design has barrel-shaped vaulted ceiling and interior columns similar to that of St. Peter's in Rome at that time. Bricks were matched to the color of Roman Travertine stone and the roof resembles Roman tile. The floors of church aisles are Roman mosaic; the wainscoating, marble; and doors and trim solid oak. In 1955 the church had a seating capacity of 950, not including the choir gallery and two votive chapels. Included in the architecture of the church is Botticino marble, mosaic ceiling, Breccia marble, and Carrara marble. Zettler art glass windows and Feuerstein stations, painted in oil upon copper were provided by church societies. The art glass windows

could not be shipped from Europe until 1919 due to World War I. The erection of the Pipe Organ in the church was done in 1933. It should be noted that the retaining wall which is currently a problem was also a problem for the parish during the early years of its history and was reinforced in 1951.

The parishioners created a Recreation Center where they could gather in wholesome recreation under the auspices of the church. They wanted the parish to serve as the center where its members can find facilities for relaxing amid cheerful surroundings and pleasant company. The Mark Board will continue to support this part of the church's history by forming the St. Mark Center where Evanston and surrounding community residents can meet and socialize which will impact their Social Determinants of Health. Looking back over the 116 years upon the humble beginnings of St. Mark Church, the Evanston forefathers had the foresight to found a new parish in a growing community in 1905. A great community occurred and now can be remembered and preserved through the conservation and celebration of St. Mark Church as a historical landmark.

Having just returned from a historic tour of Normandy and Provence, France, I truly believe the historic conservation of St. Mark Church is critical to the preservation of the memories of its founders and the beautiful architecture that exists and can be treasured. St. Mark Church is a monumental tribute to the very identity of Cincinnati. Please do not let this treasure be destroyed, rather conserve it in memory of its founders and future generations to see and enjoy. Thank-you

I am an Evanston resident and a volunteer board member of "The Mark", a non-profit formed with the intent to try and acquire the St. Mark's Church building and repurpose it as a community center. I am also a registered architect with over 15 years of experience working on historic rehabilitation projects. I have been through the building and the potential for rehabilitation and reuse is extremely strong. The building is structurally sound and provides open unobstructed spaces in the main church building along with smaller leasable spaces in the rectory building. Historic fabric is intact throughout both buildings, making it an excellent candidate for state and federal historic tax credits.

Unfortunately, the Church of the Resurrection and the Archdiocese of Cincinnati have not continued to maintain or fully secure the building in the past couple years, leading to ongoing water damage and vandalism, and have recently shown they have no regard for maintaining the building AT ALL in their real estate transaction (despite there being multiple offers and interested parties that do want to maintain the building). They have even gone as far as to apply for a demolition permit. The architectural integrity of this grand building that has stood in Evanston for over 100 years deserves the protection of a local landmark listing to put the burden of proving the building must be torn down on the applicant. This building is an important focal point and central node of the neighborhood of Evanston, with a tower that can be seen from miles away in the surrounding neighborhoods. Removing the building would further deteriorate the historic fabric and collective memory of a neighborhood that has already been unjustly cut and divided by the I-71 corridor. The desire and drive to rehabilitate and revive the building exists, if only the owners would recognize the value of the building to the neighborhood and city at large.

I respectfully request you vote in favor of making St. Mark's Church a local landmark.

- 1. Local Historic Landmark Designation Report.

- 3. Historic Conservation Office Staff Report dated September 15, 2021.

Summary:

The Evanston Community Council has applied to designate the St. Mark's Church located at 3500 Montgomery Road in the Evanston neighborhood ("Building") as a Local Historic Landmark pursuant to Cincinnati Municipal Code ("CMC") Section 1435-7-02-A.

Upon her review of the designation application pursuant to CMC Section 1435-07-1(a)(3), the Urban Conservator prepared a report recommending approval of the landmark designation and the associated conservation guidelines. The Board then, at its regular meeting on October 11, 2021, held a public hearing on the proposed designation at which it heard from the Urban Conservator and proponents of the designation whether the Building qualifies for landmark designation. Upon considering the designation application (including the designation report and conservation guidelines), the Urban Conservator's report, and comments received at its public hearing, a majority of the Board's members present throughout the hearing and constituting a quorum voted to recommend designation of the Building as a Local Historic Landmark finding that the Building embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, and method of construction and thus satisfies CMC Section 1435-07-1(a)(3) and further resolved to recommend approval of the associated conservation guidelines.
